## J'ville Jinx Broken

A tenacious defensive line held Jacksonville to a total of 48 yards rushing and turned in dozens of heroic plays, giving the Hornets their first victory over the Indians since 1972.

Jim Jezek scored in the first quarter when the J'ville punter fumbled in the end zone. The PAT, which was the winning point, was kicked by Robert Bandy.

With less than four minutes left to play, the Indians got their first TD and tried for 2. The perfect pass was batted away by Stan Hill, preserving a 7.6 score.

In the second game of the season, the offensive unit came alive with 300 yards gained and four TD's trouncing the Hallsville Bobcats 27-6.

The Bobcats were no match for the fired-up Hornets, and the score would have been even more lopsided except for penalties. The Hornets were charged with 12 penalties, costing them 112 yards.

Hornet scores were credited to Charles Wigley, Darryl Dunnington, Trey Dyer and James Johnson. Bandy made four out of five PAT attempts.

## Penalties Blamed for Two Losses

Disaster in the last quarter robbed the Hornets of victory over fifth ranked Pine Tree. The Pirates had to come from behind to overcome the determined Hornets 20-14.

Athens' scores came on a 79 . yard keeper in the first quarter and a short burst up the middle both by QB Charles Wigley.

Both teams had touchdowns called back in the third. Jimmy Hatfield took the second half kickoff 84 yards only to have it exed out for clipping, and the same thing happened to Darryl Dunnington on an 85 yard punt return.

In the last quarter, scoring drives of 70 and 49 yards, a pass interception and more penalties against the Hornets resulted in the go-ahead for Pine Tree

Despite some strong drives and exceptional defensive play, penalties cost the Hornets another game, this time to Henderson.

Eleven violations totaled 114 yards and wiped out several good gains and field positions.

The Lions' one TD came in the second quarter on an 81 yard drive. The Hornets made several serious threats, but none turned into points. Tracy Lemons recovered a fumble on the nine; a bobbled Lion punt was claimed by James Johnson on the 35, Ricky Wright recovered a Henderson fumble which several plays later ended up on the Lion 28. It was a night when few things went right. Tempers flared among players, coaches, and fans as many felt the officiating was below par. The 7.0 upset left the Hornets with a 2.2 record.

## Kilgore Falls at Homecoming

A Homecoming crowd of 4000 saw the Hornets come from behind to beat the highly regarded Kilgore Bulldogs 10-7.
Kilgore took advantage of a Hornet fumble in the second period and went ahead 7.0.
Moments later Tracy Lemons grabbed an interception which led to a field goal with 30 seconds left in the half. JV regular Terry Stout booted the 31 -yard three-pointer.

QB Robert Bandy took the Hornets 80 yards in six plays, culminating in a 29 -yard TD pass to Brady Pennington. With 8:53 remaining and the board showing a 10.7 lead, the Hornet defense held off a strong effort by the Bulldogs. The win upped the record to 3-2.
Sixteen punts punctuated a low-scoring contest against Center. The Hornet offense, sparked by Bandy, Charles Wigley, James Johnson, Pennington and Darryl Dunnington rolled up 234 yards. But it was the defensive unit that held the Roughriders to 87 yards, intercepted a pass, recovered a fumble and scored a touchdown.

In the third quarter Cash Burch blocked a punt which fell in the end zone and was recovered by Ray Cumby. The PAT was nullified by a holding violation - one of ten penalties - and the second try failed, giving the Hornets a 6.0 lead which was enough to preserve the win.

## Wildcats Close in on Championship

In spite of tremendous defensive efforts by the Hornets, Palestine took a close 15.11 victory which left them within a step of the district championship.

In the second quarter Wildcat QB Michael Scott scored from one yard out on a fourth down play. A fake kick gave the Cats an 8.0 lead. In the final minutes of the half Dunnington, Bandy, Ricky Hill, and Wigley moved the ball to the Palestine 16 , setting up a 34 -yard boot by Terry Stout. The half ended 3-8.
Athens moved 54 yards in 13 plays on their third possession of the third quarter. At the Wildcat 5, a fake field goal attempt turned into a TD pass from Wigley to Trey Dyer. A Bandy-to-Hill pass gave the Hornets an 11.8 lead.

Palestine came right back in the fourth, scoring seven more and holding that 15.11 lead till the final buzzer.

AHS overwhelmed the Crockett Bulldogs by a lopsided 21.0 score, 335 yards gained and 23 first downs.
Fullback Tommy Weaver made the first score on a fourth-andone situation in the second quarter. Others who carried on that series of downs were Darryl Dunnington and Charles Wigley.

Although the Hornets controlled the game, they were unable to score again until the fourth quarter. Stan Hill intercepted two passes, and Steve Andrews recovered a Bulldog fumble. Robert Bandy made the TD from one yard out. Hill's second interception led to the third score, an 11 yard run by Cash Burch. Bandy kicked all three extra points.

## Chapel Hill Walks Away 30-1 1

The enthusiastic Chapel Hill bunch stopped Athens in the ninth game of the season. Chapel Hill's hard nosed defense and assaulting offense left Athens with a 30-11 defeat.

The first score came as Chapel Hill roared 67 yards in six plays, with a two point conversion they led 8-0. The Bulldogs scored again making the score 16.0 . Late in the second quarter Terry Stout booted a 32 -yard field goal making things look hopeful.

The defense really moved out after the Bulldogs with Danny Chaney tackling a Bulldog running back in the end zone for a safety. A Bandy-to-Dunnington pass set up a two-yard run by Charles Wigley for the only other score for the Hornets. Chapel Hill rolled again and again in the third and fourth quarters taking a $30-11$ victory.

In the last game of the season the Hornets failed to please as they fell to Carthage 33-6. Robert Bandy hit 7 of 19 for 82 yards. The only score Athens achieved came on an 80 -yard march which looked to end up a field goal, but Wigley, holding for Stout, picked up the ball and tossed to Ricky Hill for six points.

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## Central Systems

1. Set thermostat on $78^{\circ}$, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP\&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

## Window Units

Follow above suggestions, plus these:
11. Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.
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## Middle East Peace Talks Begin

In the United States over 165,000 coal miners went on strike for a seemingly eternal time. Congress finally sent them back to work via the Taft-Hartley Act. After much heated debate the country voted to give custody of the Panama Canal to Panama by the year 2000 .
The most severe winter on record caused schools and factories to close across the nation.

Egyptian President Anwar Sadat and Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin began peace talks hoping to end war in the Middle East.
Several entertainers died this past year. Among them were comedians Charlie Chaplin and Groucho Marx, singers Bing Crosby and Elvis Presley, and band leader Guy Lombardo.

In sports the New York Yankees captured the World Series with Reggie Jackson setting a new record for most home runs in a Series, five. The Dallas Cowboys crushed the Denver Broncos, $27-10$ ir Super Bowl XII for their second world championship. 18 year old jockey Steve Cauthen rode his mounts to over $\$ 6,000,000$ in prize money, winning over 487 races in 1977. South African golfer Gary Player won the Masters, shooting a 65 under par in the final round of the tourney. Newcomer Leon Spinks halted Muhammed Ali's reign as world heavyweight champion winning a 15 round battle by decision.
