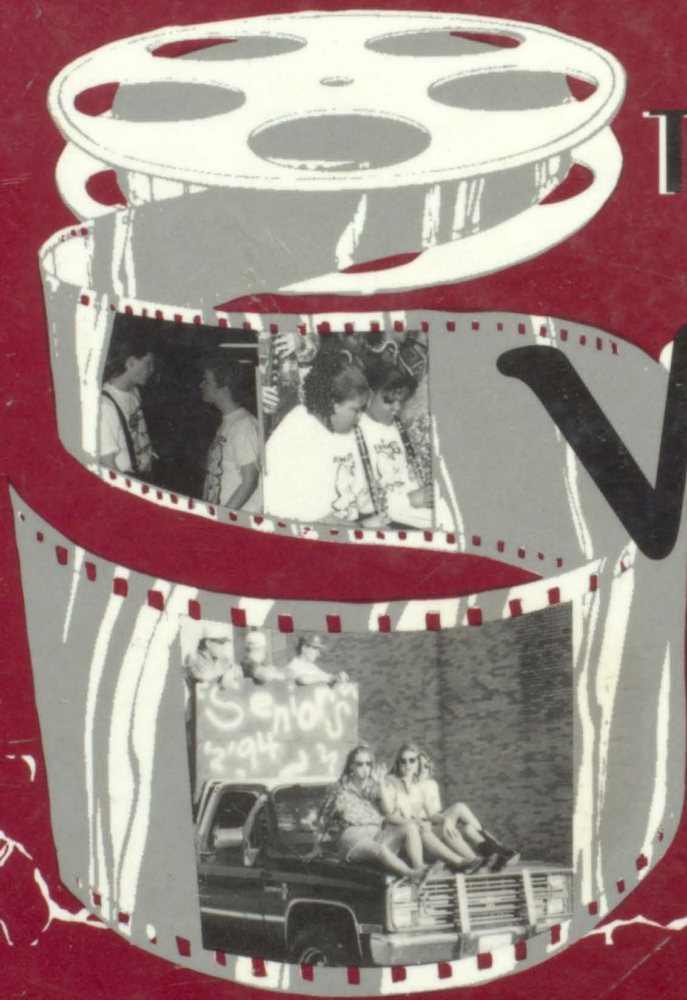


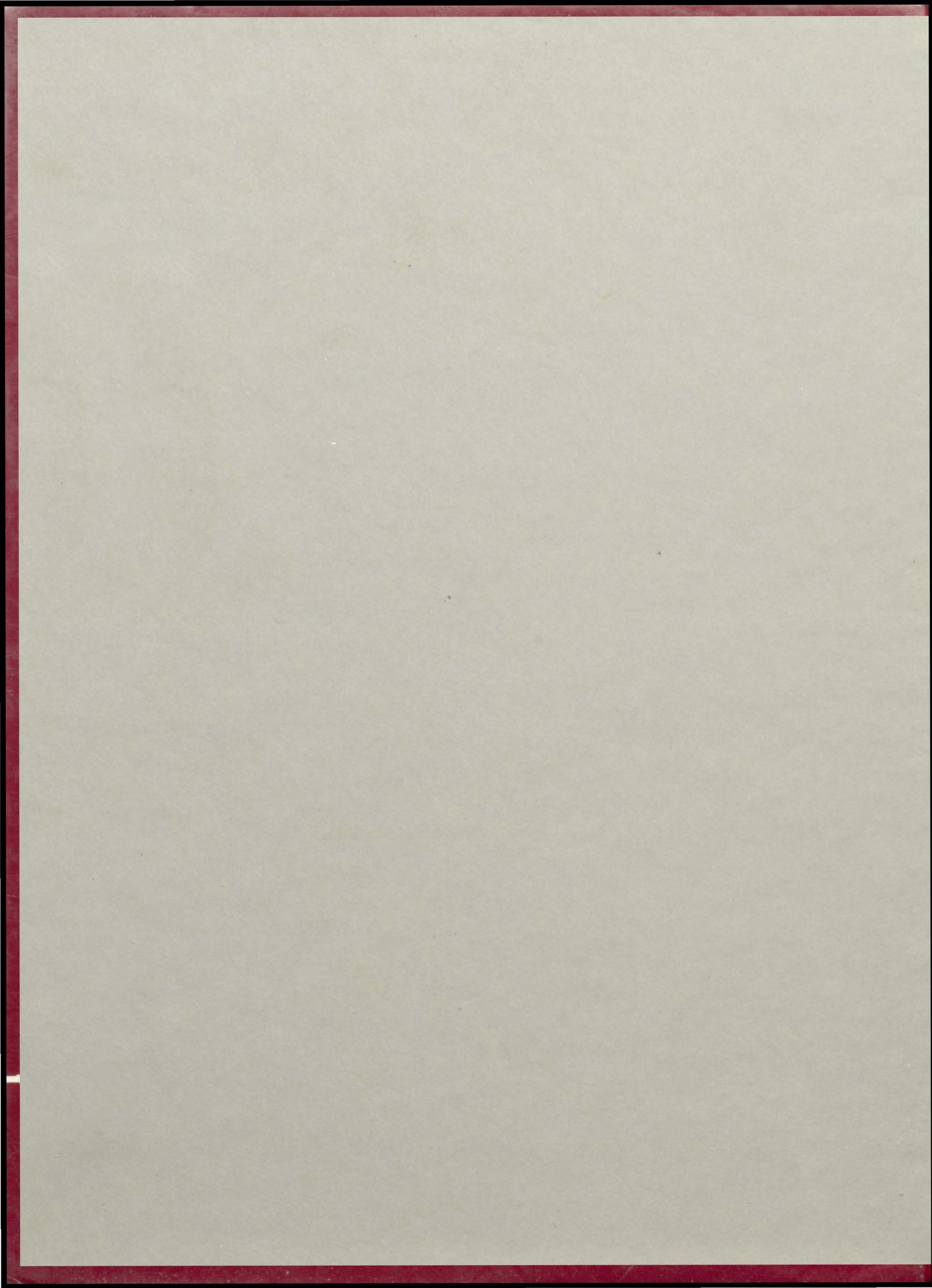

Despite the obstacles of life in general, students managed to overcome them, and wherever they were or whatever they were doing, they always had a good time.

