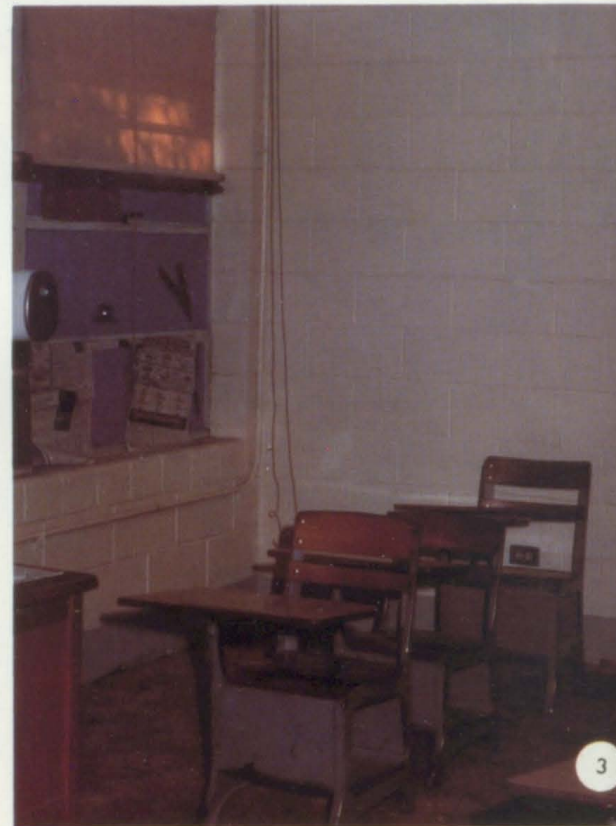

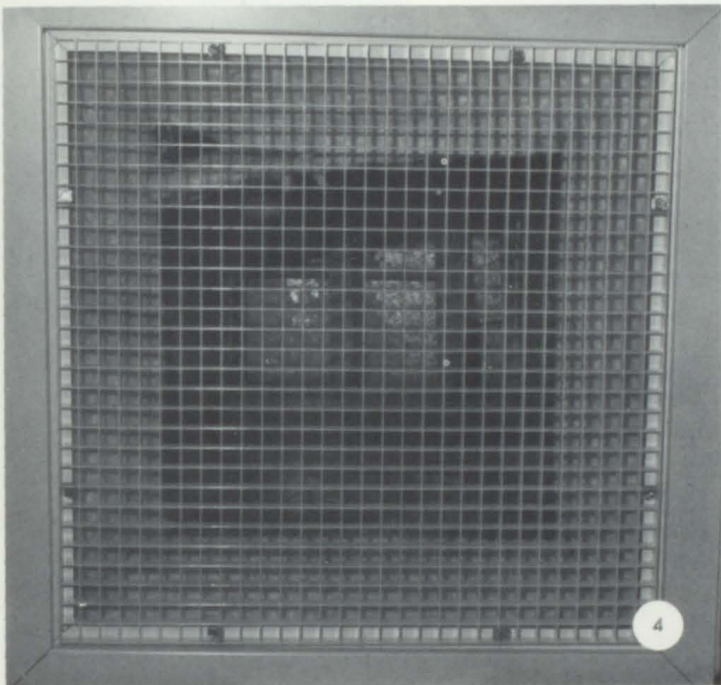

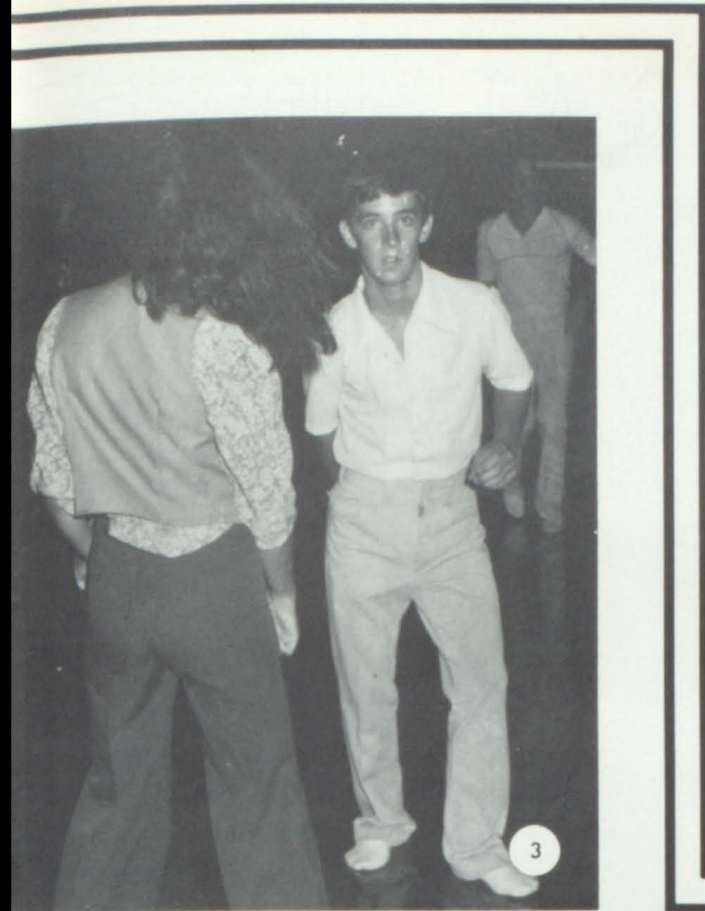

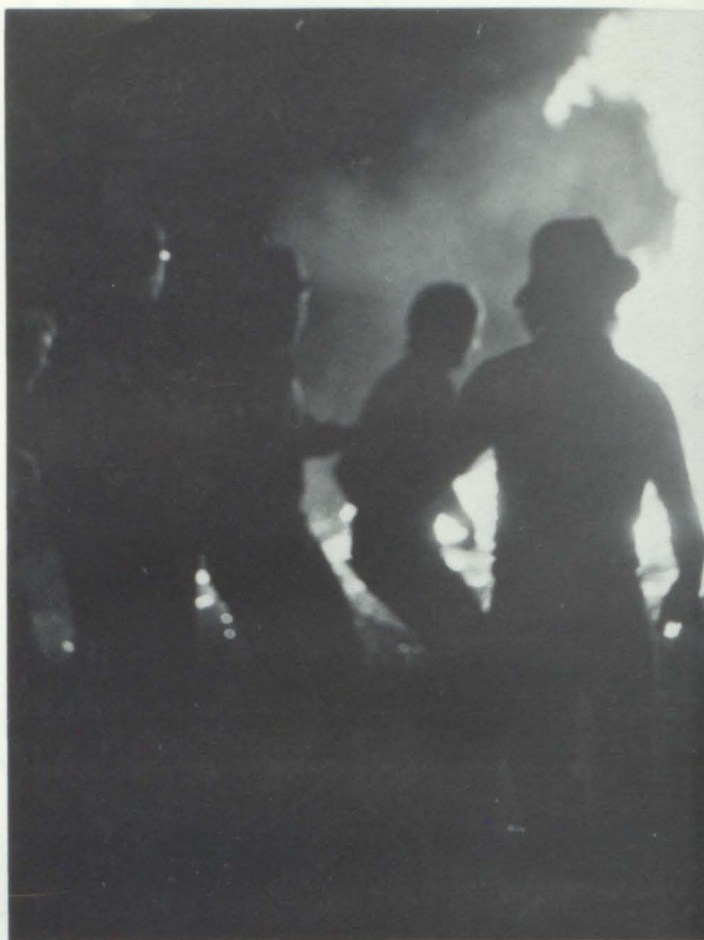

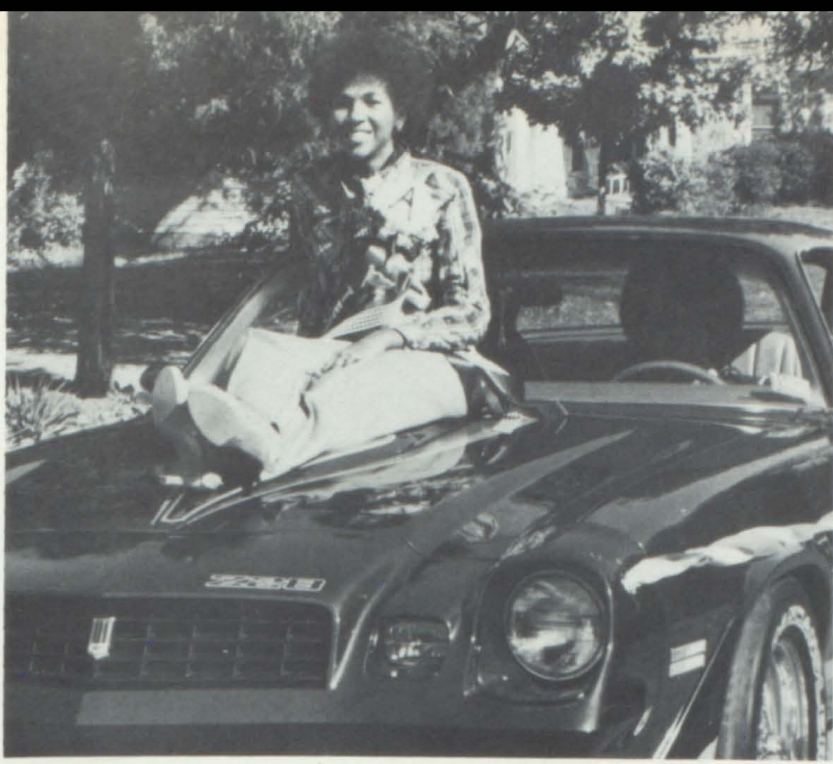
Although the Hornets lost to Kilgore 13-3, fans enjoyed the Homecoming dance, following the game, at the HCJC Sub.

Follies' master of ceremonies was Mr. Dan Middleton, and the follies was highlighted by a surprise performance by five ex-band members.

