## Bobcats <br> Burned,



The season opener saw the Jacksonville Indians disgrace the Hornets 18-0. Jacksonville's first possession accounted for 6 by way of an 11 play, 67 yard drive. At the end of the second quarter the Indians were 6 points richer with a halftime lead of $12-0$. Jacksonville nixed Athens' attempts to capitalize on eight Indian fumbles and put another six on the board. Athens threatened twice in the fourth on two fumble recoveries by Johnny Vandiver. Ken Session supplied the total offense of 75 yards, including four catches for 44 and 11 carries for 31 .

The second game of the season established Athens in the win column as they defeated Hallvilles' Bobcats $17-0$. Athens 329 yards total offense was impressive to Hallville's 94. Athens' first score resulted from a 34 yard field goal by Joe Dan Perkins. Later in the third, Steve Gideon blocked a Bobcat punt. Nine plays and 55 yards later Athens led 10-0.

A fourth quarter fumble recovery by Roy Andrews set up the Hornets' final touchdown drive. Again the magic number was nine with James Johnson scoring on the final play from five yards out.

## Victories Elude Hornets

Pine Tree overcame the Hornets in the second half to the tune of a 23-15 win. A Pine Tree fumble opened the door to Athens' first score by way of Ken Session. The Hornets later grabbed a 12-0 half time lead when quarterback Ricky Hardin took it in from the one.

The second half spelled doom for the Hornets, however. The Pirates scored on their first three possessions and finally on a safety. Athens' final score resulted from a 34 yd., field goal by Joe Dan Perkins.

Jon Ramsey recovered a Henderson fumble on the second play of the game to set up Athens first score, an eleven yard run by Freddie Paul.

Early in 3rd the Lions tied it up $7-7$ and shortly afterward went ahead 14-7. The ''Hornet Machine" was not to be stopped, however. Ken Sessions blasted the ensuing kickoff 88 yds. Joe Dan Perkins' kick sealed the game at 14-14.

## Wins

Kilgore's Bulldogs scored in the middle of the 1 st quarter and took a 2 -point conversion after a Hornet offsides penalty.

With almost two minutes left in the first quarter the Hornets blasted 60 yards in 5 plays. Quarterback Ricky Hardin drove it in from the one. The 2 -point try by the Hornets fell short leaving Athens behind 8-6. Kilgore's explosiveness gained them another TD on a 49 yard pass play. With 2:12 remaining in the half the Bulldogs led 15-6.

A 51 yard drive in the middle of the 3rd quarter gave the Hornets their final score. James Johnson accounted for 28 of the 51 yards and 6 of the 7 points. Joe Dan Perkins' PAT narrowed the gap to $15-13$. Kilgore with about $81 / 2$ minutes left in the game, tacked on a final 7, for a 21-13 finale.

The Hornets overwhelmed the Roughriders in a unique scoring exhibition, a total of 79 points were amassed that night with the Hornets accounting for 49 of them. Elbridge Davis led the scoring with 18 for the night, Ken Session 12, Mike Leonard 8 , Jody Lemons 6, Joe Dan Perkins 3, and Stan Hill 2 points. Quarterback Ricky Hardin completed 11 of 20 passes in leading the Hornets to their 49-30 win over Center and a total offense of 402 yards.

## Battles Prove Futile

Fumbles and pass interceptions helped Crockett to a 21-14 win over Athens. The Bulldogs' first six came as a result of a Hornet fumble in the first period. Crockett then picked off a Hornet pass and promptly moved downfield for 8 more.
A Bulldog fumble was recovered by Trey Dyer 2 yards out of the endzone. Ken Session charged two yards to decrease the Bulldog lead to 14-6. Mike Leonard set up the Hornets' second score when he intercepted a pass. Session got the ball again and the score was tied 14-14.
Following a last ditch effort by the Hornets the Bulldogs needed only 3 plays to set the final score at 21-14.
Athens was unable to score at all and mustered a mere 53 yards total offense. Palestine scored on drives of $90,4,49$ and 73 yards, running up 367 yards total offense and a 19-0 victory.
Although the score indicated otherwise, fine efforts were turned in by Hornet defenders Steve Andrews, Drew Douglas, Steve Gideon, Joe Dan Perkins, Daniel Williams and Steve Roberts. Also outstanding was Gary Bristow's punting which held a 47.1 yard average for the night.

## Bulldogs Blasted

 TwiceA 70 yard punt return by Hornet Ken Session gave Athens the first 6 of the night in defeating Chapel Hill's Bulldogs 26-12. A 23 yard strike from Ricky Hardin to Mike Leonard gave the Hornets their next score early in the third. Session and Hardin gave the Hornets their final points with each scoring 6 and 8 respectively. Session's 134 yards put him at the 1023 yard mark for the season with one game remaining.

The Hornets shone brightly in the season's final game defeating the Bulldogs of Carthage 31-14. An outstanding effort was turned in by the entire team, but Ken Session's was the most brilliant. Session rushed for three touchdowns and 270 yards setting a school rushing record of 1293 yards for the season. Also noticeable were quarterback Ricky Hardin's 79 yards of offense and one touchdown and Joe Dan Perkin's 32 yard field goal and four straight extra points.

Air conditioning provides lots of comfort during the summer months, but for many thousands of homeowners it is also the biggest factor in the cost of electricity. On the average, air conditioning accounts for about half of summertime electric bills.
Here are ways you can hold down the cost of air conditioning and still enjoy its comfort.

## Central Systems

1. Set thermostat on $78^{\circ}$, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP\&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

## Window Units

Follow above suggestions, plus these:
11. Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.
Conserve electricity and you help conserve one or more of the fuels needed to produce it. Conserve fuels and you help assure that there will be enough to meet essential needs for electricity in the future.

Democrat Jimmy Carter, former Governor of Georgia, was inaugurated President of the United States in January. The 39th President pardoned Vietnam draft evaders and cancelled funding of the B-1 bomber.

In Utah, Gary Gilmore was executed by firing squad, the first person to receive the death penalty in the U.S. since 1967.

Watergate remained in the news, with former President Richard Nixon granting televised interviews with British journalist David Frost. Former Attorney General John Mitchell and Presidential Advisor Bob Haldeman began serving prison terms for their involvement in the scandal.

Great Britain celebrated the Silver Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II, who has reigned since the death of King George VI in 1952.

In Spain voters opted for a return to democracy in their first free election in 41 years.

Texas Governor Dolph Briscoe called a special session for July, after the Legislature failed, in the regular session, to find a method to finance the educational system.

Oakland beat Minnesota in Super Bowl XI; the National Basketball championship went to the Portland Trailblazers; and Cincinnati took the World Series for the second straight year. In thoroughbred racing, Seattle Slew became the 10th colt in history to win the Triple Crown.
