## Literature Stressed In

## Classes

Literature, grammar, and compositions were among the English requirements at Athens High School.

Three teachers, Mrs. Agatha Warren, Mrs. Elaine Sapp, and Mrs. Linda Woodfin were added this year to the staff making a total of seven English teachers and twenty-nine classes.

Seniors were instructed in English literature including works by William Shakespeare, and they worked several weeks on the ever traditional research theme. Juniors were taught American literature, grammar, and the grueling art of writing the research theme. Sophomores and Freshmen were trained in grammar and selections from American and English literature.

Logarithms get some challenge from Candy Pennington, George Ackerman and Cheryl Johnson in Mrs. Dianne Locke's fourth period Algebra ll class.

## Law, Number Operations Explored

Logarithms, theorems, percents, base numbers and calculus were among the areas of math calculated by students of AHS.

Subjects offered included Related Math, Geometry, Algebra and Advanced Math. Six quarter-units in math were required for graduation.

The exploration of the world of DNA molecules, cells, atoms, and scientific laws was conducted by students in Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry and Physics.

Students learned the operation of scientific laws through controlled experiments in the lab, while in class they became acquainted with atoms, learned about the Earth's structure, and applied scientific laws to equations. Science teachers new to AHS were Mr. Henry Hamilton and Mr. Terry Parker.

## Electives Complete Curriculum

## Finally A Win <br> Over Ennis

In a game that kept fans on the edge of their seats, Athens kicked out a 3-0 victory over arch-rival Ennis to open the 1974 season.

Penalties plagued Athens throughout the game and slowed down the Hornets' offensive drive. The most costly penalty was an ille-gal-receiver-downfield call that nullified a 45 -yard halfback pass from Ken Griffin to Terry Bowman in the fourth quarter.

Early in the fourth period Ennis fumbled on a punt return, and the loose ball was picked up by William Turk and returned to the Lion 27. C.J. Fairchild then ran up the middle for 23 yards before being brought down at the four yard line. With 2:16 left on the clock Joe Dan Perkins came in and kicked the winning 26 -yard field goal, giving Athens their first victory over Ennis since 1967.

## Lead Shrivels Into Tie

Fans saw a first quarter thriller against Richardson Berkner but were disappointed in the second quarter as the Rams came to life and the Hornets had to settle for a 6-6 tie.

On their first possession the Hornets moved 68 yards to the end zone. Junior tailback Ken Griffin scored the six points, and Joe Dan Perkins' kick was wide.

Berkner scored from the four yard line, in the second quarter, on a fake field goal as Hornet defenders stood by helpless in block formation. Berkner's kick was also wide, and the score stood '6-6 at the half.

In the second half, Athens had chances to pull ahead, but two interceptions, a costly penalty, and a fumbled hand-off spoiled the Hornets' chance for their second win of the young season.

## Mistakes Cause <br> First Loss

In one of the sloppiest games of the season, the Henderson Lions outlasted the Hornets, 13-0.

The maroon defense played well as it gave the offense the ball twice in the first quarter in Lion territory, first on the 45 and then on the 36. Athens moved to the 16, but was stopped, and William Johnson's field goal attempt was wide. On the second fumble recovery by the defense, the Hornets could get no closer than the 27-yard line.

Late in the second quarter Lion quarterback Arthur Tatum found David Ballenger in the end zone and Ricky Williams tacked on the PAT for a 7-0 Henderson lead.

In the second half the Hornets could do nothing right, and Henderson added their final score late in the third stanza on a long pass from Tatum to Larry Christian. Williams' kick was not good, but the Lions held on to win, 13-0.

Finding a hole in the Henderson line is Ken Griffin (44), and he makes good use of it as he moves 13 yards closer to the goal line.

## Kaufman

 Shut Out 27-0The Kaufman Lions who went on to a AA district title were held to only five first downs as AHS took an easy 27-0 win.

The Hornets capitalized on a roughing-the-kicker penalty in the first quarter, taking over on the Lion 37. From there Keith Barker and C. J. Fairchild moved in for the score and Joe Dan Perkins' kick gave Athens a 7-0 lead.

Wayne Perkins blocked a Lion punt giving Athens possession on the Kaufman 26. Barker and Fairchild again got the call, and Fairchild collected his second TD of the evening.

Late in the half second-string QB Wade Farmer directed the Hornets to their third score. The points came on a lateral from Farmer to Ken Griffin, and Perkins' kick gave Athens a 20-0 halftime lead.

Athens' final score came late in the fourth quarter. Barker collected a long pass from backup QB Ricky Hardin for six, and William Johnson booted the extra point. The 27-0 win brought the season record to 2-1-1.

In their fifth game of the season Athens pounded out a $27-0$ victory over the winless Kilgore Bulldogs.

The first half saw sputtering offenses and a 0-0 halftime score, but the Hornets got things rolling on their second possession in the third quarter when they moved the ball 72 yards and scored on a 16-yard pass from Eddie Reynolds to Keith Barker. On the next Hornet possession C. J. Fairchild crossed the goal to cap a 50 -yard offensive attack. Joe Dan Perkins' PAT made the score 13-0.

Wayne Perkins' recovery of a Bulldog fumble late in the third quarter paved the way for a third Hornet TD, a halfback pass from Ken Griffin to Steve Stacks. Perkins' kick was good, giving Athens a 20-0 lead.

Midway through the 4th Stacks blocked a Bulldog punt on the Kilgore 18, and Michael Johnson carried the ball from there for the final score. Perkins' PAT gave the Hornets an indisputable $27-0$ victory.