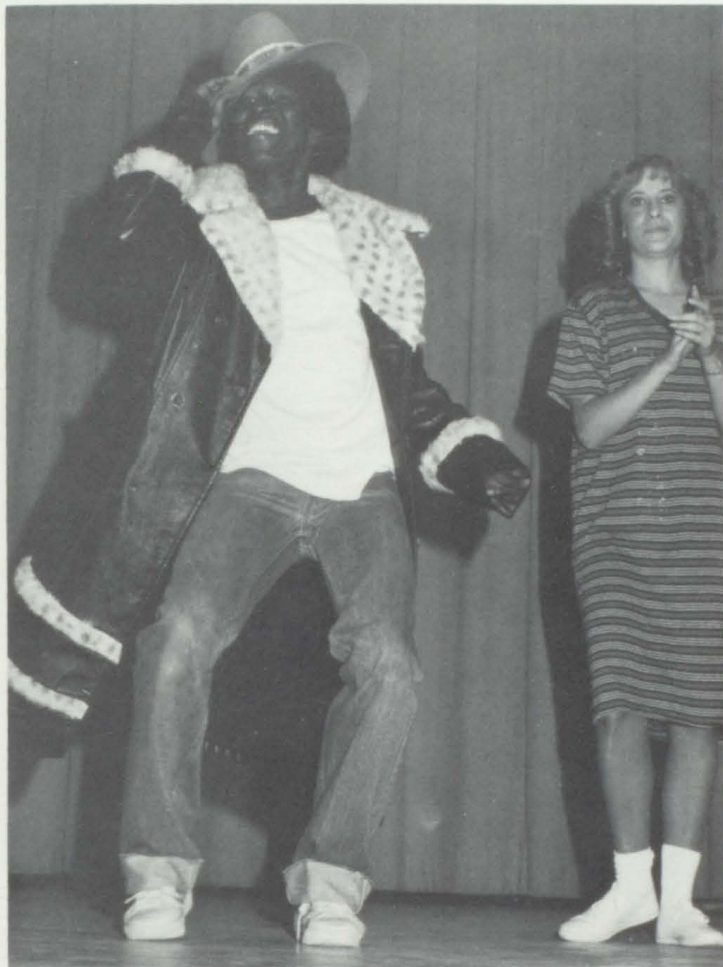

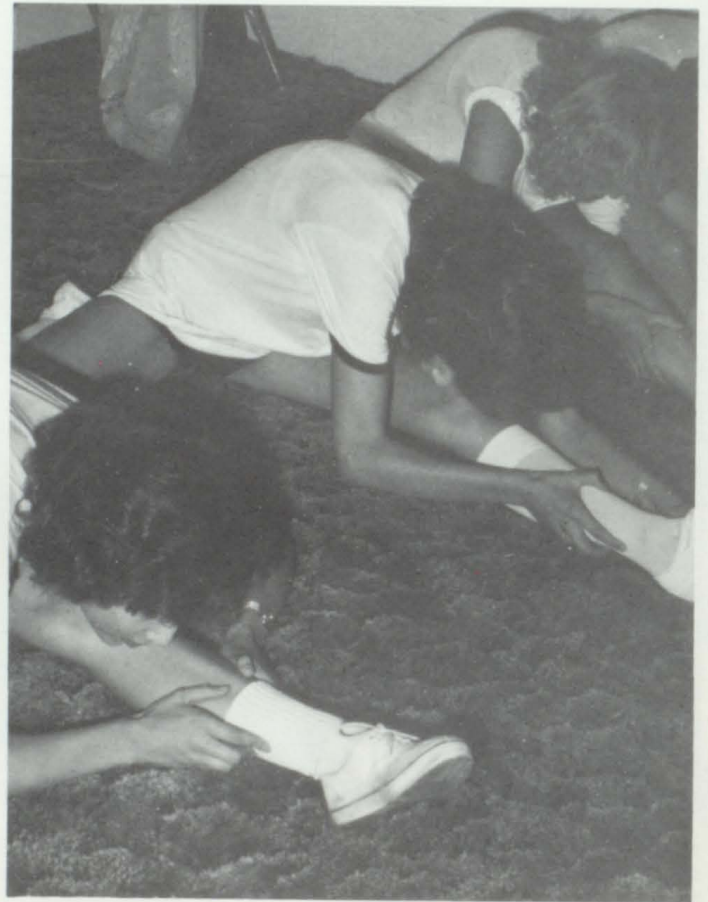
## 'Double Vision' Hits Campus

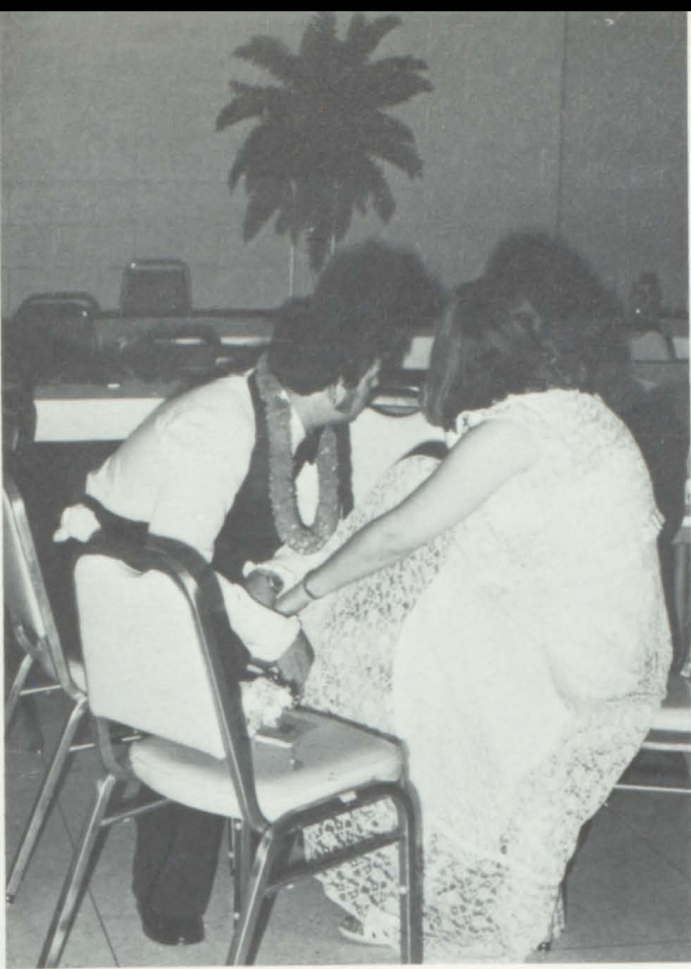

After years of endless complaints by young people of no recreational facilities in "Big A", some industrious businessmen invested time and money in a solution to this miserable problem.

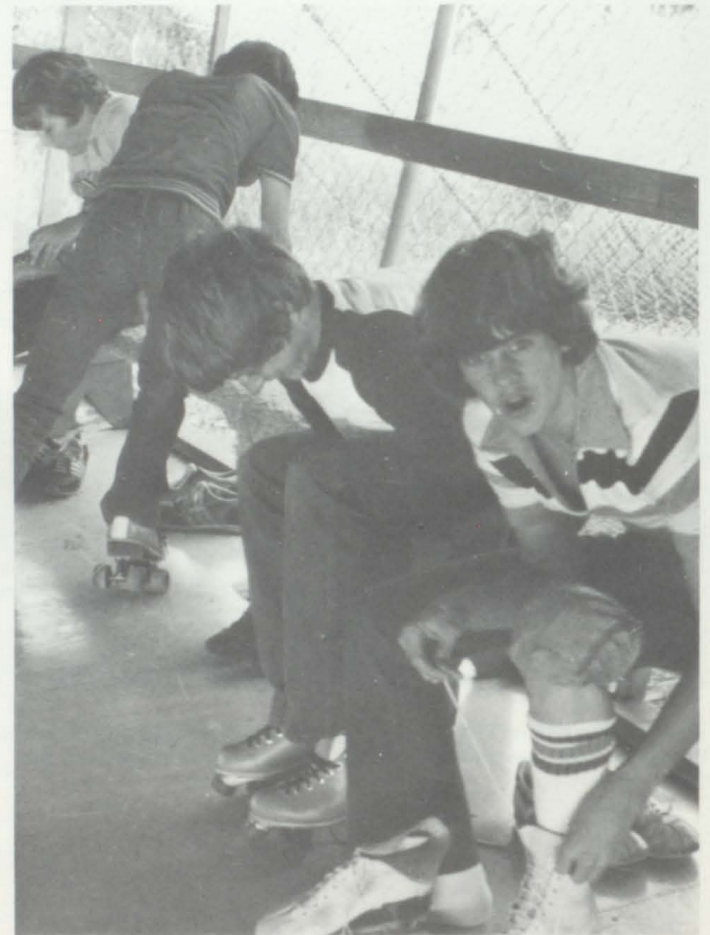
Investments paid off in the form of the "Roll'em Skate Rink" and the funfilled "Putter Golf" park.

It appears everyone's happy, the owners for a successful business, the students for a good time, and the U.S. department of energy for the gas saved from wasteful "riding around."

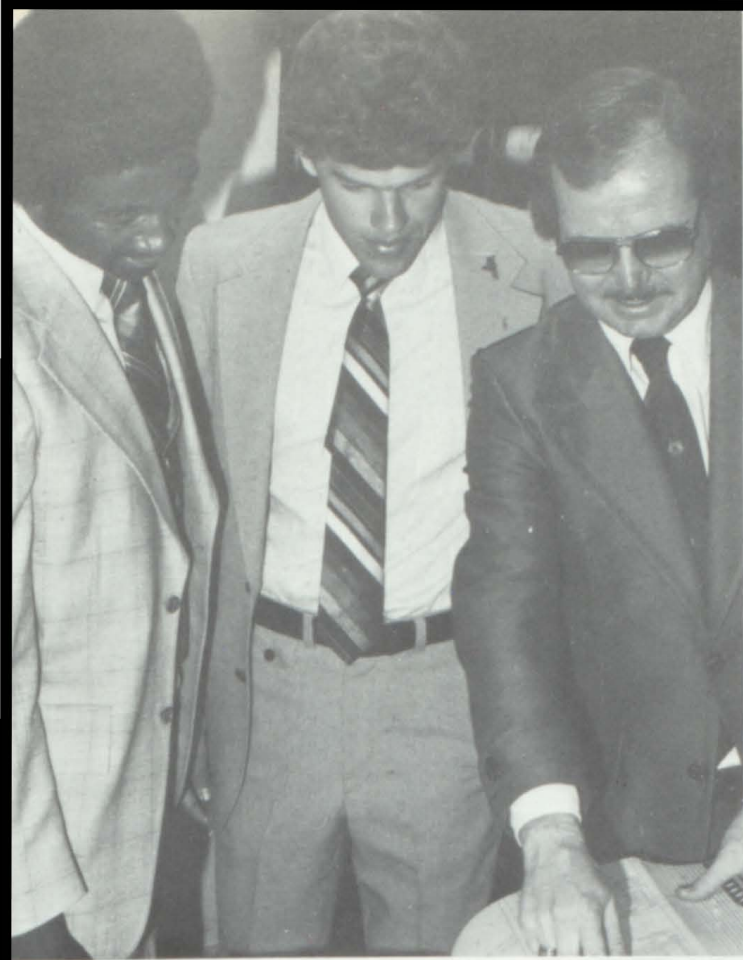

Activities were interrupted long enough for the students to enjoy hamburgers, chips and cokes that were prepared by the Ushers and Senior sponsors.



