## Business Education for Interested Students

The Business Education program has a two-fold purpose:

English Classes Promote Proficiency

The English Dept. of AHS desires to promote proficiency in the written and spoken English of the student. When literature is being stressed, the student is encouraged to learn not only facts but also practical, aesthetic, and moral values. Also, he practices all the skills of writing, particularly expository.

When linguistics is being stressed, the student reviews the traditional values of syntax, punctuation, spelling, and capitalization, but he is also introduced to the inductive approach to writing. Among other types of writing the research theme is especially treated. All of this is approached through a constant application of the appropriate level of English usage.

## Library Functions As Resource Center

The school library is a service agency, a teaching agency, a materials center, and a reading center. It functions to assist the students in preparing assignments as well as broadening the fields of extracurricular interests. The 1966-67 Industrial Arts Department in AHS offers two courses of mechanical drawing. The students who take Mechanical Drawing I are taught the values of lettering neatly and working neatly with mechanical drawing tools. The second year students follow through with the values already taught in first year drawing and begin work on the construction of house plans. The courses are detailed enough to give any desiring student a firm background for college, and at the same time the non-college bound student can get a good working knowledge of the subject. A student after completing two years of mechanical drawing can lay out and draw a complete set of house plans and have a working knowledge of how to read blue prints.

## AHS Offers Varied Electives

AHS offers as electives Distributive Education and Industrial Cooperative Training. In these courses the students take their required subjects and one class in the vocational course in the mornings and are placed on training jobs in the afternoon. These students receive both classroom instruction and on-the-job training in a field that they are interested in and at the same time receive school credit and some financial reward.

These courses are open to junior and senior students who are 16 years of age or over. Many of these students go into jobs related to their training, but many continue their education in college after graduation and find these courses benefit them as much or more than some other elective that they might have taken in AHS.

The controlling purpose of vocation education is "to fit for useful employment"; hence, it follows that the controlling purpose of vocational education in home economics, as provided for by the vocational education acts, is to prepare for the responsibilities and activities involved in homemaking and in achieving family well-being. The general objective of vocational education in home economics is to provide instruction which will enable families to improve the quality of their family life through the more effective development and utilization of human and material resources. This program is designed to provide for instruction in all of the aspects of home living and homemaking.

Vocational agriculture is designed to supplement training opportunities for boys who are progressing toward the goal of establishing a farming business. Through vocational agriculture activities the cooperative spirit is fostered and individual talent is discovered and developed. # Vocational Rehabilitation in the Public Schools of Athens 

In the 1964-65 school year a high school vocational unit for Special Education students, between the ages of 16 and 21, began in the Athens Public School system.

In April 1966, a cooperative agreement was signed by the Athens Public Schools, Vocational Rehabilitation, and Texas Education Agency thereby permitting Athens High School to issue a Vocational High School Diploma. In May 1966, Athens High School issued its first vocational diplomas to 3 Special Education graduates.
