After a heartbreaking 20-9 loss to Ennis, in a game which the Hornets led until the third quarter, students and exes danced to the fine sounds of the band, "Felix."

## Hornets fight Jacksonville

 to 6-6 tieThe 1973 season opener at Bruce field ended in a hard-fought 6-6 tie with the Jacksonville Indians.

Playing a mediocre first half, Athens lost five fumbles, failed to score from the Indian 22, gave up 201 yards rushing and a 65 -yard touchdown run.

The second half was a different story. A determined defense, led by Tommy Frizzle, Tommy Pennington and Randy Paris, stopped the Indians in their tracks enabling an inspired offensive unit to pick up some 200 yards.

In the third quarter Frizzle grabbed a fumbled punt setting up a 24 yard march to the endzone by C. J. Fairchild and Glen Rhinehart. That tied up score at 6-6 since both teams were unable to make the PAT.

The fourth period was a tight defensive battle with Athens staging a strong threat in the final minutes. QB Eddie Reynolds drove his squad to the Indian 23 with less than two minutes remaining, but time ran out on the 14.

## Hornets edge

 past Chapel Hill BulldogsIn their second game of the season the Hornets won a 13-6 decision over Chapel Hill.

Linebacker Tommy Frizzel intercepted a Bulldog pass in the first quarter to set up an early 7-0 lead for the Hornets. A 22-yard field goal try in the second quarter was wide to the right.

Chapel Hill posed serious threats in the second and third periods but was unable to penetrate the defense of Frizzel, Wayne Perkins, Tommy Pennington, Randy Paris and others.

With eight minutes left in the game QB Eddie Reynolds hit senior end Sammy Scott with two consecutive passes for Athens' second TD and a 13-0 lead.

The Bulldogs did not give up but combined a fumble recovery, a halfback pass and some fancy footwork to move 30 yards for their one score of the evening.

## Bears stun Hornets in 33-6 defeat

If ever a team had an "off night" the Hornets had one September 21. Ineffective execution by both offense and defense resulted in a nightmare of frustration as the Hornets fell 33-6 to the fired-up Gladewater Bears.

Athens gained only 84 yards, completed none of four pass attempts, lost seven of eight fumbles and were intercepted twice.

With only six minutes gone in the first quarter, Gladewater was already leading 14-0.

The Bears fumbled seven times, one of which resulted in Athen's only score of the evening. Keith Barker was responsible for recovering the fumble, and Dale Johnson scored on fourth-and-five.

Gladewater scored twice more in the second quarter leaving Hornet followers stunned 27-6 at halftime.

The final points came in the fourth period as the Bears went ahead 336 and put in their reserves to finish the contest.

## Hornets crush Dragons in offensive show

Rebounding from a humiliating defeat the week before, Athens ran all over Seagoville scoring 62 points and posting 400 total yards gained.

Nine TD's were credited to Darrell Allen, Glenn Rhinehart, Ken Griffin, Wayne Perkins, Eddie Reynolds, Sammy Scott and Mike Johnson; junior William Johnson kicked six extra points.

Hornet defenders intercepted the Dragons five times, recovered two fumbles, blocked three punts and scored a safety by Earl Brooks.

Leading rushers were Rhinehart with 91 yards, Griffin with 80 and Allen with 71.

The 62-6 victory, a record-setter for Coach Joe Crousen, put the Hornets 2-1-1 for the season.

## Tigers upset Hornets 20-18

Athens and arch-rival Terrell staged a 45-minute war with plenty of excitement for both sides October 5.

The Tigers scored first moving 15 yards in six plays with 8:20 left in the first period. The Hornets retaliated moving 69 yards in only three plays following an interception by Steve Stacks. The TD came on a 43 yard romp by Glen Rhinehart which tied the score at 6-6. Athens went ahead as Sammy Scott took a slant pass from Eddie Reynolds, but the try for two failed, and it was a 12-6 ball game at the half.

The Tigers regained the lead after a fumble recovery on the Hornet 30. Sylvester Holmes rolled in from the six to give the Tigers a 13-12 lead.

Athens' final score came on a charge by Ken Griffin from the five. Again the try for two failed, and the score stood 18-12.

In the closing minutes of play, the Tigers moved 88 yards in 17 plays to score with only 19 seconds remaining, handing the Hornets a heartbreaking 20-18 defeat.

 antagonize Marlin 41-0Athens routed the Marlin Bulldogs $41-0$ in a district game totally dominated by the Hornets.

Passing and ground rushing totaled 434 yards with four of the six touchdowns coming as a result of a passing attack. QB Eddie Reynolds hit Sam Scott three times for TD plays of 38,11 and 8 yards. The fourth TD originated out of a halfback option from Wayne Perkins to Steve Stacks.

An explosive offense rallied for two more touchdowns coming on an 85 -yard breakaway by senior halfback Glenn Rhinehart and a 15-yard brutal run by junior halfback C. J. Fairchild. Fairchild also booted three for three in the extra point department, and William Johnson was two for three.

## Hornets rip off

## Pirates, 49-7

Athens invaded the Pirates' ship determined for victory, blasting 31 points in the first quarter.

Glen Rhinehart and Ken Griffin led the scoring act with two TD's each; followed by Eddie Reynolds, C. J. Fairchild, Wade Farmer and Randy Paris (returning a blocked punt) with one TD each.

LaVega's lone touchdown came as QB Tom Fuller dove in from the one in the fourth period. The Pirates were limited to a total of 151 yards by a rugged Hornet defense.

Hornet scoring began with a 15 yard romp for six by Rhinehart in the first period and ended with a 3 -yard bulldozer act by Fairchild in the final period. In all, the Hornets rolled up 435 yards, 432 by land and 43 by air, all of which contributed to a 49 7 Hornet victory.

Ten yards was all that separated the fired-up Hornets from taking the Homecoming victory, but an intercepted pitchout in the third quarter gave the Lions a lead which wasn't to be relinquished. The big break came when Louis Bullins intercepted an Eddie Reynolds pitchout and returned it 90 yards for the score to go ahead 13-9.

Hornet C. J. Fairchild had previously scored from the one after an Ennis fumble on the eight, and Athens took a 9-7 lead with 4:35 to go in the first half when Randy Paris and Wade Farmer trapped James Harper for a safety.

Ennis' last score came as Harper hit Stanley Robinson on a 33-yard halfback pass to cap a 20-9 Hornet defeat.

The Moore Lions took a powerful 17-0 lead in the first half and stifled a comeback staged by the Hornets in the second half.

After the intermission the Hornets came out with fire in their eyes as they moved 97 yards in 9 plays and scored on a Glenn Rhinehart pass to Sam Scott with 8:18 left in the third period. Tommy Frizzell set up Athens' next TD by way of an interception. Two plays later C. J. Fairchild blasted in from 12 yards out to narrow the Lion lead to 17-12.

In the fourth quarter the Hornets put pressure on the South Zone champions but were unable to keep them from scoring once more and clinching a 24-12 win.