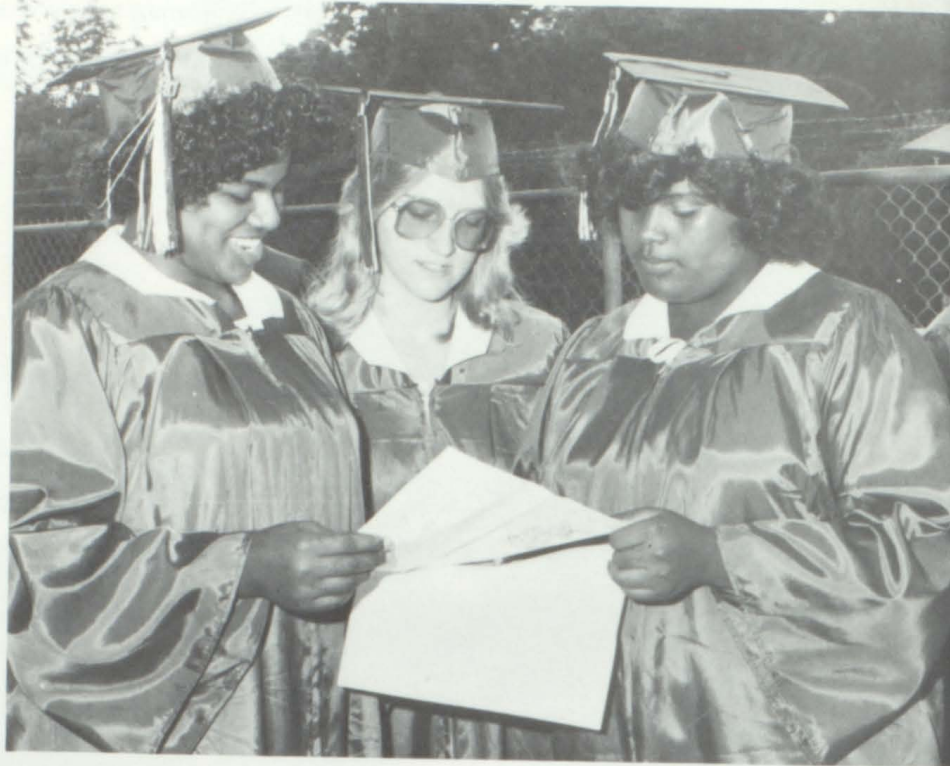

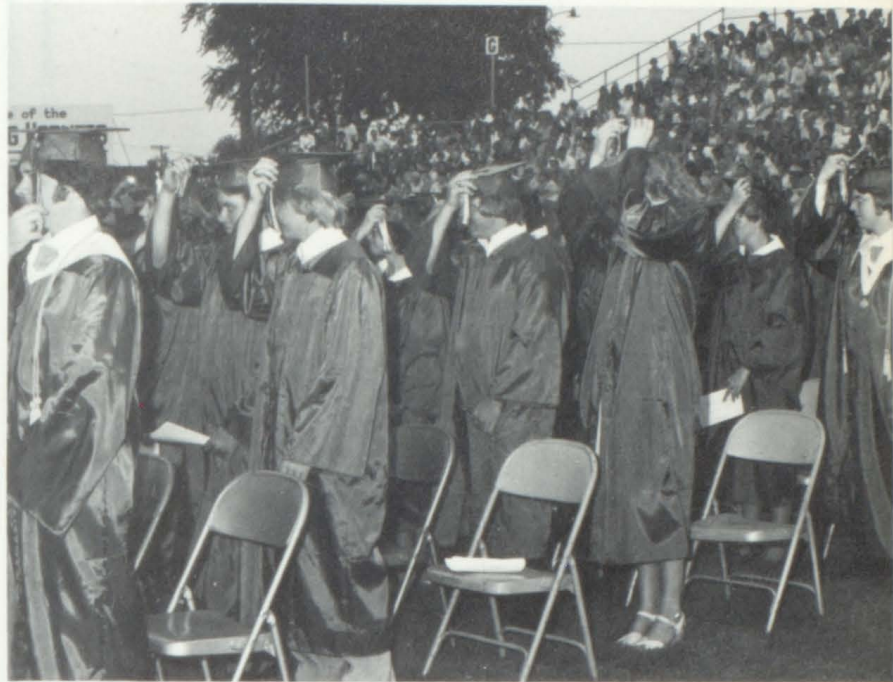

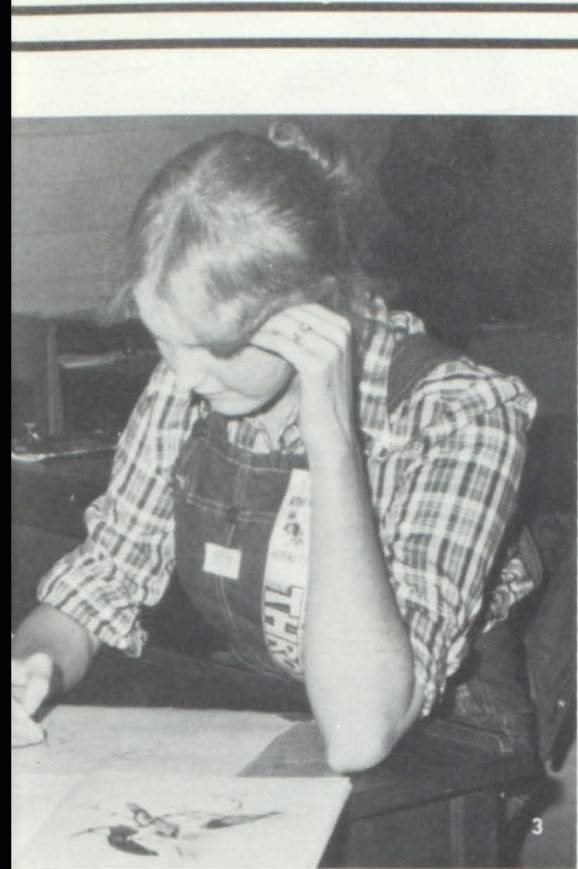

Vocational programs focused on junior and senior students who wished to work in the business world while continuing traditional high school classes.

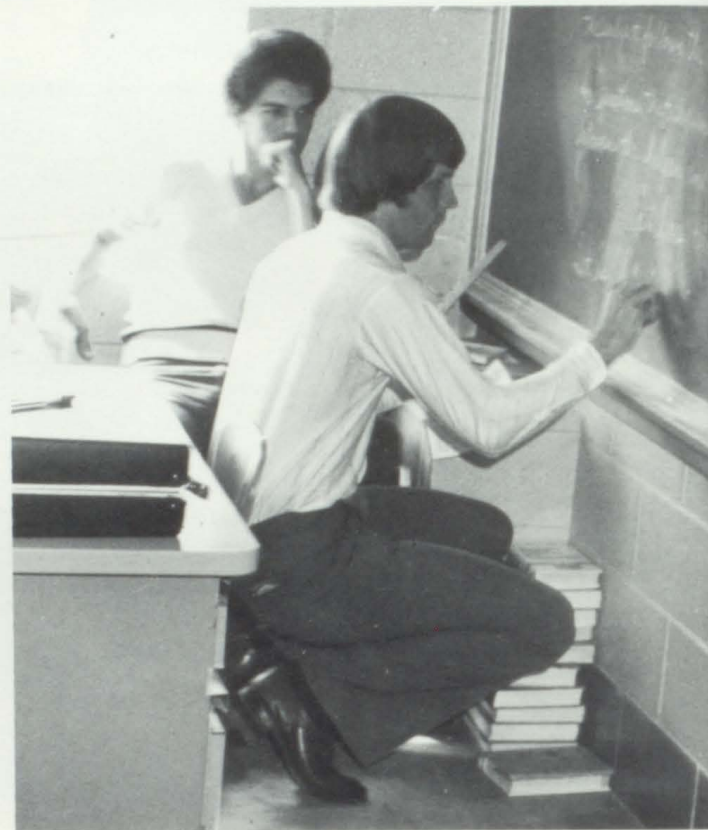
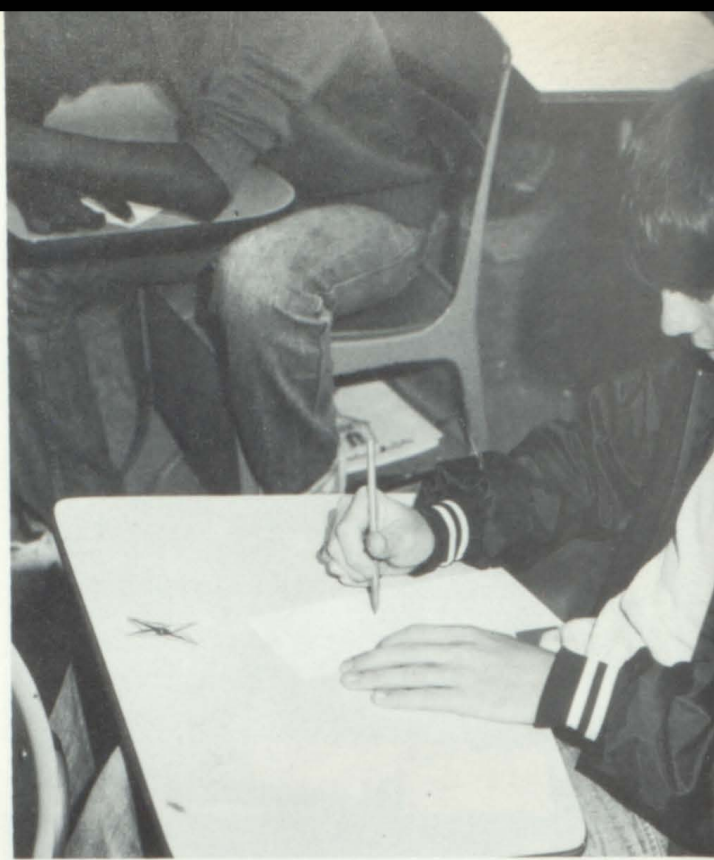


## Students Participate in Mock Conventions

For the first time in several years English IV was required for graduation. Both regular and topic classes were offered at each grade level.

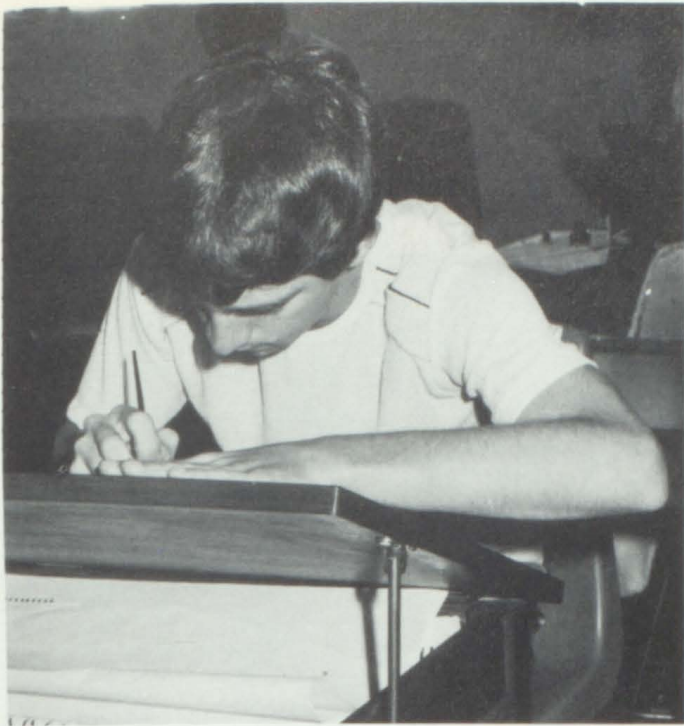

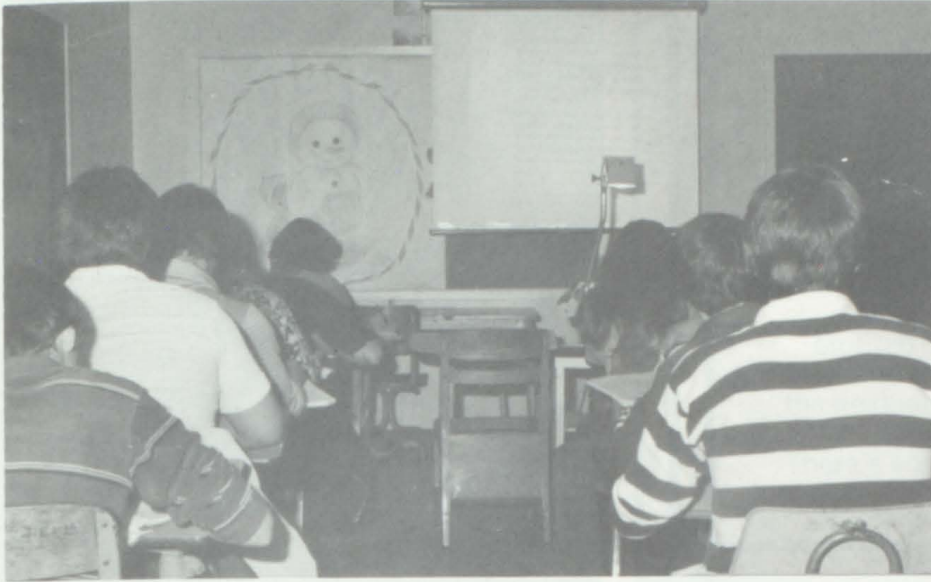

## Physical Fitness Encouraged

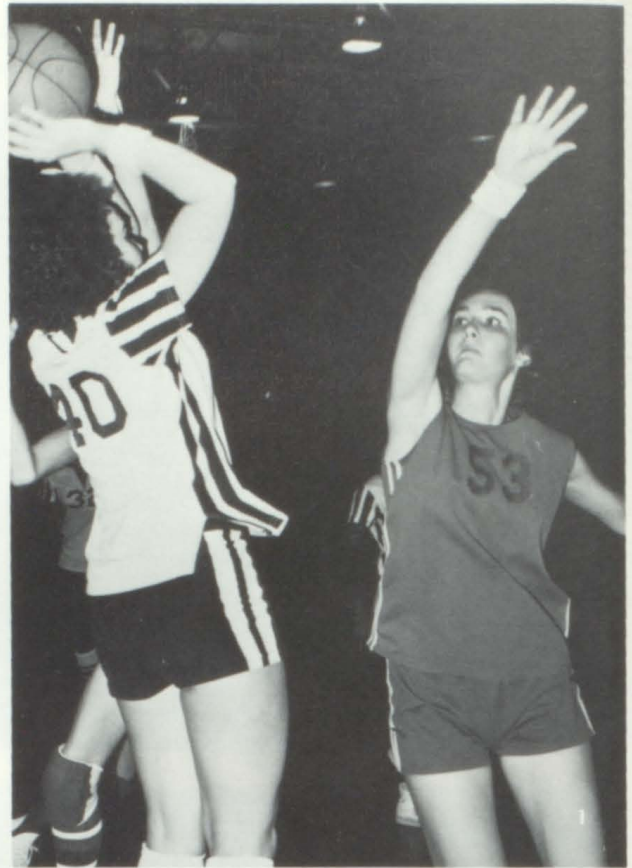
Physical Education classes encouraged the development of physical fitness. Softball, baseball, and basketball were among the activities offered.