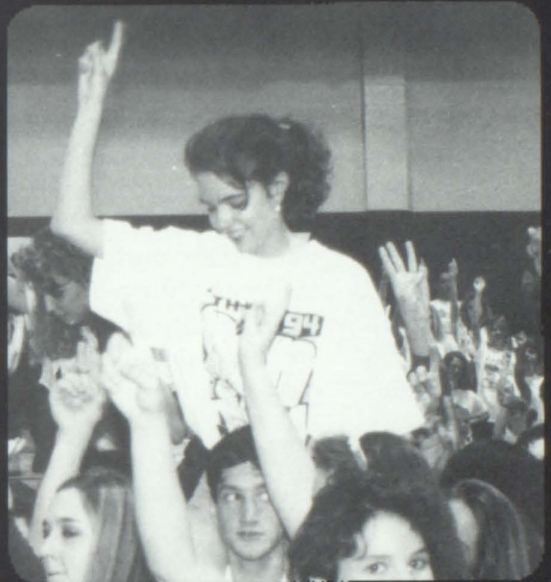

Students also developed other time

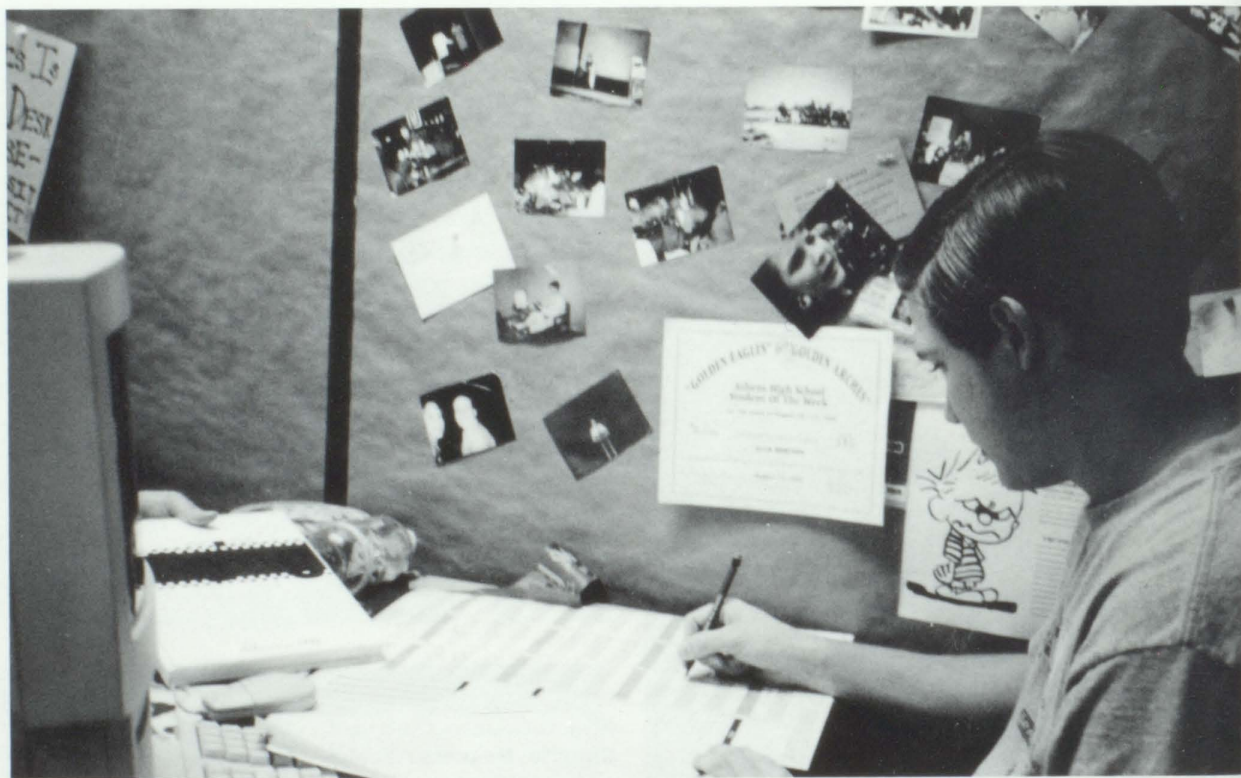
consuming activities. "I am the district representative for my youth group at my church. I enjoy it a lot," Toni Guggenbickler said.

The theme for this years parade was "Hornets are out of this world." As soon as the theme was de-

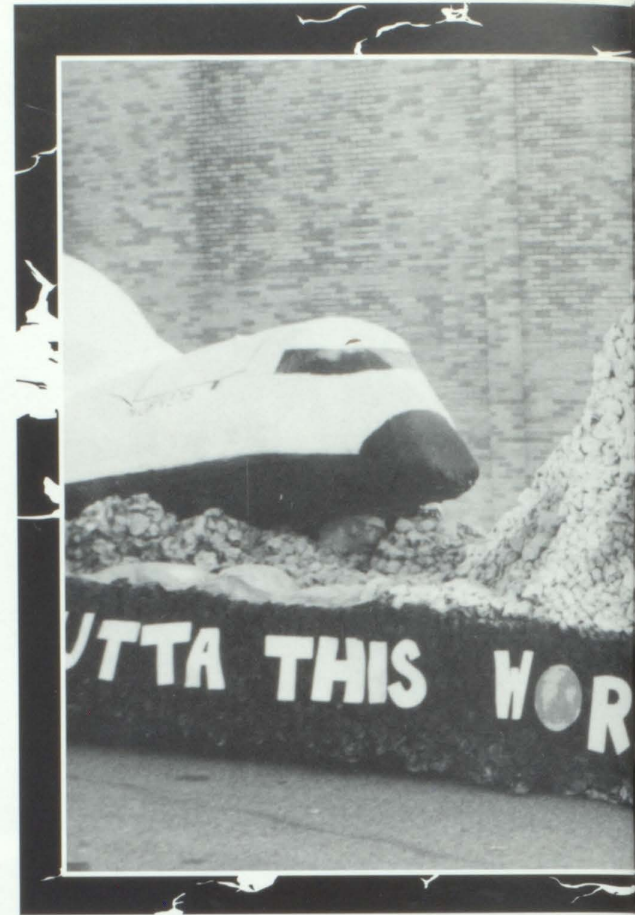

"The parade and bonfire really seemed to come together this year. Every class worked hard to make it a huge success," Emily McAtee said.

