## Ennis,

## Waxahachie Claim Wins

Interceptions, fumbles and costly third-and-ones and fourth-and-ones kept the Hornets from repeating their 1978 victory over Ennis.

Late in the fourth quarter having trailed throughout, the Hornets failed in a desperate attempt for the down on the Ennis 13 -yard line. Earlier the Hornets had another chance at victory when they recovered a Lion fumble on the 46 yard line but were unable to capitalize on the gain.

Ennis' game-winning TD came late in the first quarter which helped for a 6.0 win.

Two fumble recoveries and two interceptions were retrieved by the Hornets but those were not enough to overcome the Waxahachie Indians who kept the Hornets at bay to a score of 14.6 . Worse yet, senior QB Lance Waggoner suffered a compressed vertebra in the fourth quarter and was out for the remainder of the season.

An early score gave the Indians a 7. 0 lead which held good till the fourth quarter when they tacked on another 7 points. A short time later the Hornets moved 50 yards in eight plays and scored on a pass from Mike Neiman to Gary Cumby. A two-point conversion was attempted but fell incomplete. One more valiant effort, recovery of an onside kick, failed to produce a score.

## Hornets 'Rough Up' Roughriders

The Hornets struggled with their District 8AAA opener but gave it up to the Jacksonville Indians, 20-14. The Hornets fumbled 5 times in the first half but came back to earn 14 points in the second half.

A controversial note ended the game when Gary Cumby scamp. ered out of bounds with the ball on the Jacksonville 21-yard line. Officials said he went out before the final buzzer sounded, but they reversed their call and said he had not. After a conference along the sideline, the officials stuck with their second call, ending the game and the Hornets' chance to win.

The Center Roughriders fell hard, 26-6, in the Hornets' first victory of the season. Touchdowns by Kenneth Houston, Gary Cumby and Brady Pennington gave Athens a $20-0$ lead at halftime. Jerry Ray, who led the rushing with 52 yards, scored in the third after a pass interception by Mike Nieman. The Hornets held off Center's offense until the last quarter when the Roughriders scored 6 points following a short Athens punt.

Carthage romped over the Hornets in the second half to take an important 33.3 district win. The only points acquired by the Hornets came two seconds before the first half ended, when Duke Bedsole booted a 23 -yard field goal. At that point Athens trailed only 3-6. Throughout the game the Hornets were plagued with fumbles, interceptions and bad luck. QB Larry Adair was forced to leave the game twice due to injuries.
The loss set the Hornets at $1-2$ in District 8AAA play.

The Hornets had more first downs and excelled in passing as Larry Adair threw for 123 yards. An interception and would-be touchdown by Michael Hudson was called back in the second quarter. With first and goal to go from the five, the Hornets struggled but could not get into the end zone.
In the third, Athens again threatened but had to settle for a 23 -yard field goal.

In the season's eighth game the Hornets gunned down Gladewater 39-21. Scores were added in every quarter as the Hornets gained a total of 367 yards. Two first-quarter TD's by Jerry Ray set the tone for the rest of the evening in which the Hornets led all the way. 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Here are ways you can hold down the cost of air conditioning and still enjoy its comfort.

\section*{Central Systems}
1. Set thermostat on \(78^{\circ}\), or higher, during the summer. Turn unit off if you'll be away from home several days.
2. Keep equipment at top operating efficiency. Have it checked seasonally by qualified serviceman.
3. Check filter every 30 days. Dirty filters cause equipment to use excessive electricity. If filter is permanent, clean by manufacturer's directions; if it's disposable, it should be replaced when dirty.
4. Keep furniture, draperies away from air outlets and returns. Clean grills often.
5. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight.
6. Keep fireplace damper closed.
7. Proper home insulation keeps the heat out, cuts energy use. Insulation questions? Call TP\&L.
8. Shade on roof and walls can reduce energy needed to cool. But trim trees, shrubs away from outside compressor unit. Keep it free of leaves, debris. If air flow is blocked, unit uses more energy.
9. Weatherstrip doors and windows; caulk cracks to prevent drafts and cool air loss.
10. Keep windows closed. Open outside doors as little as possible.

\section*{Window Units}

Follow above suggestions, plus these:
11. Buy units with highest "energy efficiency ratio" (EER). Uses less electricity to cool. If EER is not on sales tag, ask for it or figure it yourself. Divide "wattage" into "BTU" capacity. Both figures are on unit.
12. Place unit where it'll get as little direct sun as possible.
13. Aim air outlets at lower half of doorway to next room to allow warm air from that room to enter at the doortop for recooling, recirculation.
14. Never vent air conditioner into garage. Ventilation is usually too poor for top performance of your unit.
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\section*{Hostage Seizure Awakens Nation}

Americans were outraged when Iranian student militants, led by Ayatollah Khomeini Ruhollah, captured 53 U.S. diplomatic personnel, holding them hostage over seven months (at this writing.) Officials at home struggled to settle the crisis through diplomacy, economic sanctions and an unsuccessful helicopter rescue attempt. Secretary of State Cyrus Vance resigned and was replaced by Senator Edmund Muskie. The U.S. reacted to Soviet invasion of Afghanistan with a boycott of the Moscow Summer Olympics and passage of a draft registration plan.
Mt. St. Helens, a long-dormant volcano, erupted spreading death and destruction throughout southwestern Washington and draping ash over parts of the nation.
An influx of more than 111,000 Cuban refugees led to race rioting in Miami.
Ronald Reagan and Jimmy Carter apparently have captured their respective party's nominations for President, and Congressman John Anderson's independent candidacy promises a three-way

November election.
Corruption in government was alleged through the FBI's ABSCAM operations, investigating payoffs from Arab businessmen. Several Congressmen were indicted. Another FBI operation, BRILAB, resulted in the indictment of Texas Speaker of the House Bill Clayton.

Sports championships went to the Pittsburg Steelers in Super Bowl XIV, the Pittsburg Pirates in the World Series and the Los Angeles Lakers in the NBA. Mohammed Ali left retirement only to be defeated, and Dallas Cowboy legend Roger Staubach announced his retirement. A filly, Genuine Risk, won the Kentucky Derby.

Americans held their breath as a young, underdog U.S. hockey team defeated other more experienced teams to take the gold in the 13th Olympic Winter games in Lake Placid, New York. Eric Heiden won five gold medals (unprecedented in Winter Olympics) in speed skating, winning at every distance from 500 meters to 10,000 meters.