Mechanical Drawing covered a wide variety of drafting projects. First and second year classes learned basic rules of drawing while third year students drew floor plans and made models of their houses.

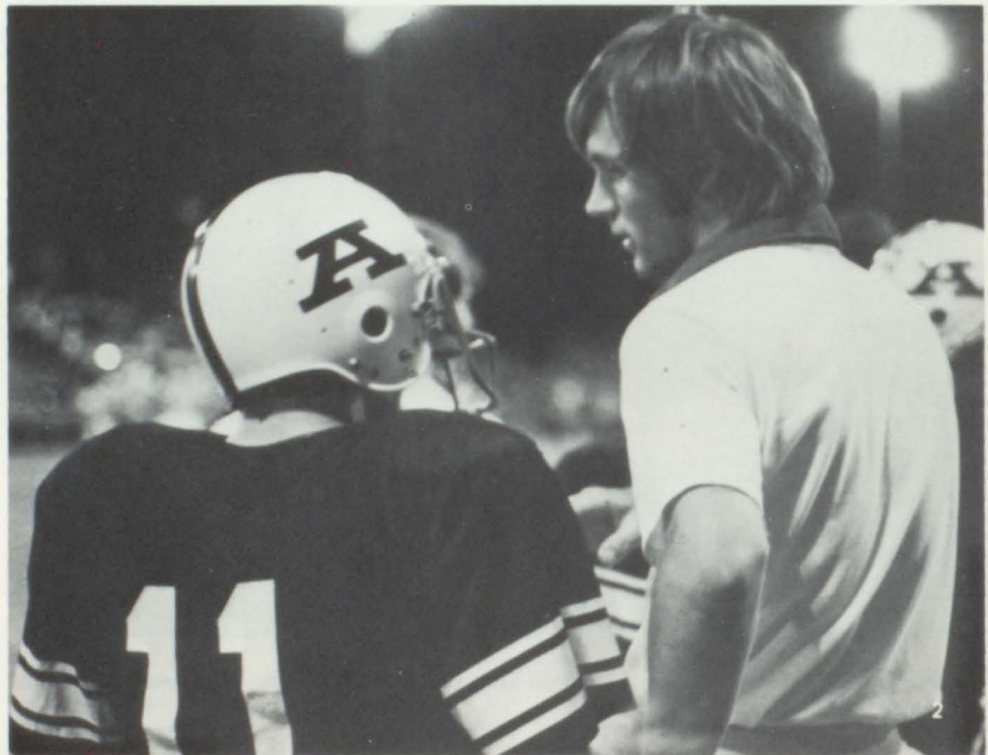
Health classes gave students the opportunity to learn functions of the body, good nutritional habits, and the basics in first aid.

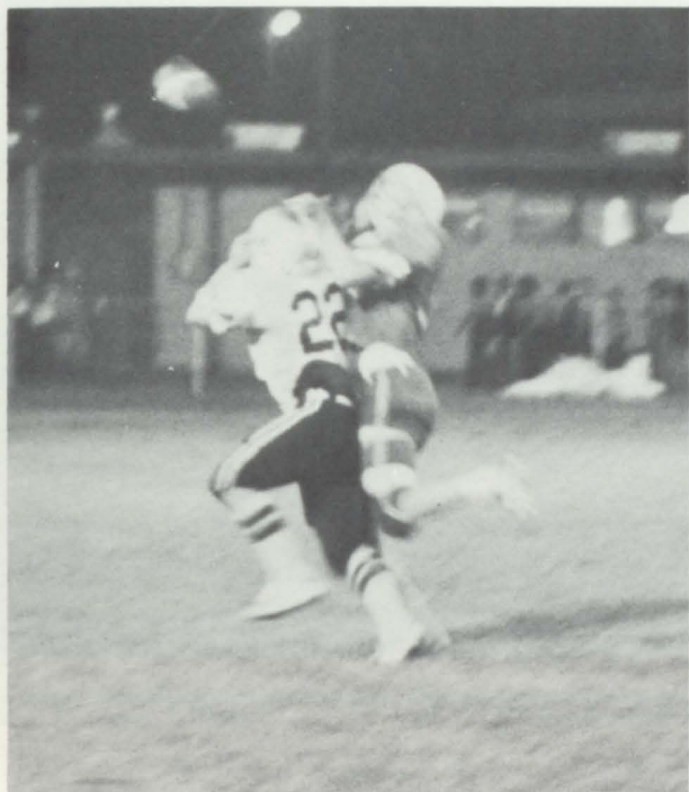
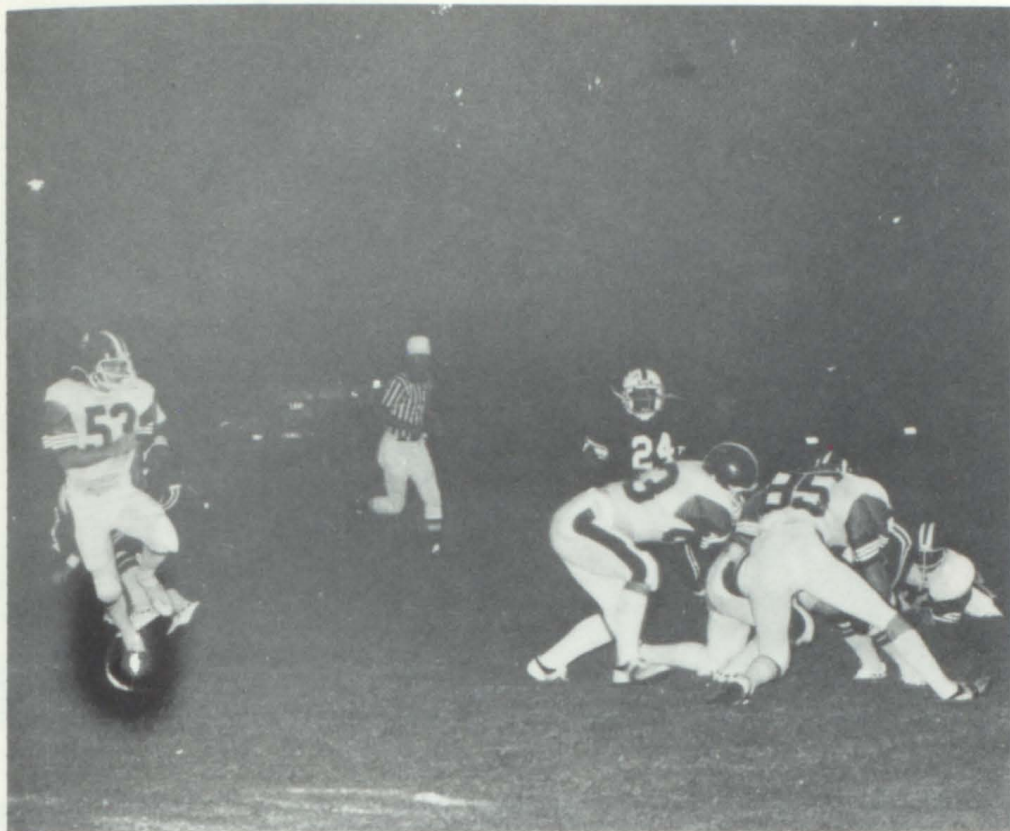

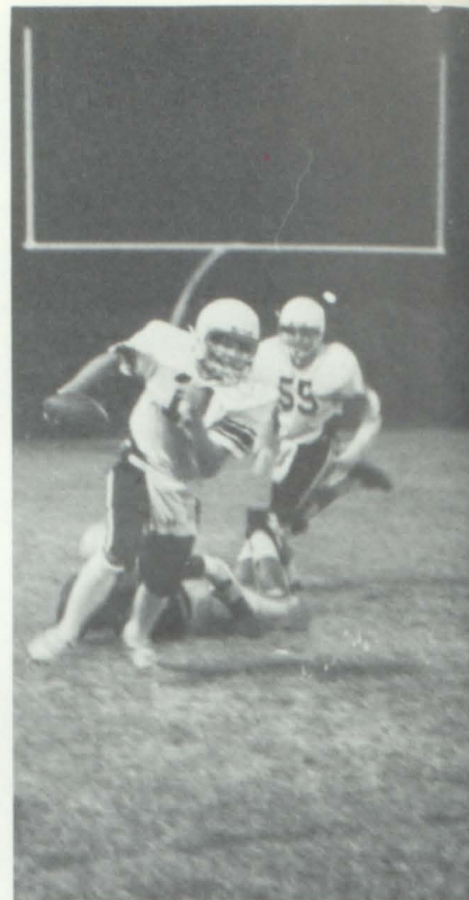

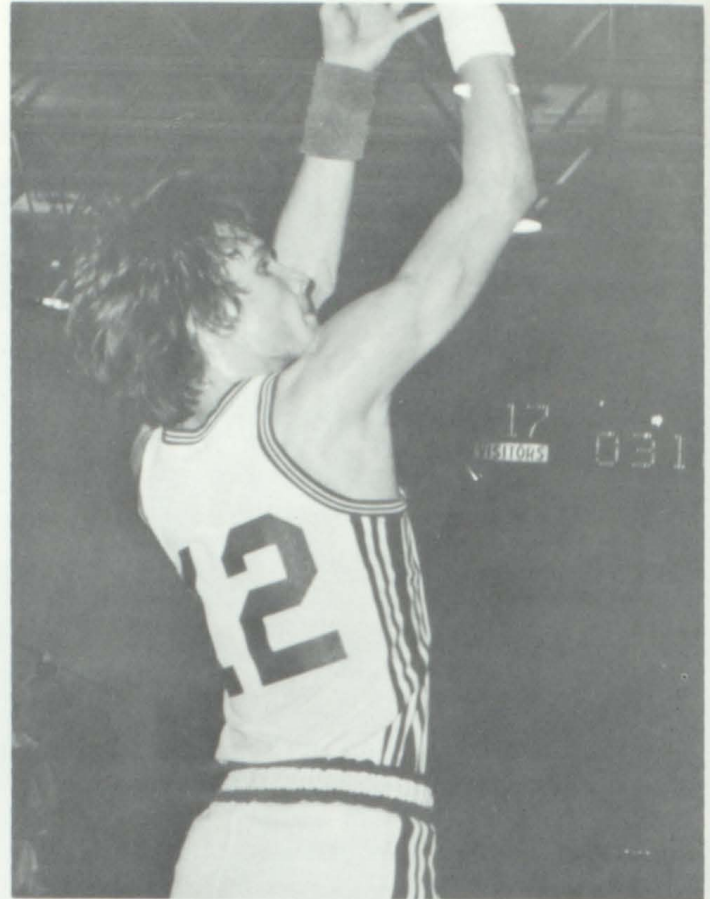

At half time of the Palestine game, the Hornets were still within range but could not overcome the Wildcats, losing 67-59.