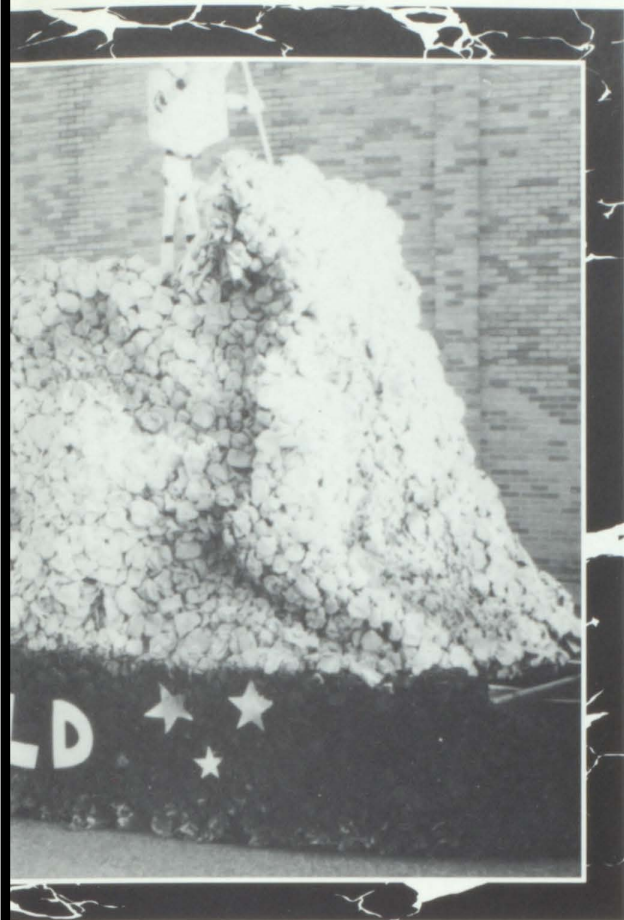

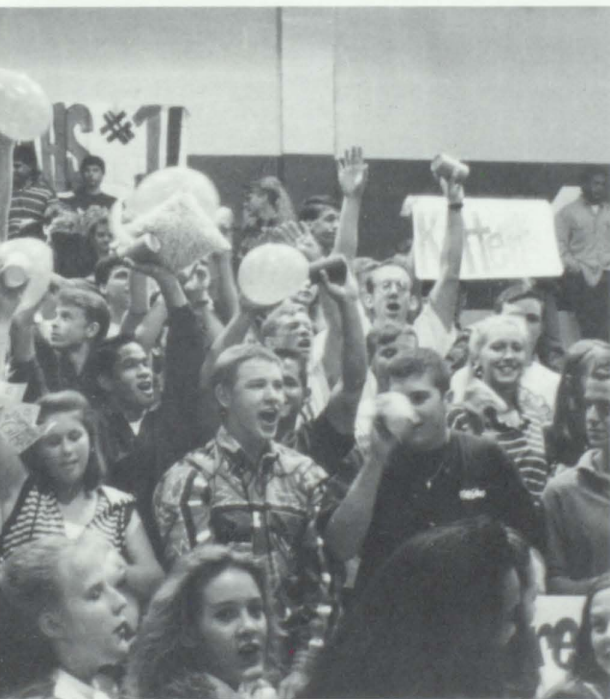

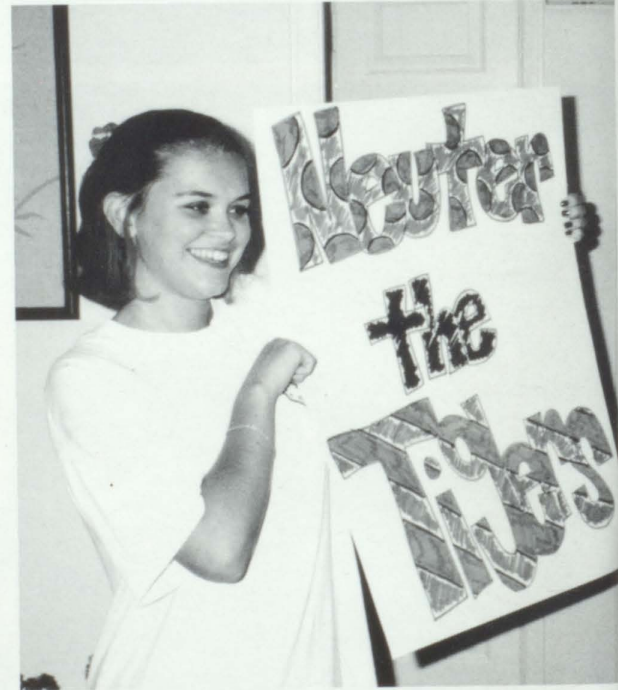
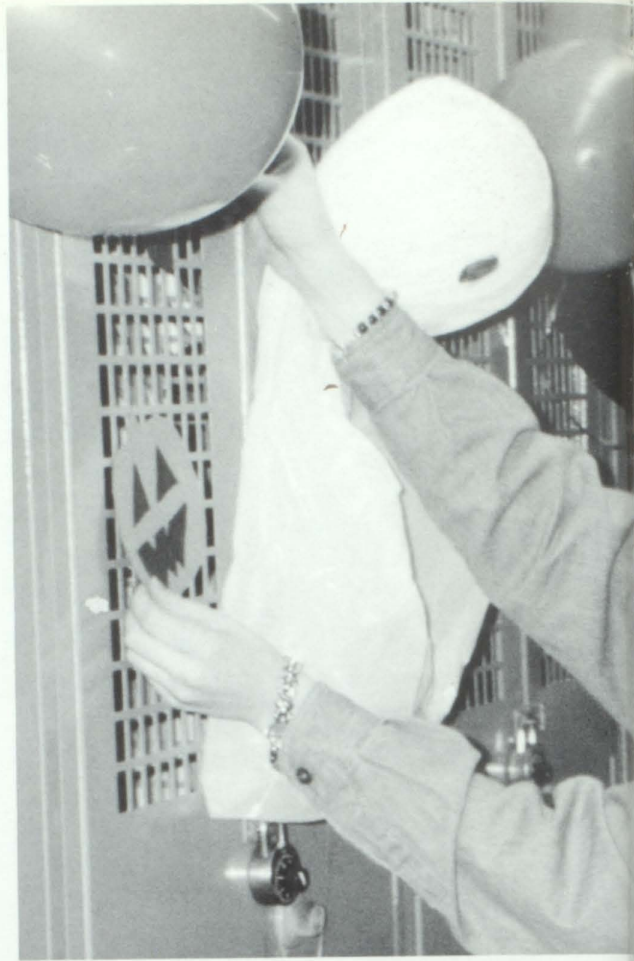
cause I liked getting the crowd involved in sports activities," Amy Wimberly said.

Dances are always the rage among students. Phrases such as 'What are you going to wear,' or 'Do you have a date,' flavored the pre-dance

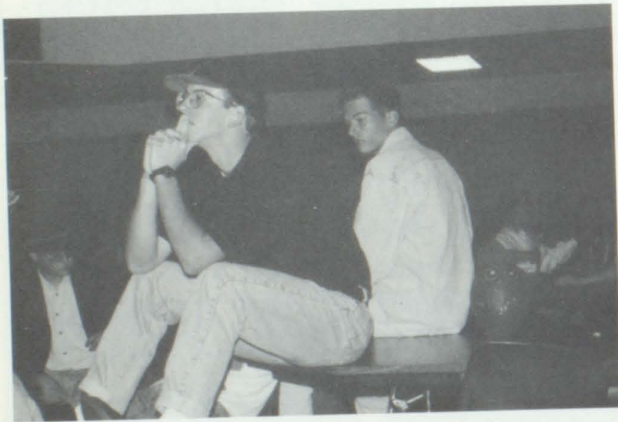
conversations.

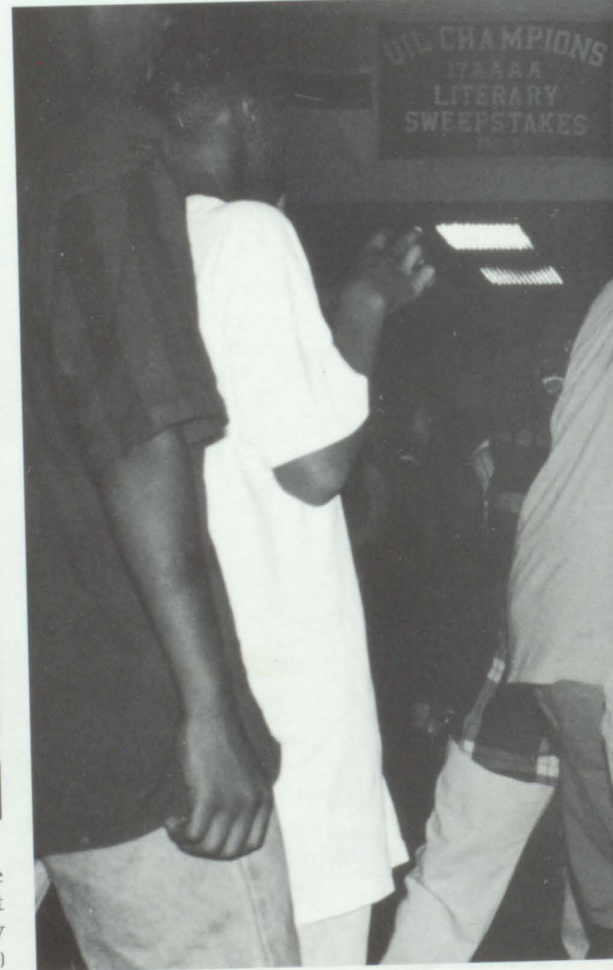

Students across campus welcomed the challenge presented by employment, gaining both money and experience. And the knowledge gained was generally worth the time spent.

