Athens finally got with it as Curtis Royall swooped downfield on a 30 -yard punt return, and moments later Tommy Stutts gunned over to add a second 6 -pointer. Both kicks failed. The Cats then tallied once more, wrapping up the game 28-12.

The Hornets were virtually robbed September 19 as the Terrell Tigers tiptoed by them 22-21, clinching their first win over Athens since 1962.

A Terrell fumble on the opening kickoff allowed Athens QB David Burgamy to gun across the goal early in the game. A second tally followed as Burgamy landed a 15 -yard pass into the arms of Rusty Ryon who streaked 40 yards to paydirt. Kris Holt booted both extra points. Terrell's amazing Huey Hardin collected a TD for the Tigers in the second quarter followed closely by a third score for the Hornets on a Tommy Stutts one-yard push. The half-time score stood at a comfortable 21-7.

The second half was a different story. Athens rushed only 30 yards while the Tigers ate up the field. A 23 -yard run and two-point conversion set the score at a dangerous 21-15. Early in the fourth they scored again and held their slim lead until the final buzzer.

First win of the season came October 2, in the Hornets' first contest in District 9.AAA South Zone. The Marlin Bulldogs fell 15.10 to a fired-up Athens team who came from behind in the second quarter and held on till the finish.

Marlin got things started with a 31 -yard field goal halfway through the first quarter. After several thwarted attempts, David Burgamy fired a shot to Rusty Ryon for a 9 -yard TD. Kris Holt's extra point put the Hornets ahead 7.3. Marlin received the kickoff but one play later fumbled to the Maroons who fought to the six. Fred Heath rammed over for another TD, and Burgamy, holding for Holt's kick, faked and flipped a pass to Lonnie Johnson for the conversion. AHS held a 15 . 3 lead at the half. The Bulldogs finally collected a TD in the third but could do no more.

The Class AA Bears of DeKalb proved too much for the Hornets, handing them a $34-20$ defeat there October 9. Scheduled as a makeup game replacing LaVega Carver, DeKalb ruled the scoreboard for the first three quarters and then hung on as the Hornets came to life in the fourth.

On the short end of a 34-0 score, QB David Burgamy connected with Fred Heath who ran 22 yards for the first Athens score. Seconds later Rusty Ryon intercepted a Bruin pass for a 40 -yard touchdown return. This time the two-point conversion was good, and the score stood 34-14. On his next possession Burgamy hurled a bomb to Matt Livingston for a third TD covering 66 yards. But 20 points in three minutes was not enough to overcome the determined Bears. Final score: 34-20.

## Marauders blast Carrollton, 21-7

Athens floated to a 21.7 victory over Carrollton's R. L. Turner junior varsity in a non-district match here October 16. After a first period 21-0 lead, the Hornets stuck to strictly experimental plays and held Turner to a single TD.

First score was tallied when QB David Burgamy flopped a 21 -yard pass to Rusty Ryon. Ryon hit paydirt again with an 18-yard strike from Denny Sims. Fullback Fred Heath later added six points on a one-yard plunge. Burgamy kicked all three extra points.

Carrollton's single touchdown came in the second quarter after a 73 -yard drive. Neither team scored again, and Athens wrapped up its sixth game, 21-7.

Athens took a decisive 21.8 win over the LaVega Pirates October 23. A Pirate fumble grabbed by Jerry Halbrook paved the way for Tommy Stutts to ram it over for-a TD. Halftime saw the score still standing at 7-0.

In the third quarter LaVega broke through an otherwise unbending defense to score and then converted for two to take a slim 8-7 lead. A 64 -yard march by the Hornets was climaxed when Lonnie Johnson nabbed a pass in the endzone making it $13-8$. Rusty Ryon stole a Pirate pass, and moments later Curtis Royall ran it 33 yards for the third TD. Royall also ran in the two extra to give Athens a 21.8 win in their second district game.

## Waco Cats 22-6

Athens fell 22.6 to Waco Moore in a hard-fought game October 30. Defensive play dominated the first quarter as neither team was able to score. In the second, Moore scored on a 33 -yard pass and took a 7.0 lead. A Hornet fumble in the third allowed another Lion TD, leaving Athens on the short end of a 14.0 score.

Both teams scored in the final period, Athens on a 25 -yard pass to Curtis Royall in the endzone and Moore on an eight-yard sprint with only three seconds remaining. The Hornets were left with a 22-6 loss and a 2-1 district record.

Football season ended here on a rainy Friday the 13 th as the Mexia Black Cats ripped to a 21-14 win over Athens.

A Hornet fumble in the first quarter set up Mexia's first TD, and a second Black Cat tally was added early in the second period.