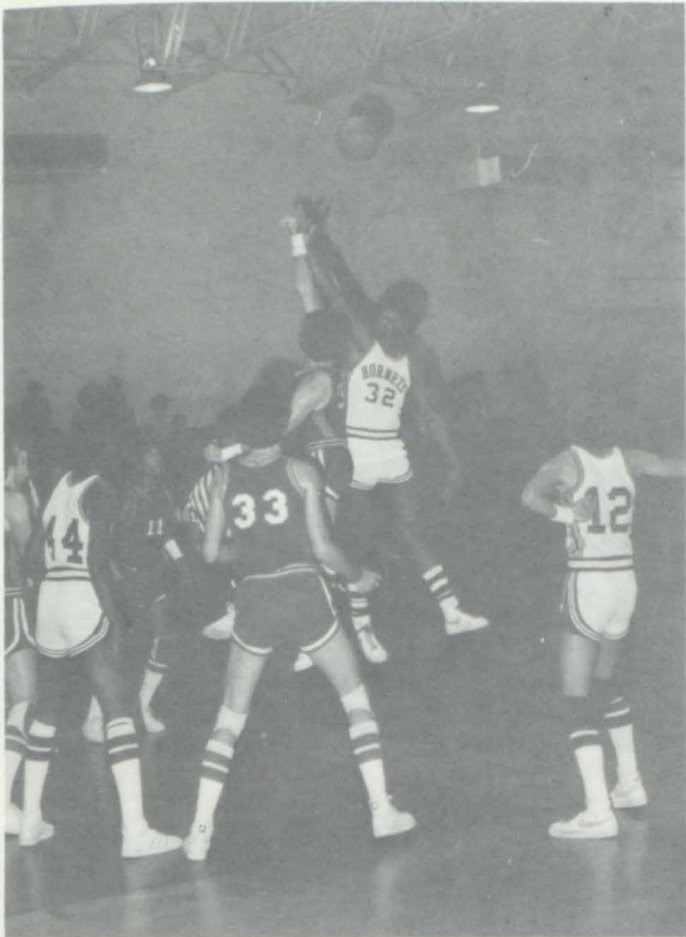

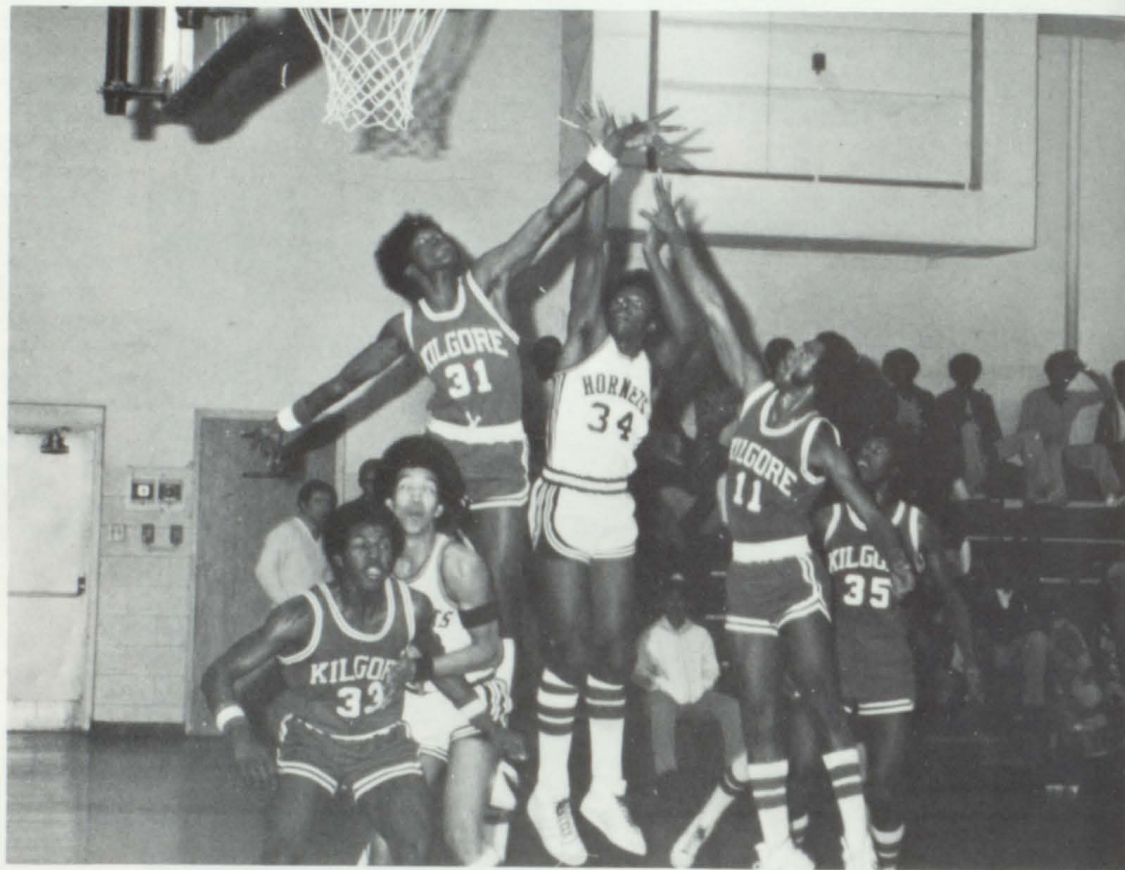

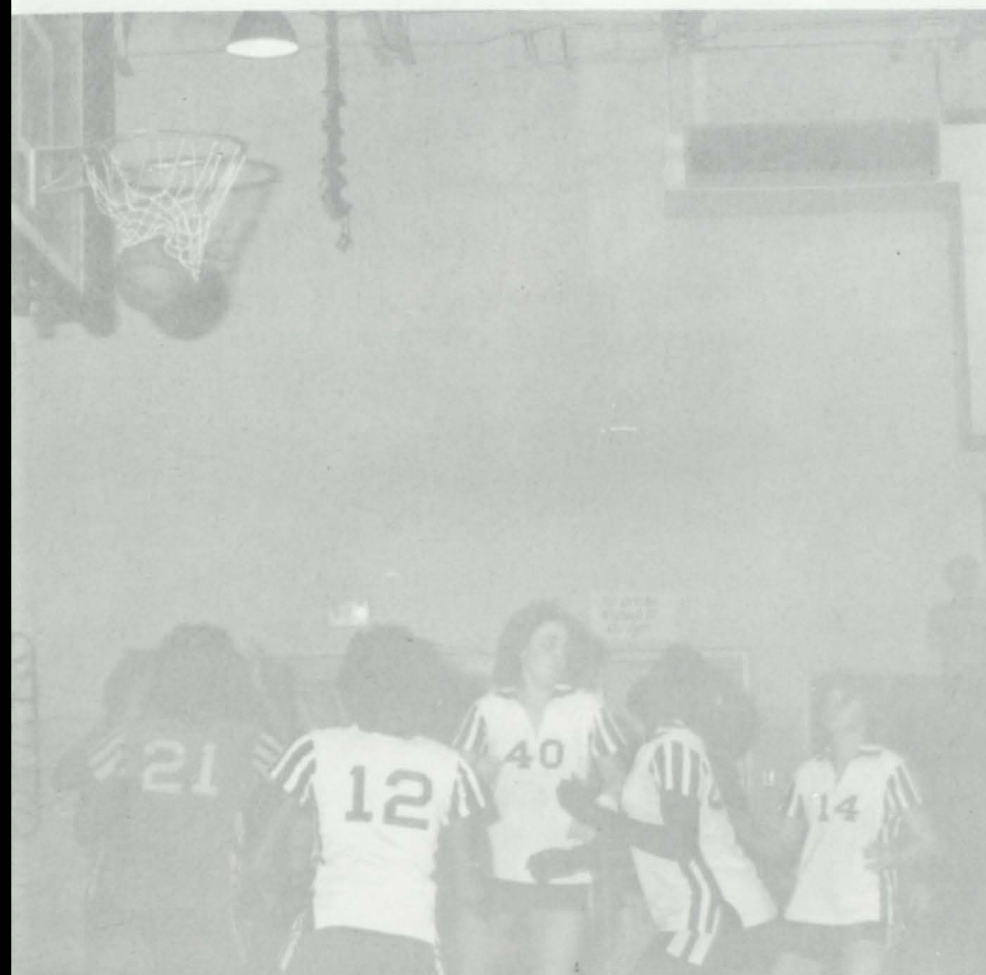

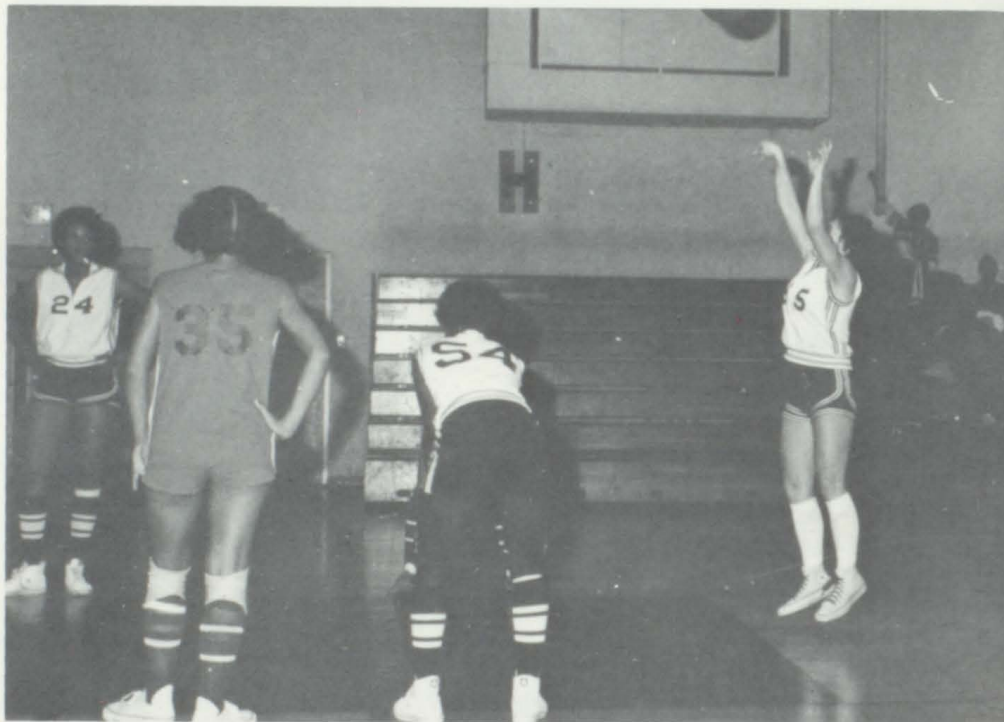

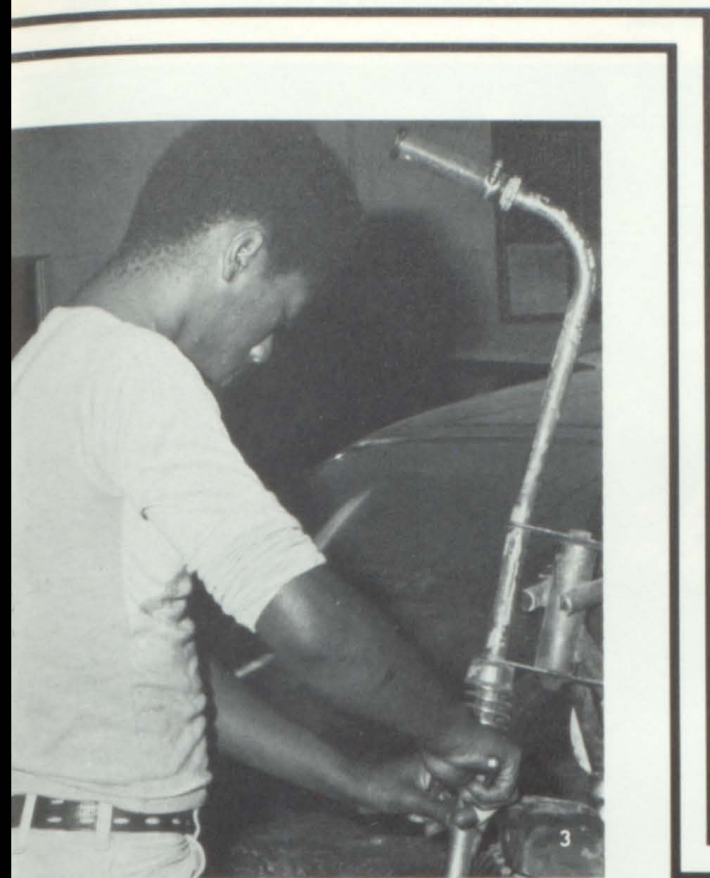

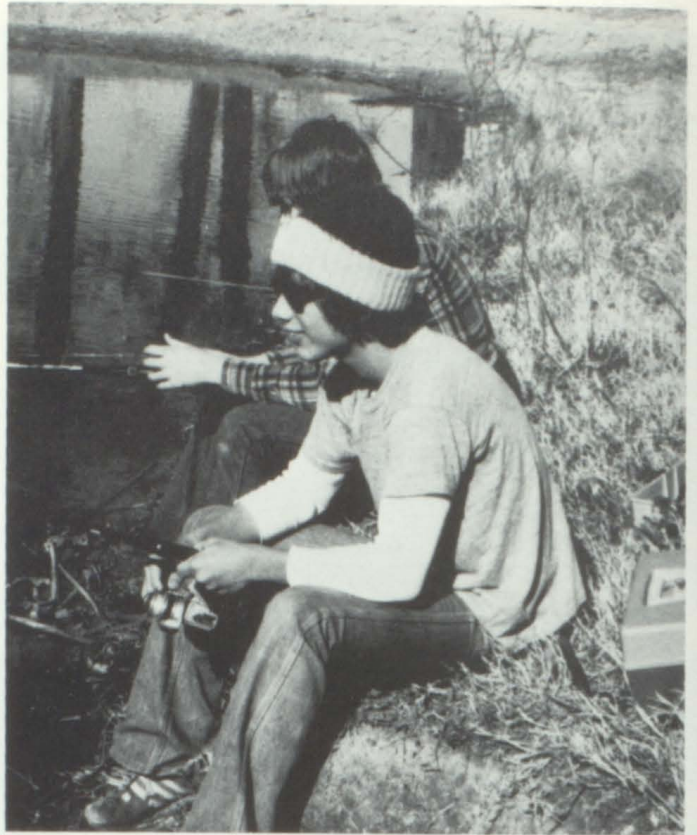

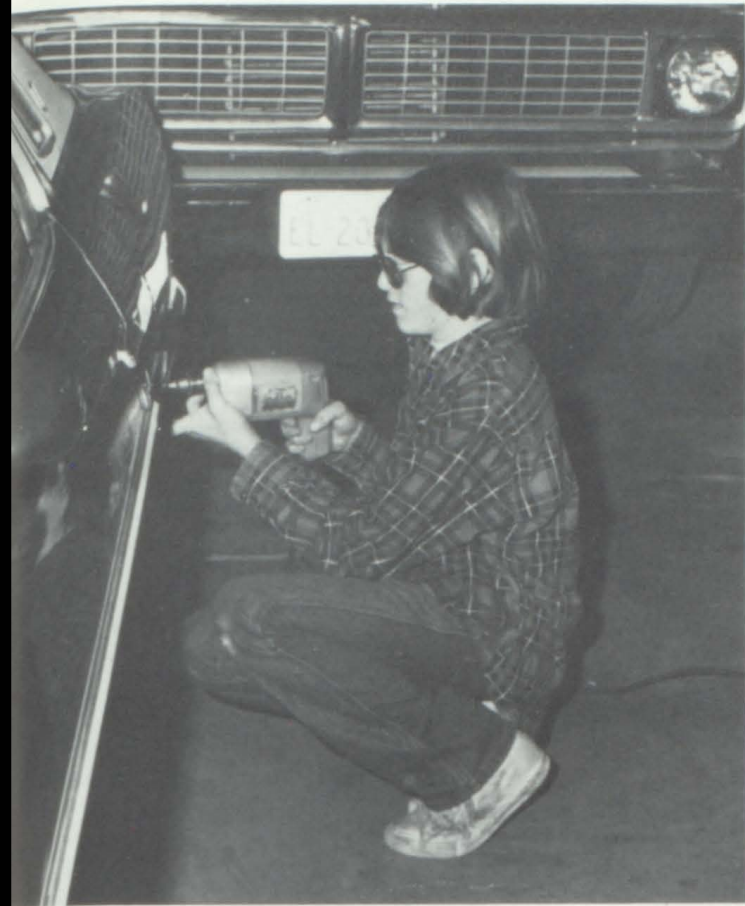

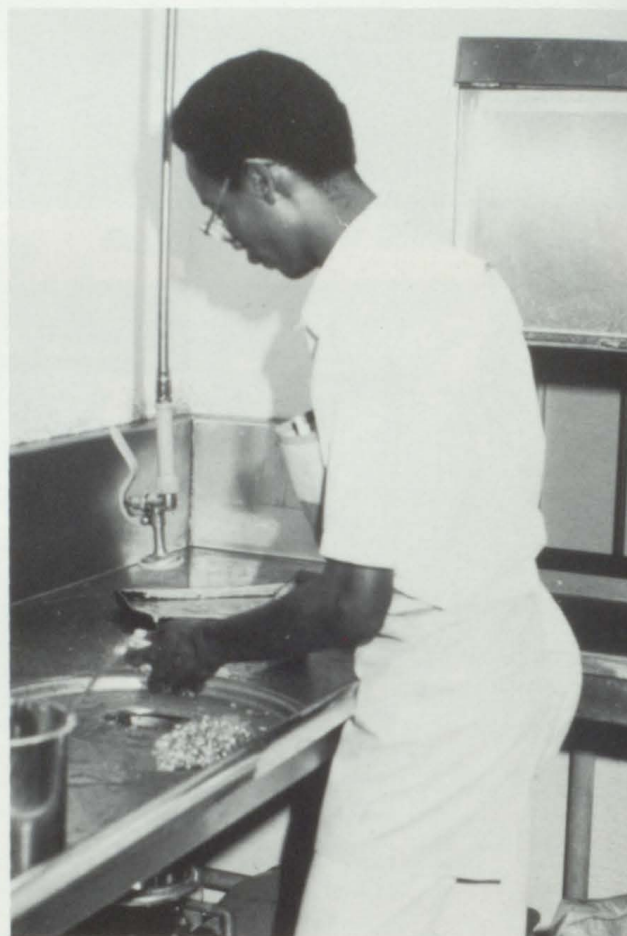