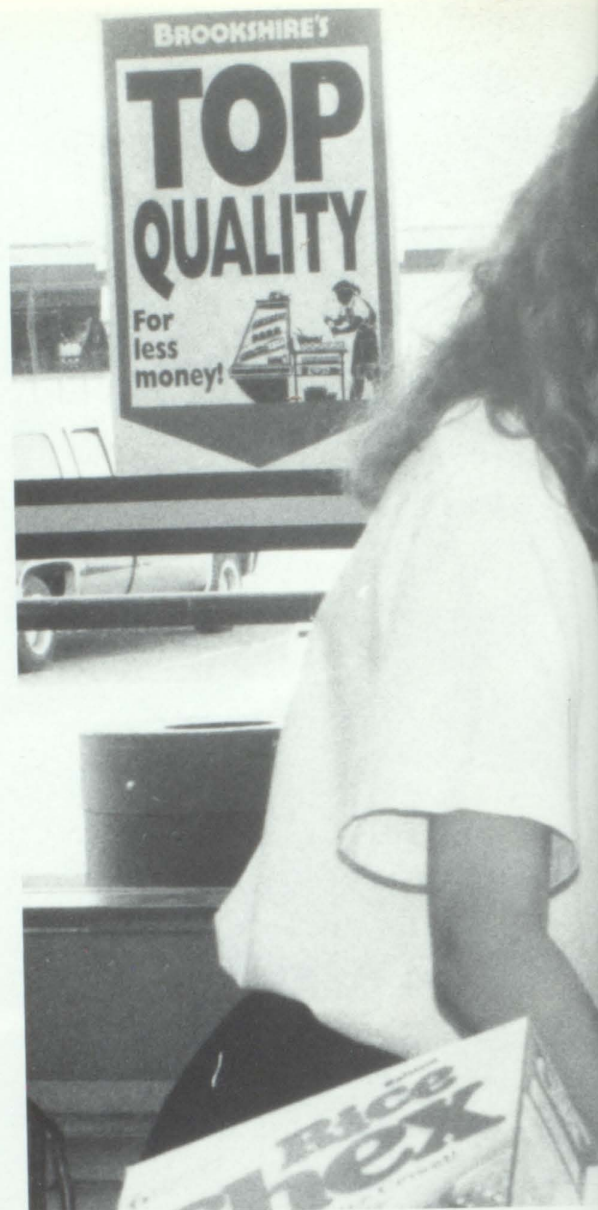

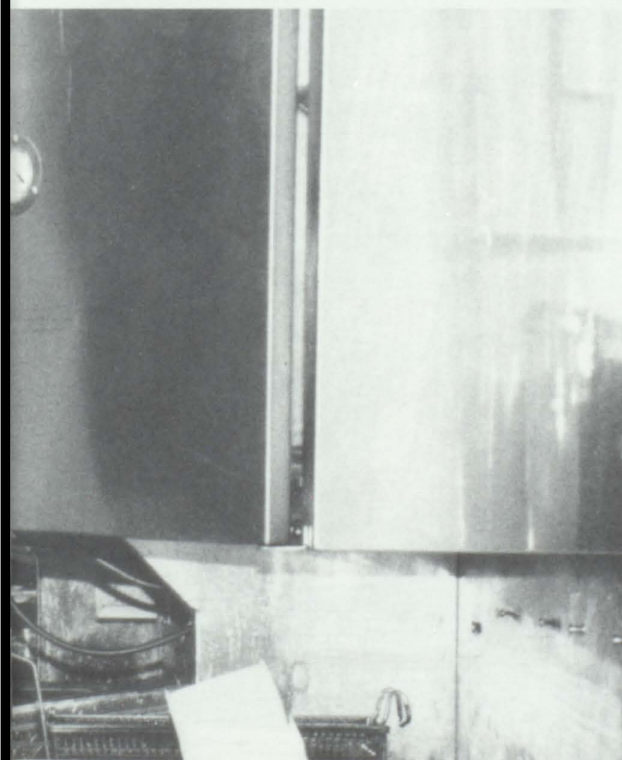

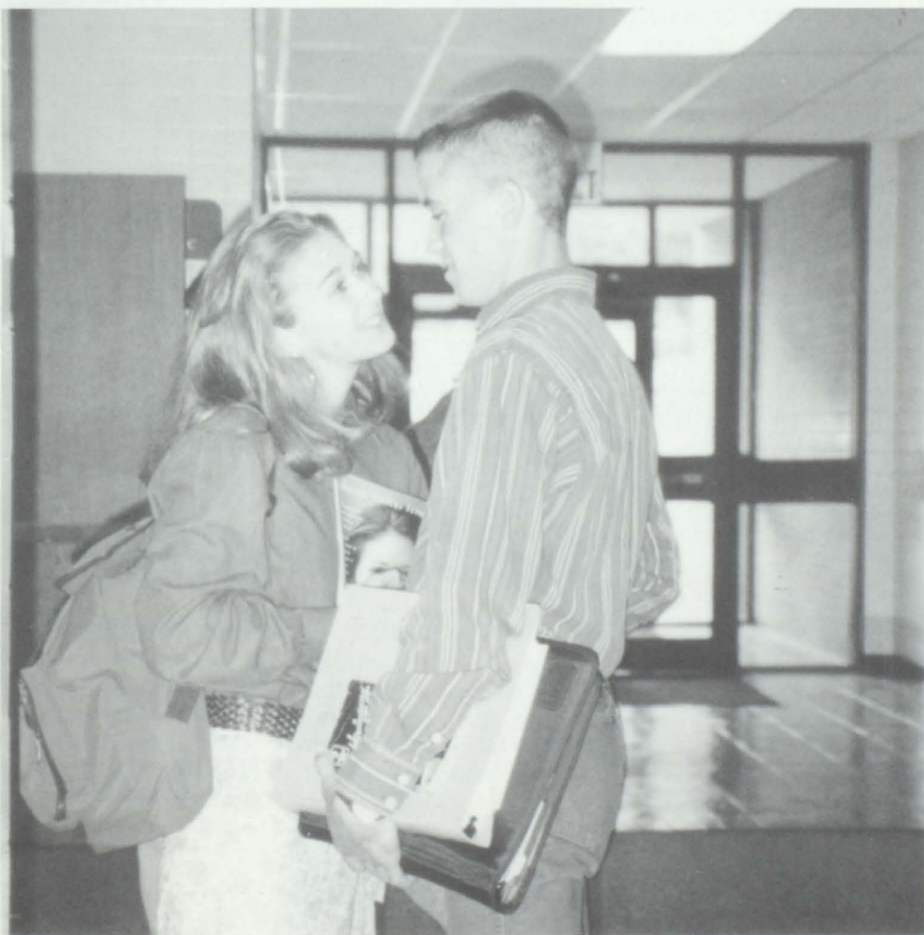
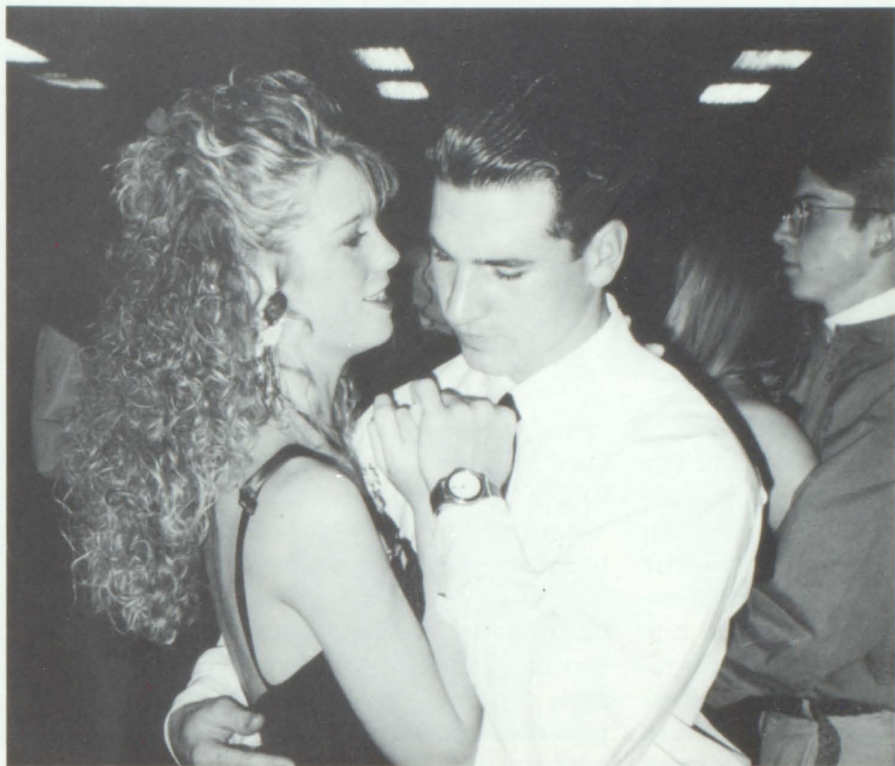

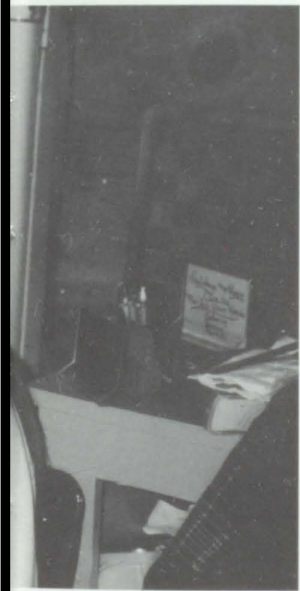

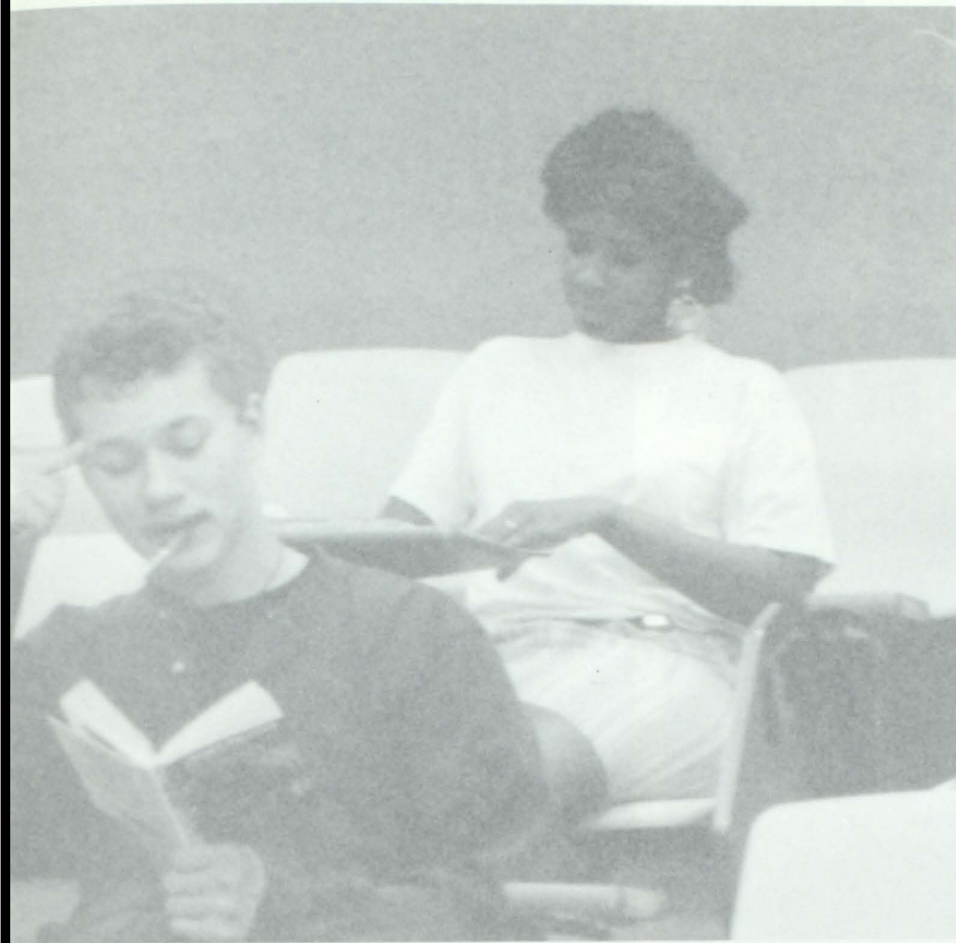

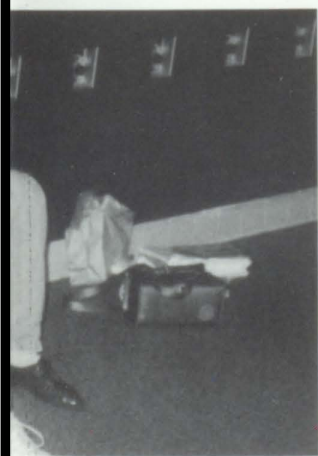

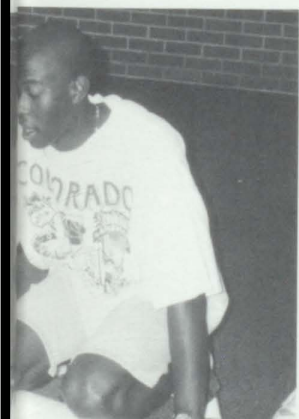

Everyone seemed startled at the results of the decorating. It was definitely a night to be remembered. "I had a great time. It was wonderful," Monica Perkins said.



