## 1971 additional improvements greatly modernize AHS

Changes occurred in curriculum, scheduling and eating facilities in 71-72. Assignment of classes was computerized for the first time, and students had more choices than before - some 48 - including new classes in Premium English, Vocational Office Education and Art. One class of Premium English was offered at each grade level for students able and interested in a more in-depth study of literature. Basic drawing, painting and various crafts made up first-year Art, with a second level due to begin next year, and the addition of VOE enabled 35 junior and senior students to work with business machines and gain experience in office work. The school cafeteria gave way to automation at mid-term with the installation of vending machines which served drinks, snacks, sandwiches, canned foods and salads.

## Palestine overcomes Hornets 20-15 in season opener

Athens fell 20-15 to Palestine in the non-district season opener. The first score came on a 20 -yard run by fullback Tommy Stutts, and David Burgamy's kick made it 7-0 with 10:51 to go in the second. Palestine retaliated immediately with a six-yard pass to the end zone. On their next possession the Wildcats surged 75 yards in seven plays for a 14-7 lead, but the Hornets came right back, driving to the 12 before they were stopped by the clock. In the second half Palestine made it 20-7 on a 46 -yard punt return. Athens grabbed the last TD of the night on a 12-yard pass from Burgamy to Lonnie Johnson. Fred Heath passed to Johnson for two, and the 20-15 score remained unchanged.

## Hornets mangle Bulldogs, 37-20

Chapel Hill toppled $37-20$ as Athens rolled up 519 yards offense in their second outing. First points came when DeWayne Chambers dropped the Bulldog QB for a safety. Twenty-one seconds later David Burgamy roared up the middle on a 54 -yard keeper to paydirt and kicked the extra point for a 9 0 lead. Chapel Hill scored on the next play and then gained the lead with a second TD. Early in the second the Hornets regained the lead for keeps as Fred Heath dashed over from six yards out. Burgamy nabbed the conversion pass from Mike Jett to make it 17-14. Late in the third quarter Halfback David Lawson rammed over from the two, and Burgamy's kick made it 24-14. Chapel Hill managed one more score; then Allen Loden blocked a Bulldog punt, and Heath landed on it in the end zone for the 6 -pointer. Two minutes later Lonnie Johnson collected a TD pass from Jett to set the score at 37-20.

 Hornet rampageAHS played circus with the Gladewater Bears as they romped to a 40-6 victory in a non-district bout September 24. Halfback David Lawson put Athens on the scoreboard first with a two-yard charge, followed by a three-yard scramble by Fred Heath for six more. A drive early in the second was climaxed as David Burgamy pitched out to Heath who then fired ten yards to Lawson in the end zone. Tommy Stutts powered 14 yards to the goal for a fourth TD before the Hornets allowed Gladewater their lone score on a 50 -yard pass play. Burgamy booted each of Athens' extra points. Heath racked up another six when he fell on a fumble in the end zone, and Lawson succeeded in his third bid for points on a oneyard push for the final score. Athens ended on top of the match 40 6.

Athens zonked North Garland with a 47-6 score and 646 offensive yards in a non-district clash. The first TD was called back on a clipping penalty after Denny Sims raced 73 yards to the end zone. Louis Blanton then scored on a short pass from QB David Burgamy who also kicked. The Raiders then produced their only touchdown, followed by a sensational 67-yard run by Burgamy. The kick was good for a 14-6 lead. Fred Heath gunned 22 yards for a TD, and minutes later, Devon Weatherford blasted in from the 31 to stretch the lead to 26-6. The next two scores came on a 31 -yard pass from Heath to Blanton, and a pass from Mike Jett to Blanton who again hit paydirt in a play covering 65 yards. Burgamy kicked both points, and the score showed 42-6. With seconds left, Charlie Harris hit home from four yards out, and Burgamy booted Athens into a 47-6 win.

Halfback Devon Weatherford scampered eleven yards early in the second for Athens' first points. The lead was extended to 14-0 in the third on a 10 -yard pass from David Burgamy to Lonnie Johnson, with Fred Heath passing to Johnson for the conversion. Weatherford then recovered a fumble and eleven plays later chalked up his second TD for a 21-0 lead. Marlin produced its only score on a 32yard pass play, followed by a fouryard trip into the end zone by Heath; Burg's kick made it 28-8. Mike Jett zipped a 15 -yarder to Louis Blanton who rolled into the end zone on the final buzzer, and Burg booted in the 35-8 victory.

Athens' first threat, a 63-yard run by Charlie Harris to the Indian seven, was cut short by a penalty, and the Athens punt was taken 66 yards to paydirt and an early 7-0 lead by the Indians. Denny Sims intercepted to set up the tying score, which came on a 48 -yard halfback pass from Fred Heath to Louis Blanton. The Hornets took the opening kickoff of the second half to paydirt in nine plays; Heath barged nine yards for the score, and Burgamy kicked. Harris intercepted on an Indian first-and-goal to end a major threat, and early in the fourth the Hornets wrapped up the scoring on a 14-yard pass from Heath to Lonnie Johnson in the end zone, with Burgamy's kick making it 21-7.

 "Terrellble" upsetThe Hornets were shaken 20-0 in the final non-district game of the season by Terrell's Tigers.

Terrell's first points came after they blocked a punt early in the second period. Athens followed with two threats, the first ending in a penalty, and the second being fumbled away on the 17. The Tigers intercepted to open the way for a 13-0 lead early in the fourth, but Carl Bass blocked the extra point attempt. The final TD came on a 31-yard run by Terrell's Avon Hicks. Athens took a 4-0 lead with a grandslam home run by Robert Duncan, but the Bears came back roaring and snatched an 11-5 victory.

The Hornets outhit Ennis 11-8; Denny Sims and Blanton each got three singles, Lambright got two, and Duncan, Glaspie, and Cain all took one each. In a clash with Waco Moore, the Hornets gave up ten bases on balls which spelled a 10 8 defeat by the Lions. LaVega ran the Hornets' district chart to 1-3 on April 21 as they handed Athens another defeat.

They bounced back into contention, however, by trouncing Waco Moore 9-6 in their next outing, with pitcher Paul McMullen taking the win. At one time the Pi rates were within one point of overtaking the Hornets, but Howard and Blanton each smashed a home run to assure Athens of the victory. A doubleheader at LaVega permanently buried title hopes for the Hornets. A 2-3 loss in the first game and a 1-7 loss in the second ended the Hornets' season with a 2-5 district record. ## Freshmen outshine varsity with trophies, awards

Varsity tracksters ran against stiff competition in '72. At the Ennis Relays, Athens tied for 13th place. DeWayne Chambers placed third in the high jump, Mark Wimberley was fifth in the 440, and Devon Weatherford was fifth in the 220. Pat Tart took first place in the high jump in the Dogwood Relays, as the team placed eighth. An eleventh place came in the Pine Tree meet; Tart broke an AHS record with a $6^{\prime \prime} 5^{\prime \prime}$ jump, but placed second to Mt. Pleasant's Gary Miracle. With only 24 points, Athens took sixth place in the Wildcat Relays, and Tart beat Miracle for first.