## Offense Shines 28-0

The Hornets experienced a miserable first quarter, but came back in the final three sessions to blank Bishop Lynch of Dallas, 28-0.

It looked as if it was going to be a long night in the initial quarter as the Hornets fumbled the ball away twice to the Friars. But in the second quarter, Ken Griffin took the ball eight yards to paydirt, and Joe Dan Perkins kicked the extra point, the first of four consecutive PAT's, and Athens owned the scoreboard, 7-0.

A rough Hornet defense gave the ball back to the offense, and the Hornets drove 72 yards to score on Eddie Reynolds' pass to Steve Stacks from the 22 -yard line. Perkins' kick was good and Athens led 14-0 with 1:39 left in the half.
C. J. Fairchild put up 6 more for the Hornets early in the second half after Jasper Davis had recovered the pigskin on a fumbled punt on the Friar 21-yard line. Perkins made it 21-0 with 6:12 left in the third.

Don Foster iced the game with 46 seconds left on a 4 -yard quarterback sneak. Perkins' PAT was true and the score was 28-0, Athens.

## Whew! Defense Holds

The Hornets got two gifts in the same package on Oct. 18 when they won their first zone game and also their homecoming match with the Chapel Hill Bulldogs, 18-13.

Athens took an early 12-0 lead when Tommy Frizzell intercepted a Bulldog pass on the visitors' 33, setting up an Eddie Reynolds heave to Steve Stacks for the first TD. After C. J. Fairchild intercepted another Bulldog pass, Reynolds found Stacks again all alone for a 16 -yard scoring strike. Joe Dan Perkins missed the PAT for the second time and Athens led 12-0, with 3:30 to go in the half.

Chapel Hill was not out of it though, as they went on the board with 4 seconds left in the half, to make the score 12-6.

On the Bulldogs' first possession of the second half they marched 61 yards to go ahead 13-12, making Hornet homecoming fans a bit nervous.

But the Hornets were not through either. In only nine plays Athens was on the board again, on a Ken Griffin 19 -yard ramble. Reynolds' try for two was no good, but the Hornet defense stopped the Bulldogs cold the rest of the game to bring their season record to 5-1-1 and their district slate to 1-0.

## Offense Collects 6 TD's

Athens hounded the Crockett Bulldogs throughout the game, handing them an embarrassing 41-12 defeat.

At first, things looked grim for Athens as the Bulldogs turned a Hornet fumble into a quick six points within the first minute of play. But the Hornets snapped back with a 7 . 6 lead when C. J. Fairchild darted over the goal line to top off an 80yard offensive drive with 7:00 still left in the first quarter.

The early part of the second period saw Ken Griffin cross the goal from the seven, and Joe Dan Perkins' PAT widened the Hornet lead to 14-6. Griffin then dazzled everyone with a spectacular 63-yard journey to the end zone. William Johnson tacked on the extra point to give Athens a 21-6 lead. The Maroon Machine scored again on their next possession as Michael Johnson dodged tackles for 35 yards to increase the Hornet lead. Late in the half Steve Stacks picked off a Bulldog pass to secure Athens a 28-6 halftime lead.

Michael Johnson racked up six more points in the third quarter to complement a 42 -yard attack. William Johnson again popped the ball through the uprights for the extra point. Crockett was able to sneak a second TD past the Hornets, but a Bulldog fumble recovered by Randy Paris set up a sixth TD by Curtis Jackson, giving Athens an impressive 41-12 victory.

The next Hornet drive looked good as Athens was able to push to the Indian 17 before J'ville refused to allow any more. William Johnson's 20 -yard field goal attempt failed, and J'ville held on to their lead. The Hornets were able to stop the next Indian drive only to fumble the ball, which was picked up and turned into a second touchdown by a J'ville defender. ## Season Ends In Defeat

All Hornet hopes of a second place standing in district were snuffed out in the heartbreaking season finale as the Palestine Wildcats upended the Hornets, 14-3.

Breaks were the name of the game as the Athens offense had one of its best nights statistically, and the Hornet defense held the Wildcats to very few yards. Wild running by senior C. J. Fairchild and junior Ken Griffin, who both gained over 100 yards, wasn't enough to turn the trick.

The Hornets came out fighting and used up most of the first quarter clock driving from their own 25 to the Wildcat 18. There Joe Dan Perkins kicked a 35 -yard field goal to put the Hornets on the scoreboard 3-0 with 1:26 left in the initial period.

A brick-wall defense stopped Palestine cold just inches from paydirt in the second quarter. Seconds later the Hornets recovered a fumble on the Palestine 30 but could not capitalize on the recovery.

## President

As a result of the continuing Watergate investigation, President Richard Nixon resigned in late August, and Vice President Gerald Ford, a Nixon appointee, was inaugurated as president. Nelson Rockefeller was named vice president by Ford and was approved by Congress in December.

Watergate and its revelations caused the public to question the credibility of many officials. The Kennedy assassination, dormant for 12 years, was regenerated in the minds of many, and there were calls for an investigation of the CIA, FBI and the Warren Commission. Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's diplomatic power lessened as a result of Watergate and a conflict with the new administration.

The U.S. had to reassess its Middle Eastern foreign policy due to the assassination of King Faisal of Saudi Arabia. Faisal was considered America's greatest ally among the Arab nations.
U.S. troops were withdrawn from Vietnam after nearly 20 years, and refugees flooded into countries of the free world.

Despite its many problems, the U.S. began to make plans for its Bicentennial celebration in 1976.

In sports the Pittsburgh Steelers won Super Bowl IX, and the Oakland A's took their third straight World Series championship. The Golden State Warriors captured their first NBA title, overcoming the highly favored Capitol Bullets in four straight games.