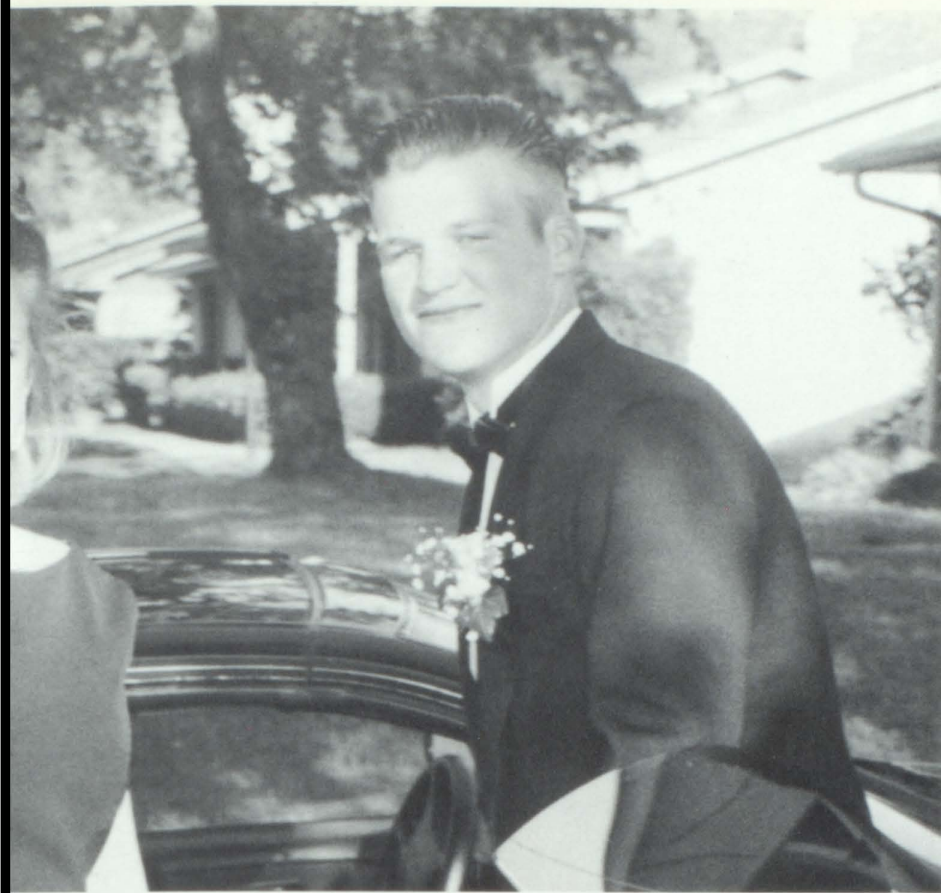

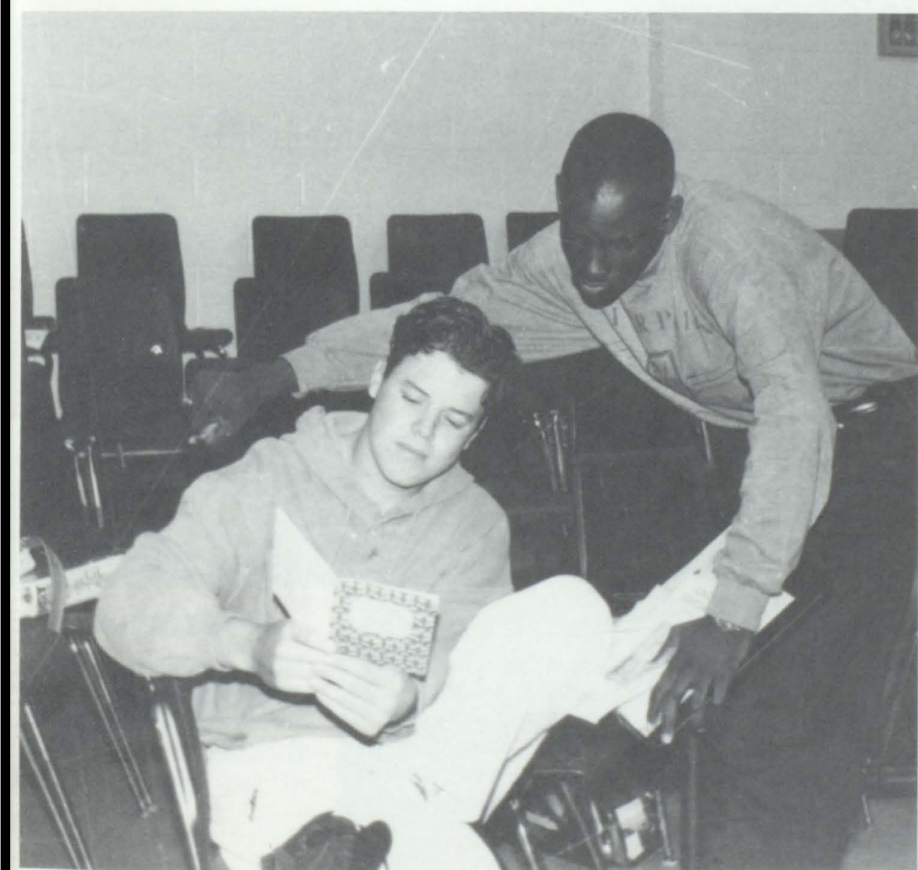

ties and seventies fashions are, therefore I personally do not think anyone here dresses the way they did including me," Wendy Giles said.