## HECE Program Remains Strong

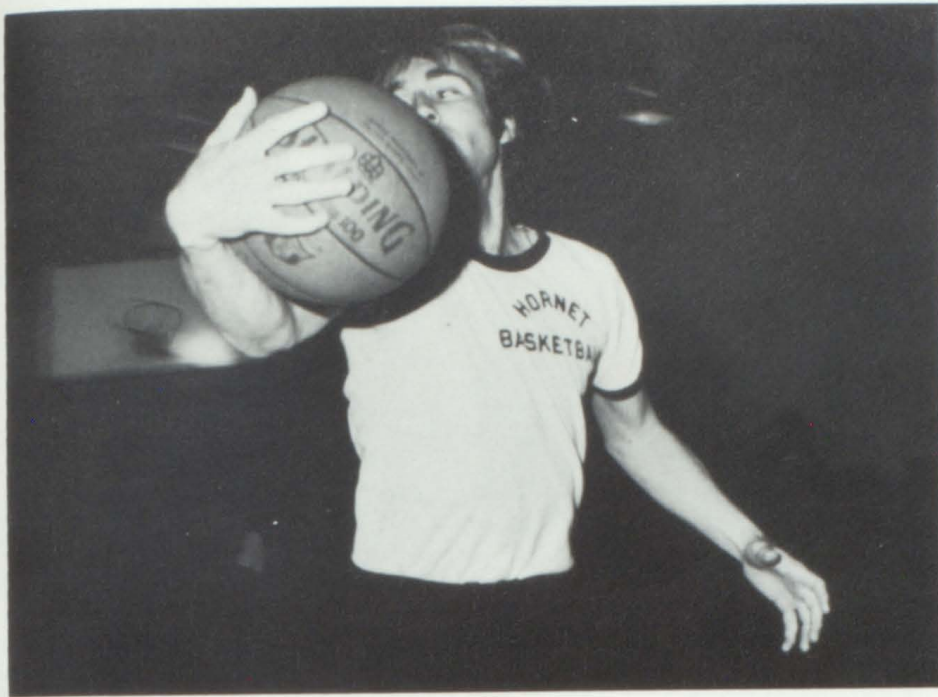

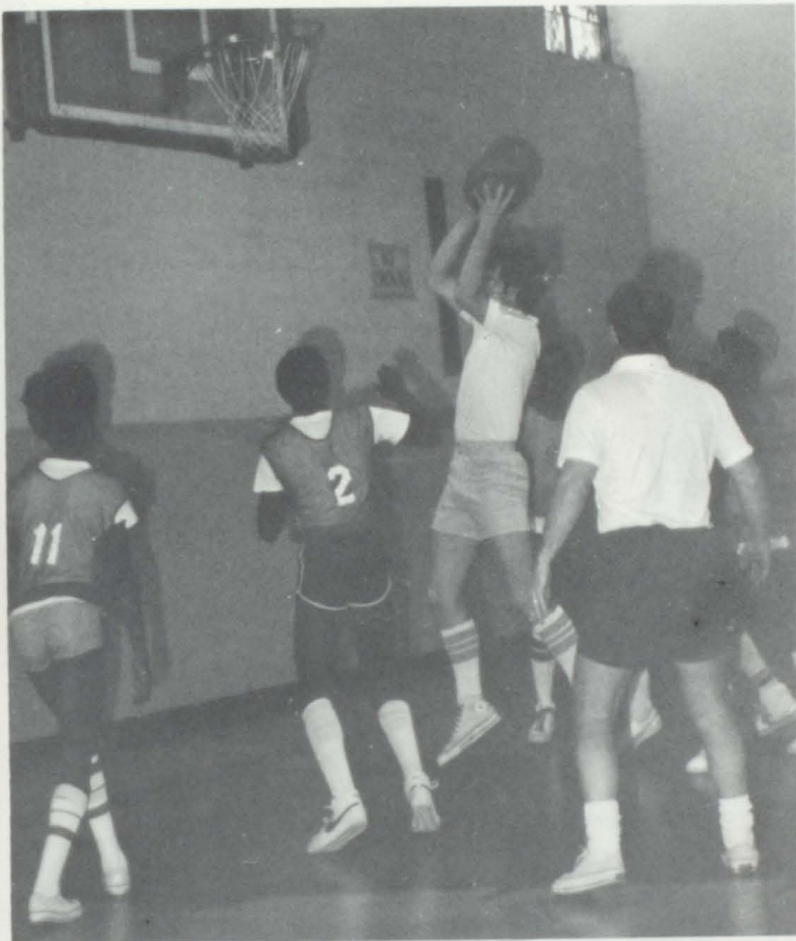


## Love Heads Up FCA

Using an old tradition which has been excluded for the past several years, the staff added spice to yearbook sales promotions by performing a medley of skits before the student body.