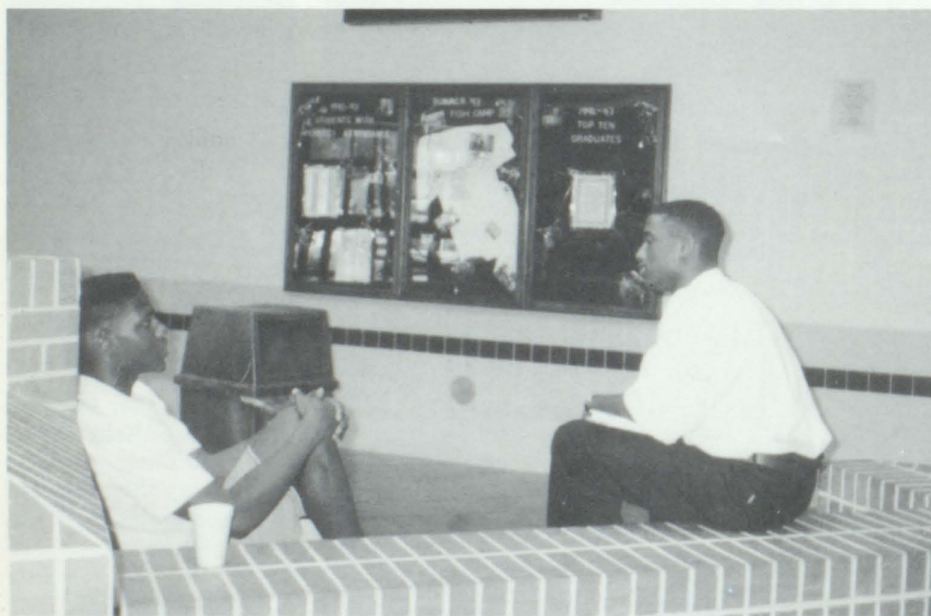

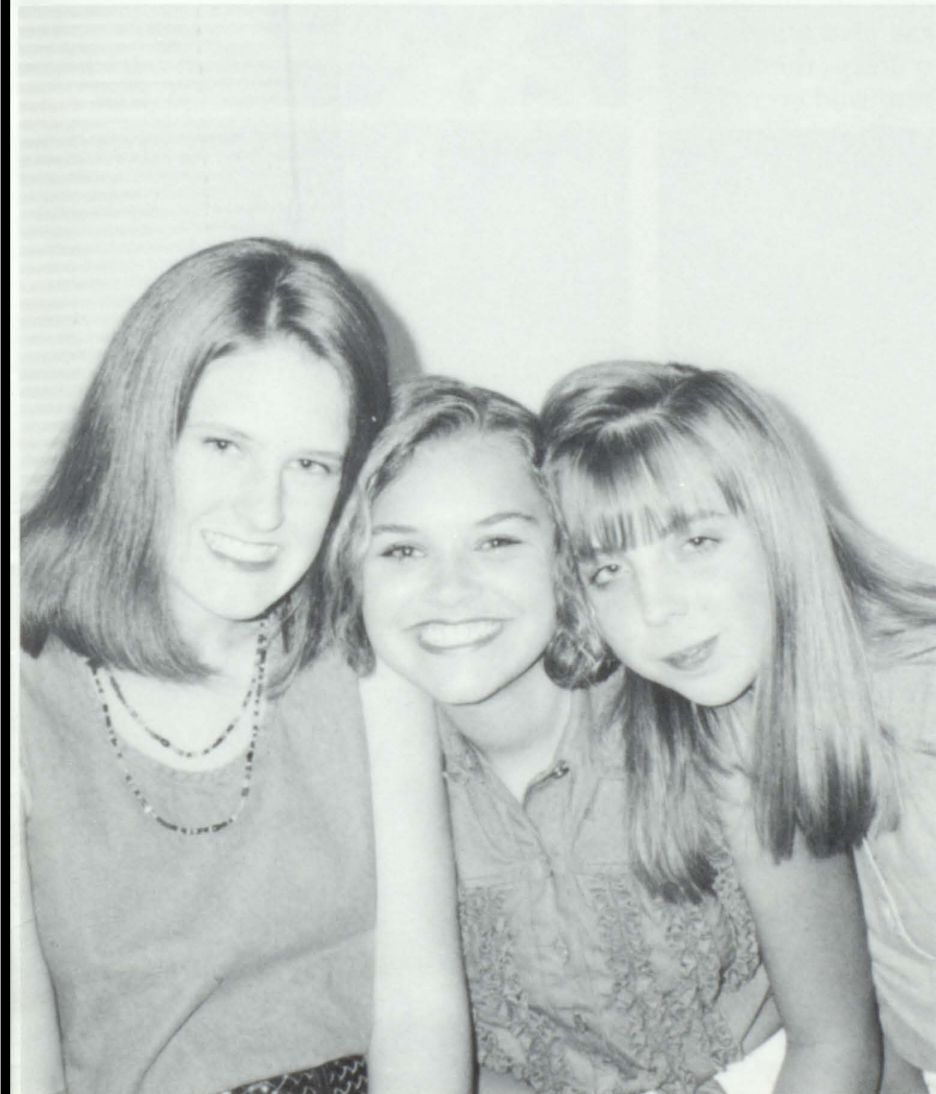

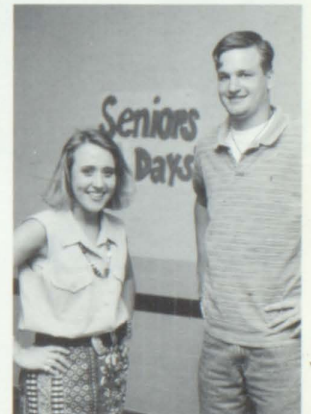

Some used the moments to chat with friends and loved ones. Making friends and talking with old ones was a way to enlighten the

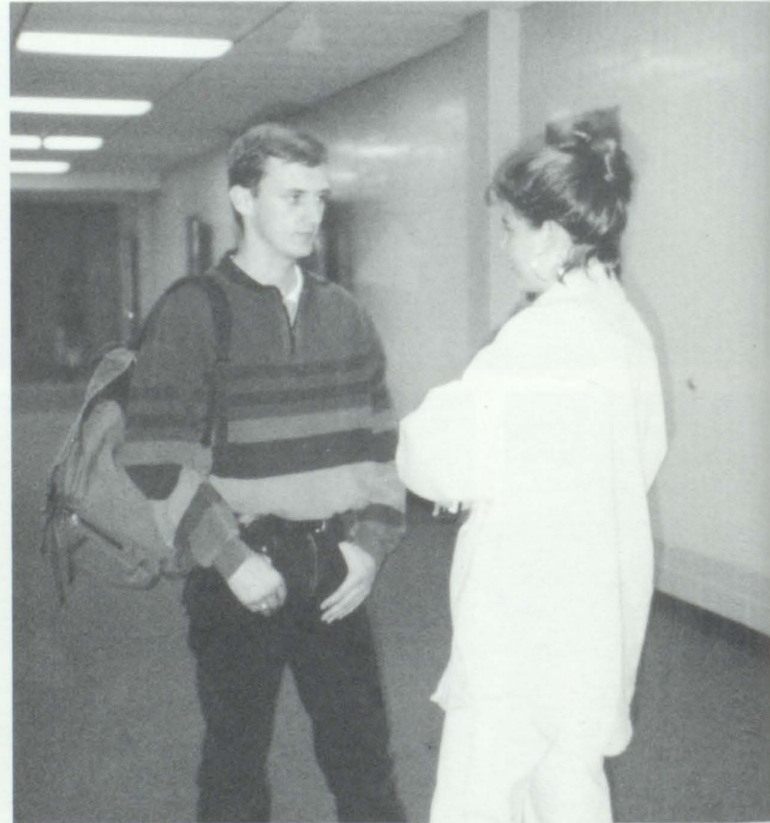

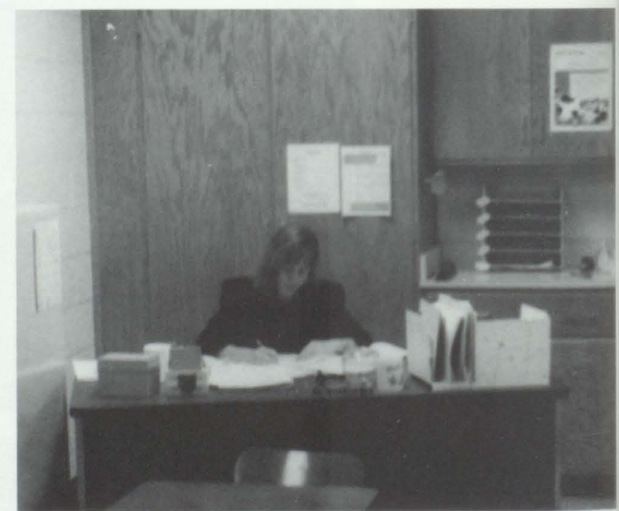
constantly amazed at their creativity and ingenuity," Cheryl Hicks said.

Many of the new teachers thought the atmosphere was a big change, but the technology at Athens High helped with the alteration of their lives.



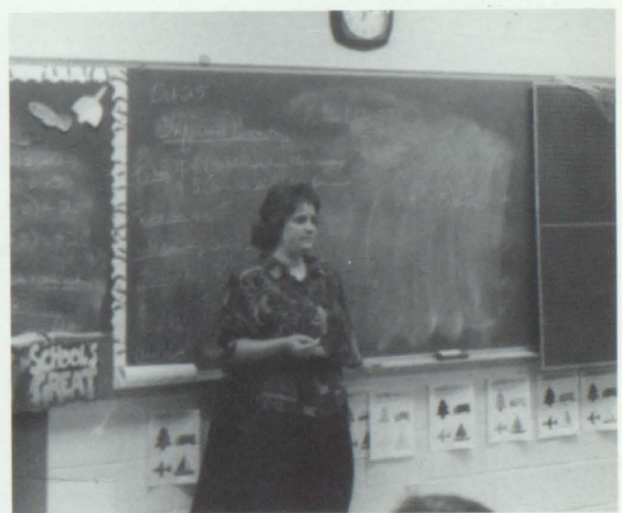
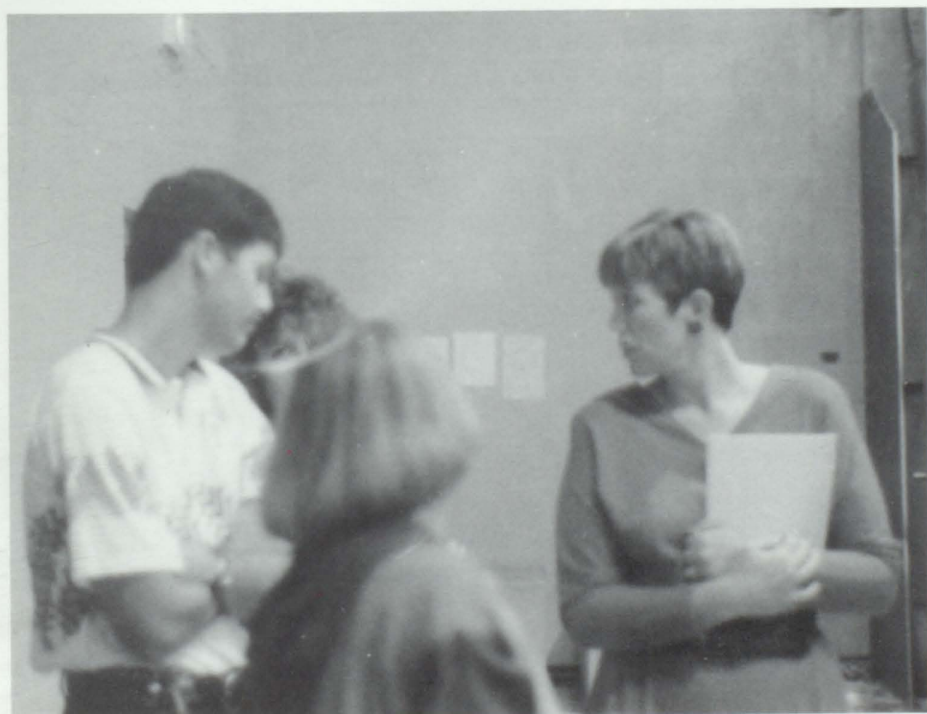

"The Renaissance program keeps students involved in school," said Assistant Principal, John Burkhart.

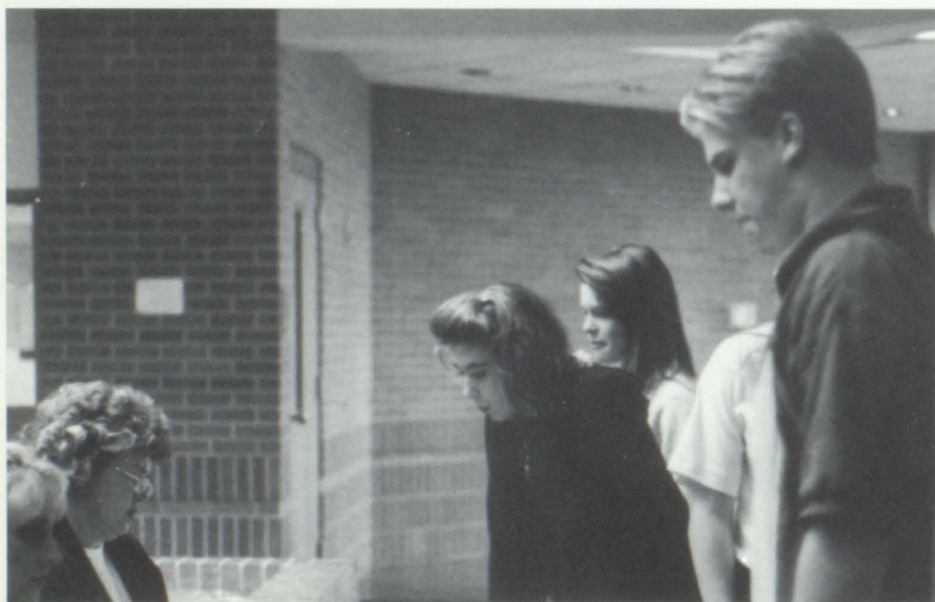
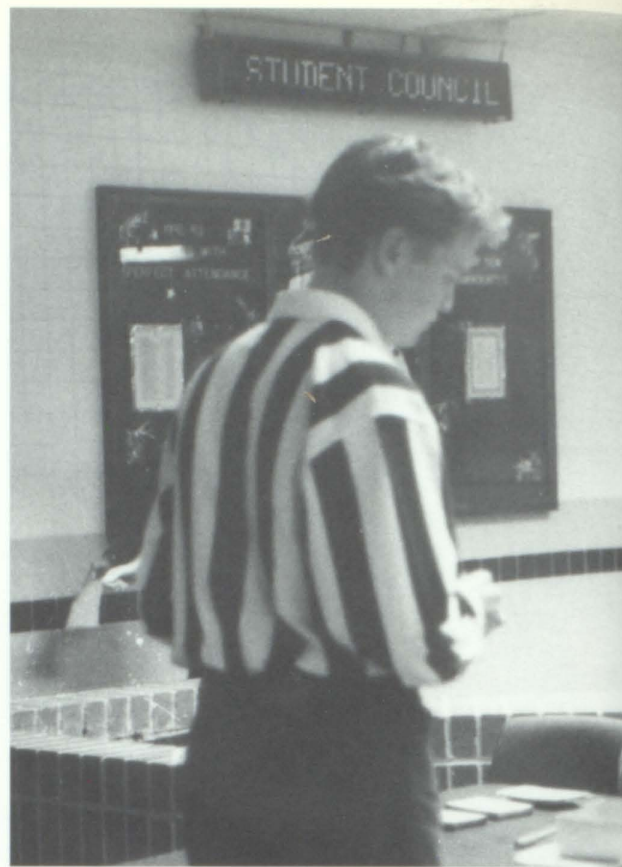
"I think that the Renaissance program really motivates students to try their best

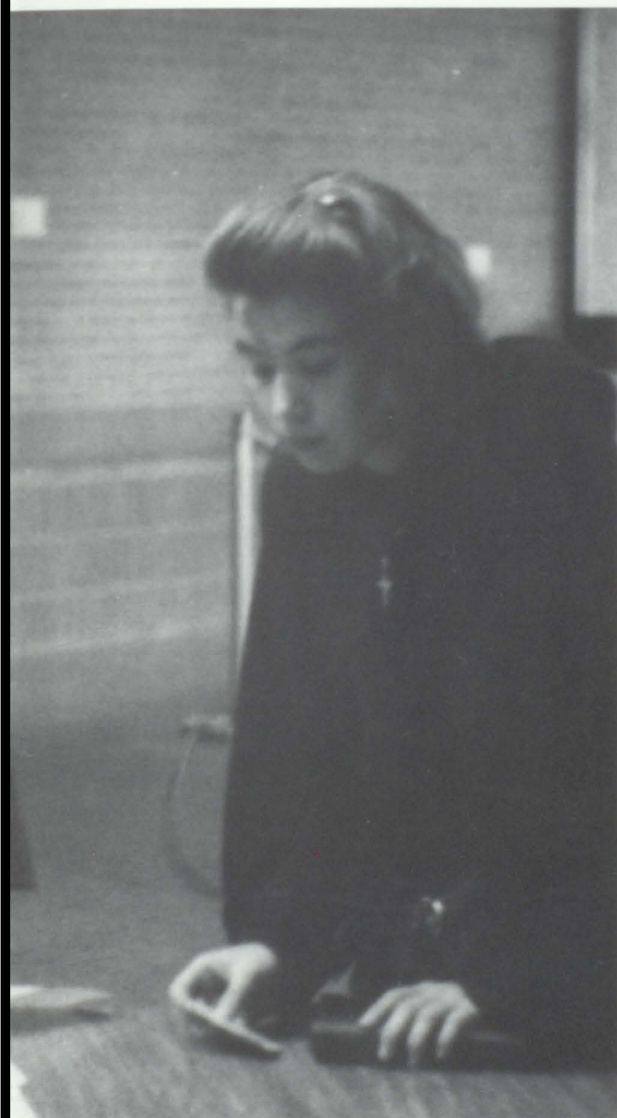
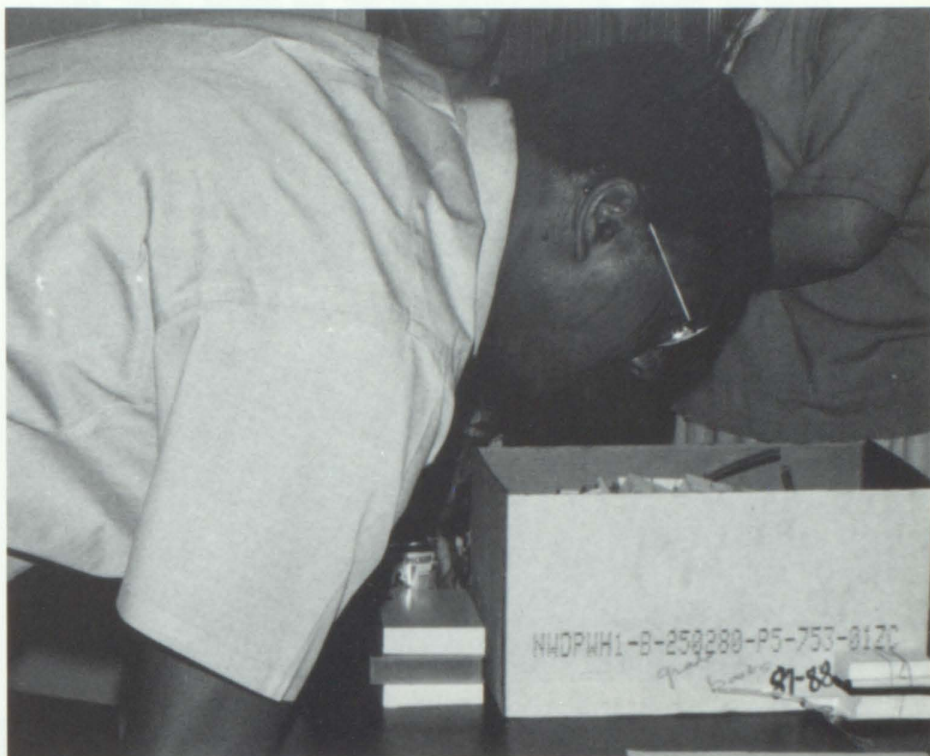
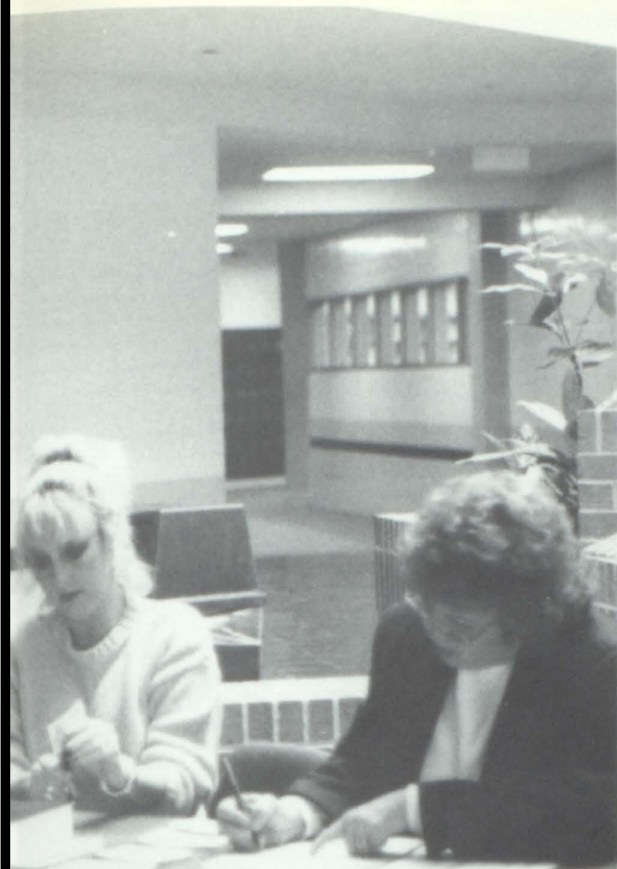