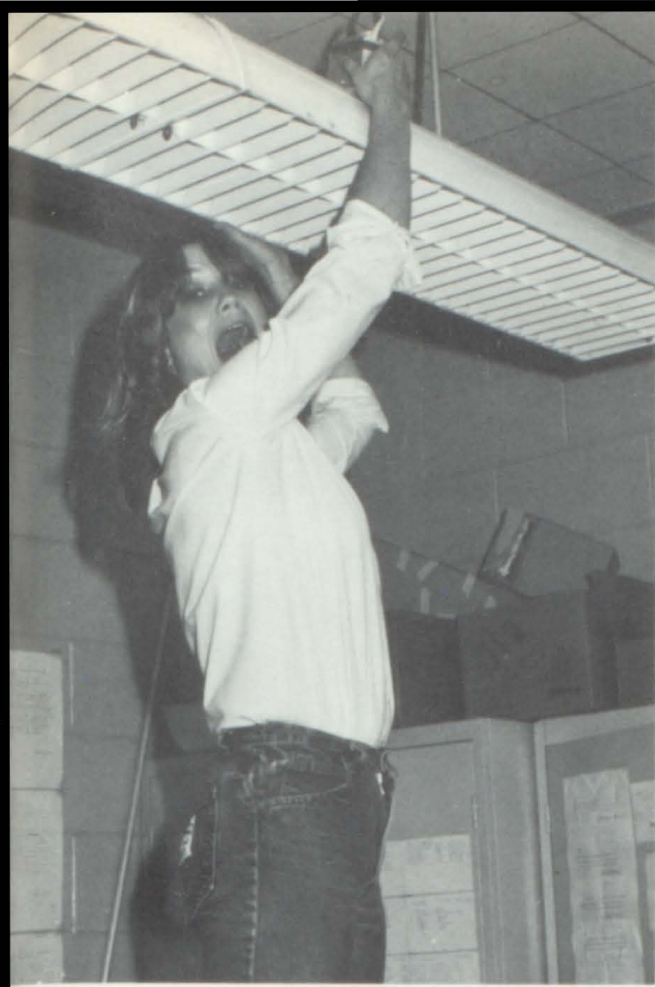

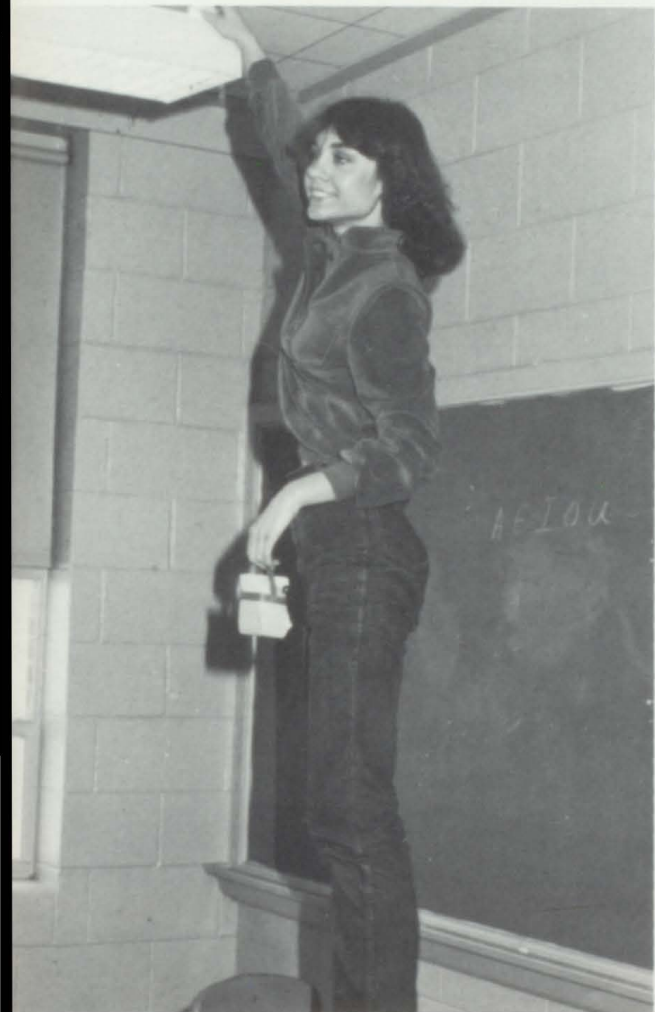

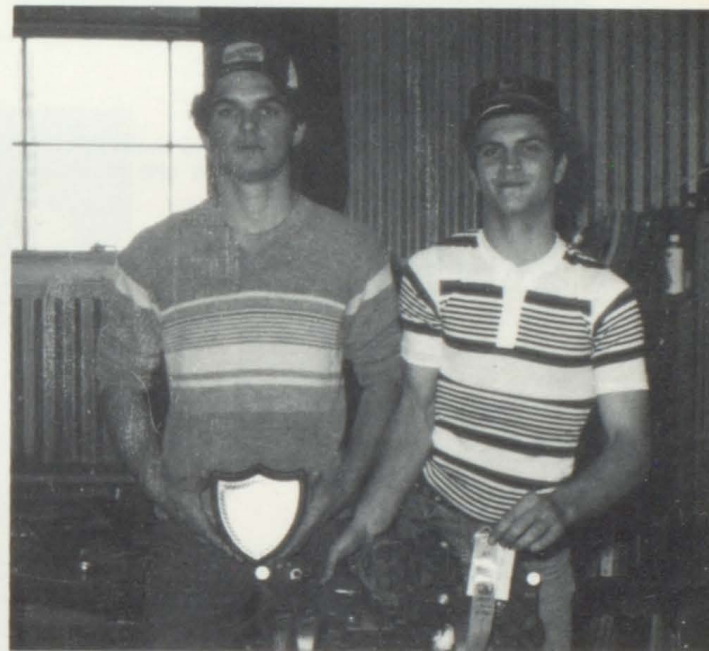

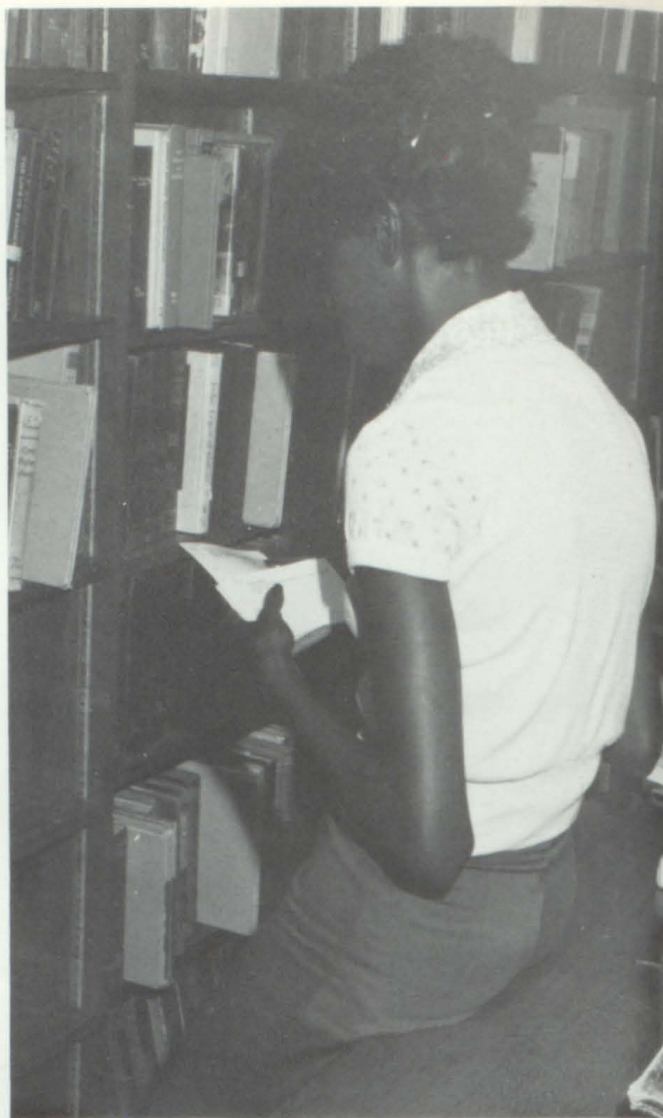

To raise money, members sold dog tags with "I'm Proud to be a Hornet" on one disc and the Hornet mascot on the other.

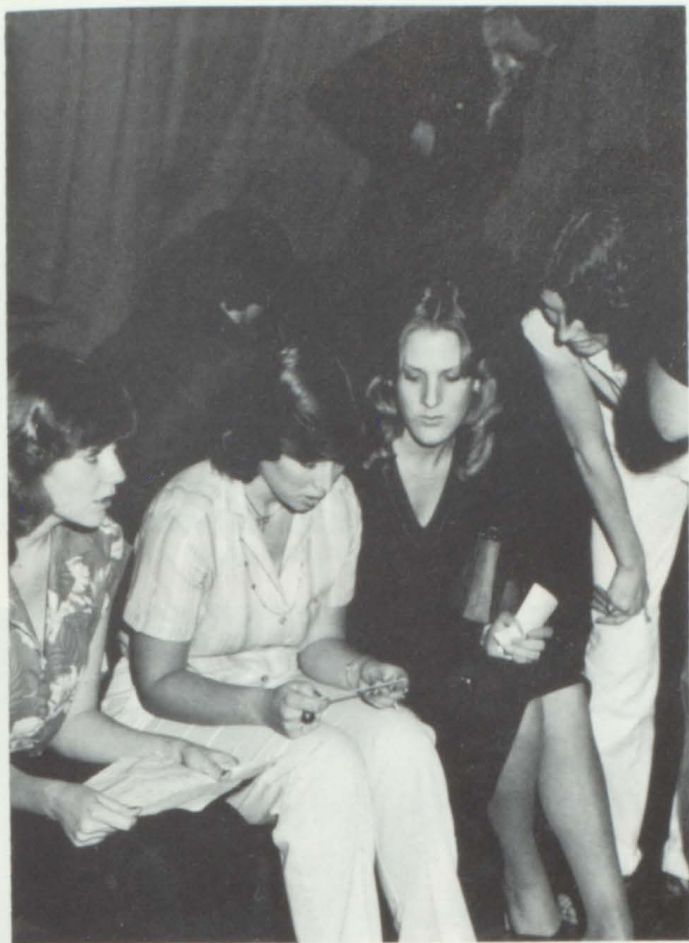

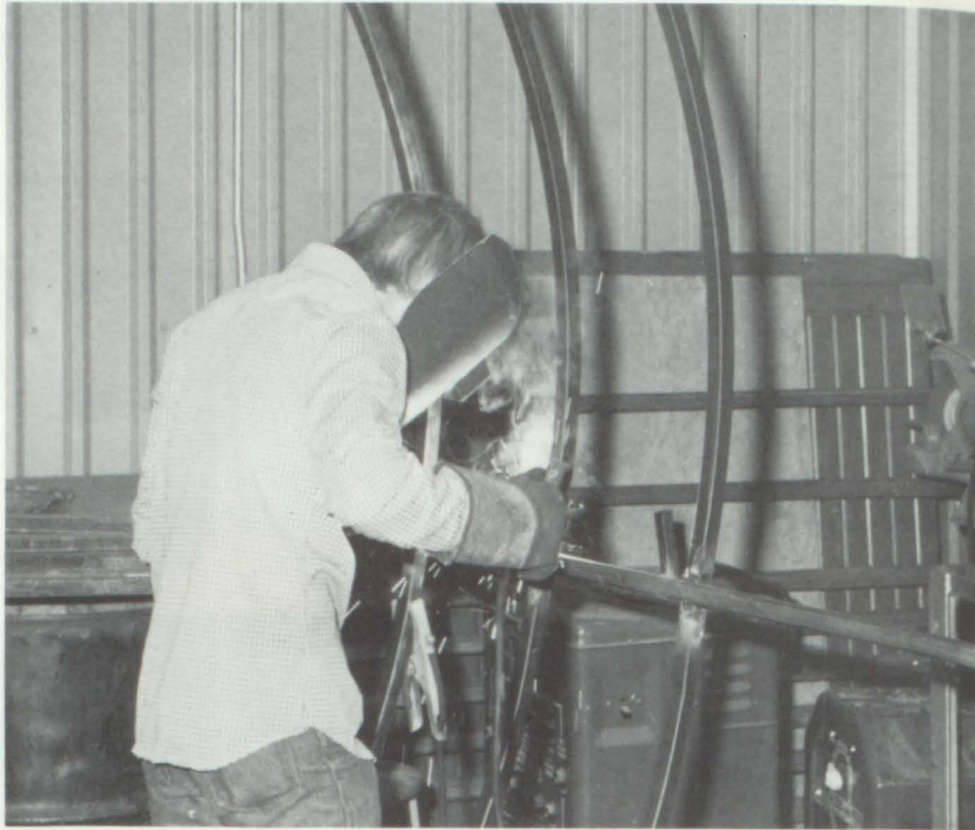

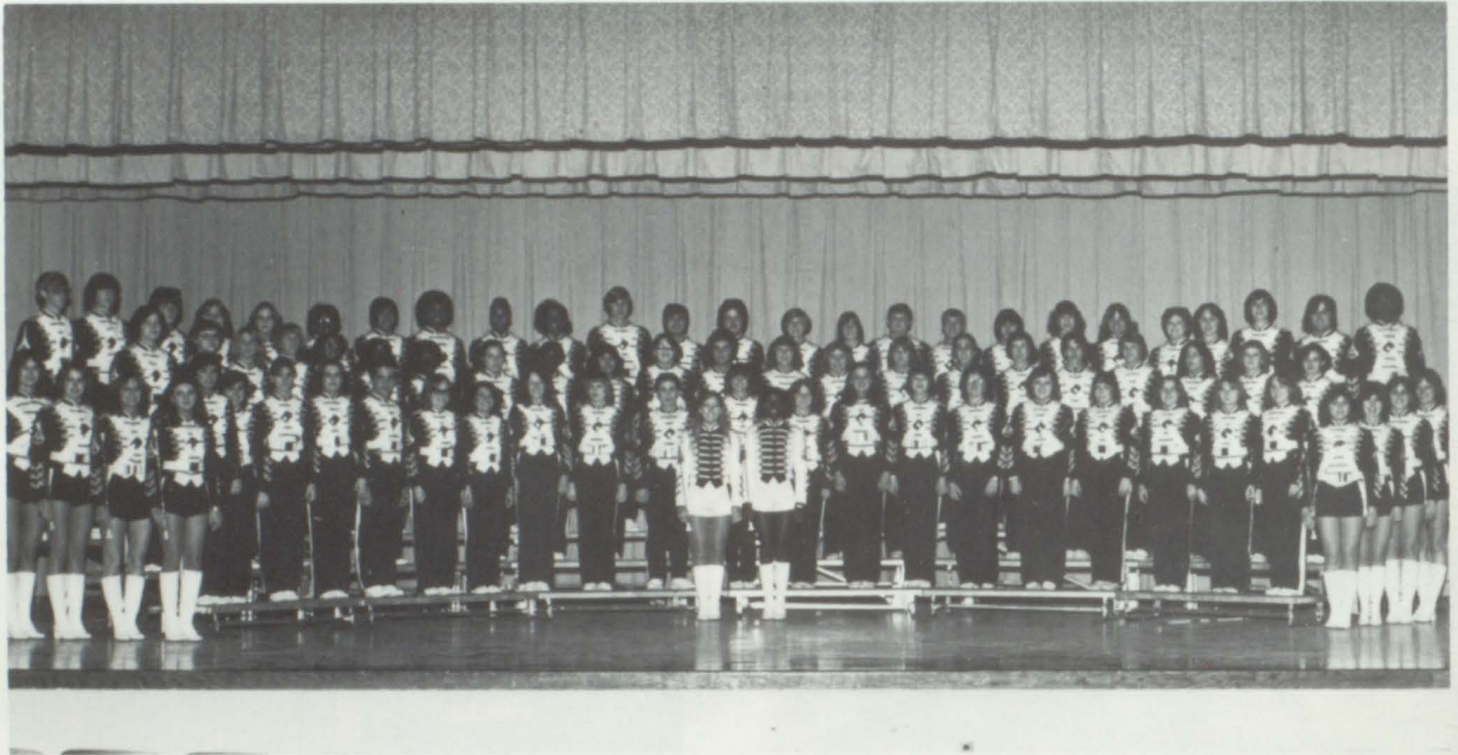

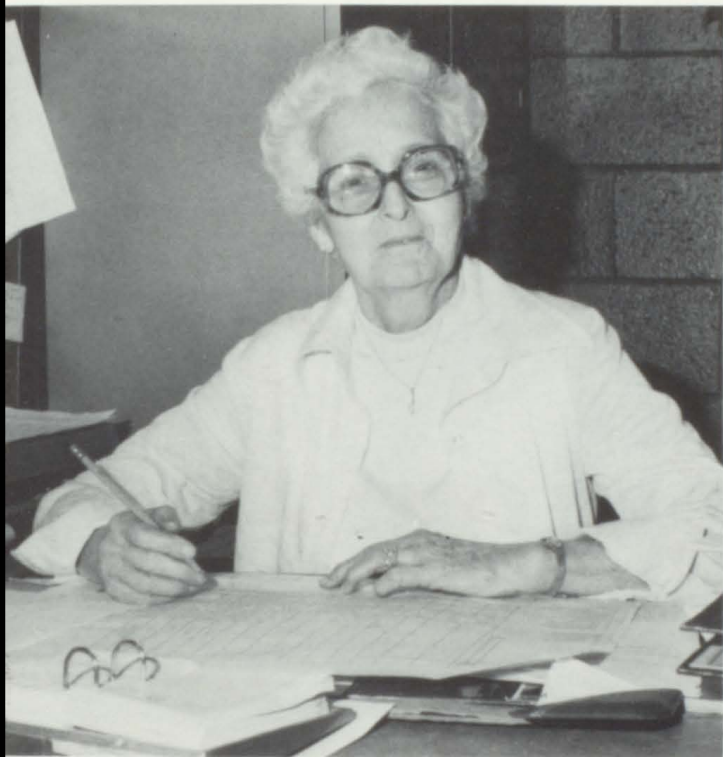

# SAVING TIPS

## on electric air conditioning



Air conditioning provides lots of comfort during the summer months, but for many thousands of homeowners it is also the biggest factor in the cost of electricity. On the average, air conditioning accounts for about half of summertime electric bills.

Here are ways you can hold down the cost of air conditioning and still enjoy its comfort.

### Central Systems

1. Set thermostat on 78°, or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.

9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

### Window Units

Follow above suggestions, plus these:

11. Buy units with *highest* "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.

Conserve electricity and you help conserve one or more of the fuels needed to produce it. Conserve fuels and you help assure that there will be enough to meet essential needs for electricity in the future.

# Hostage Seizure Awakens Nation

Americans were outraged when Iranian student militants, led by Ayatollah Khomeini Ruhollah, captured 53 U.S. diplomatic personnel, holding them hostage over seven months (at this writing.) Officials at home struggled to settle the crisis through diplomacy, economic sanctions and an unsuccessful helicopter rescue attempt. Secretary of State Cyrus Vance resigned and was replaced by Senator Edmund Muskie. The U.S. reacted to Soviet invasion of Afghanistan with a boycott of the Moscow Summer Olympics and passage of a draft registration plan.

Mt. St. Helens, a long-dormant volcano, erupted spreading death and destruction throughout southwestern Washington and draping ash over parts of the nation.

An influx of more than 111,000 Cuban refugees led to race rioting in Miami.

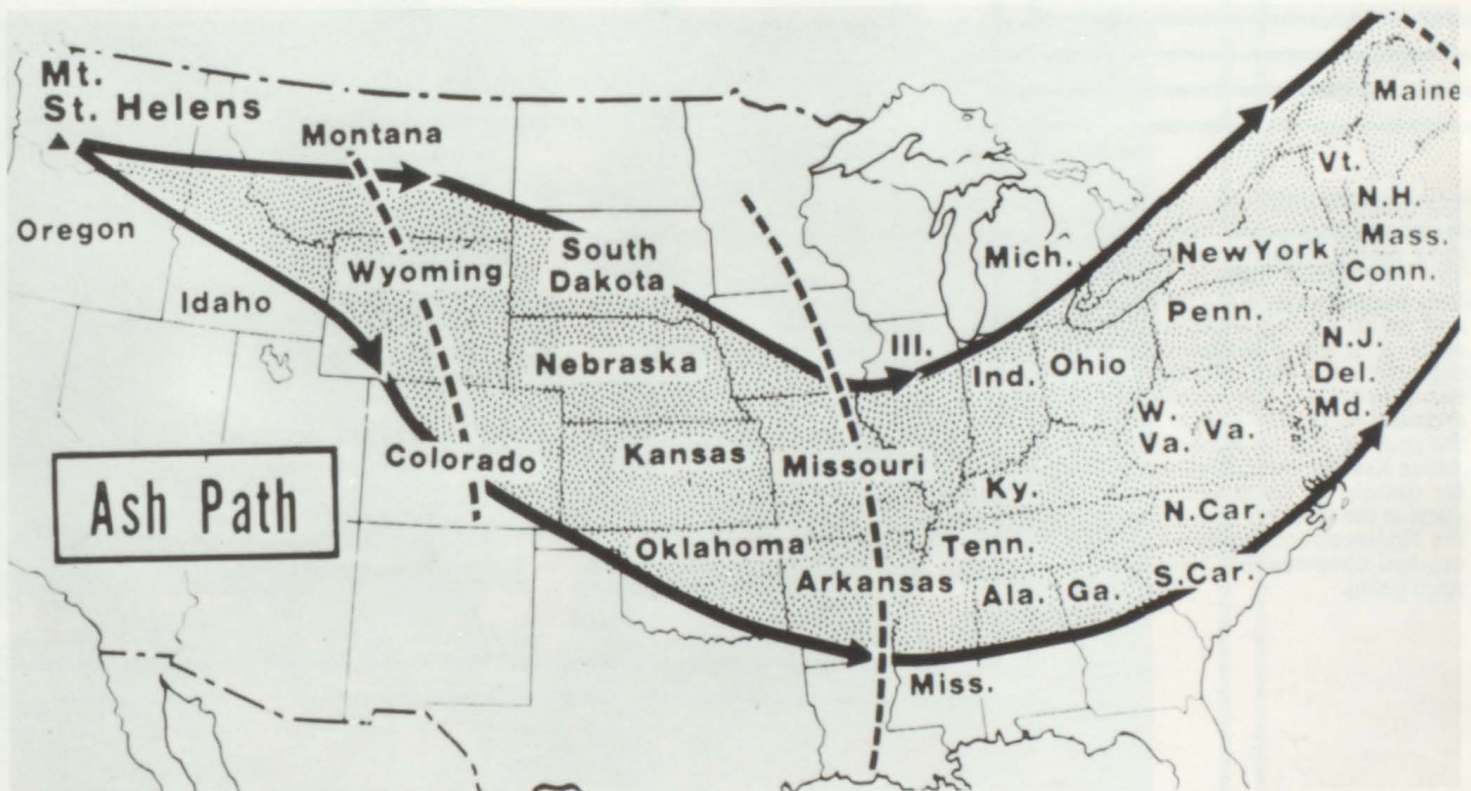
Ronald Reagan and Jimmy Carter apparently have captured their respective party's nominations for President, and Congressman John Anderson's independent candidacy promises a three-way

November election.

Corruption in government was alleged through the FBI's ABSCAM operations, investigating payoffs from Arab businessmen. Several Congressmen were indicted. Another FBI operation, BRILAB, resulted in the indictment of Texas Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Sports championships went to the Pittsburg Steelers in Super Bowl XIV, the Pittsburg Pirates in the World Series and the Los Angeles Lakers in the NBA. Mohammed Ali left retirement only to be defeated, and Dallas Cowboy legend Roger Staubach announced his retirement. A filly, Genuine Risk, won the Kentucky Derby.

Americans held their breath as a young, underdog U.S. hockey team defeated other more experienced teams to take the gold in the 13th Olympic Winter games in Lake Placid, New York. Eric Heiden won five gold medals (unprecedented in Winter Olympics) in speed skating, winning at every distance from 500 meters to 10,000 meters.

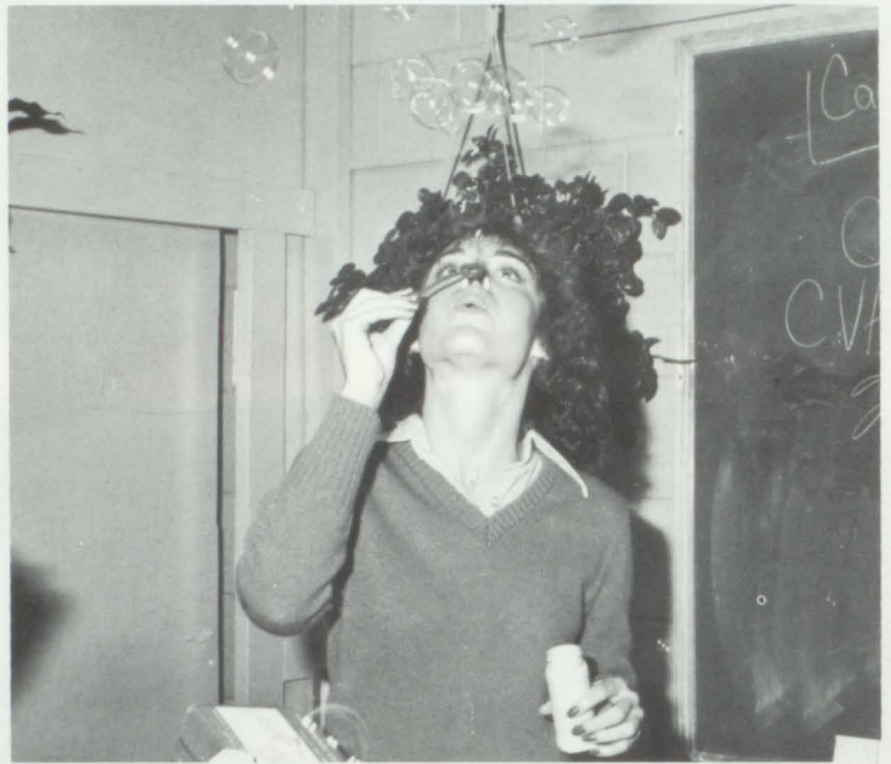