"I like my vocational class because you learn a lot and it also teaches you responsibilities," Jason Baker said.

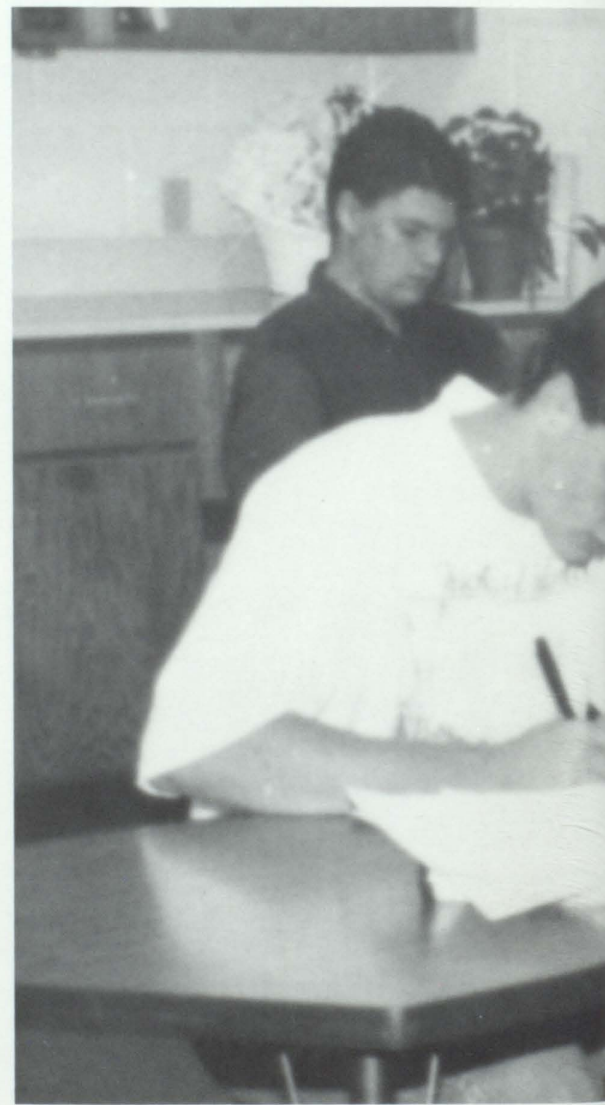
"My class teaches more about the business world and helps more than what I would imagine," Chris Tiner said.

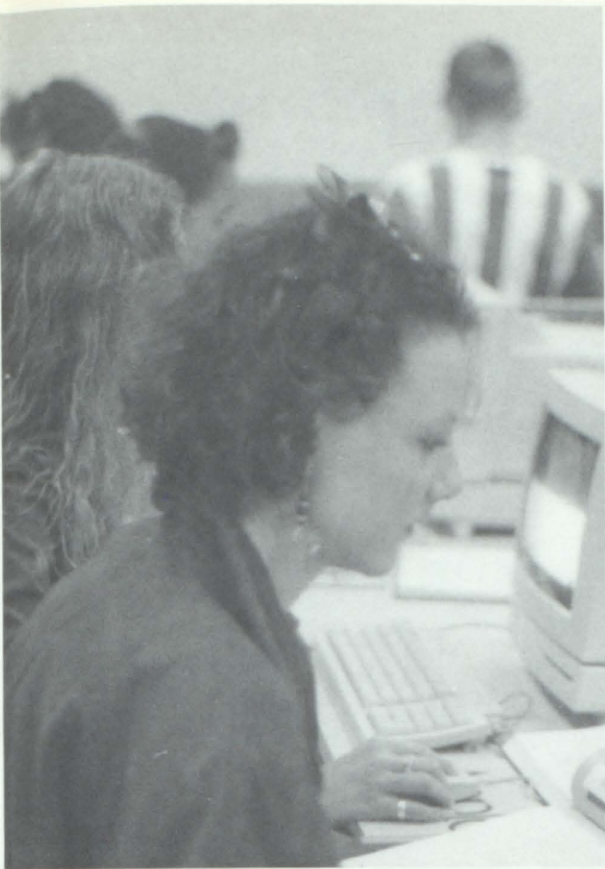

Drama at AHS can be summed up in one Shakespearean quote which Jessica Richardson cited, "All the world is but a stage, and all the men and women are merely players."

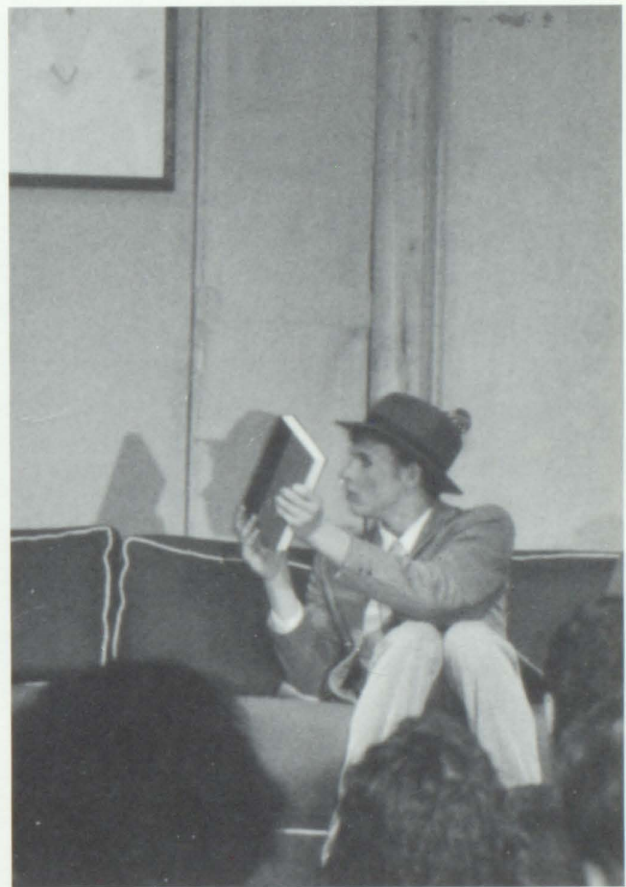

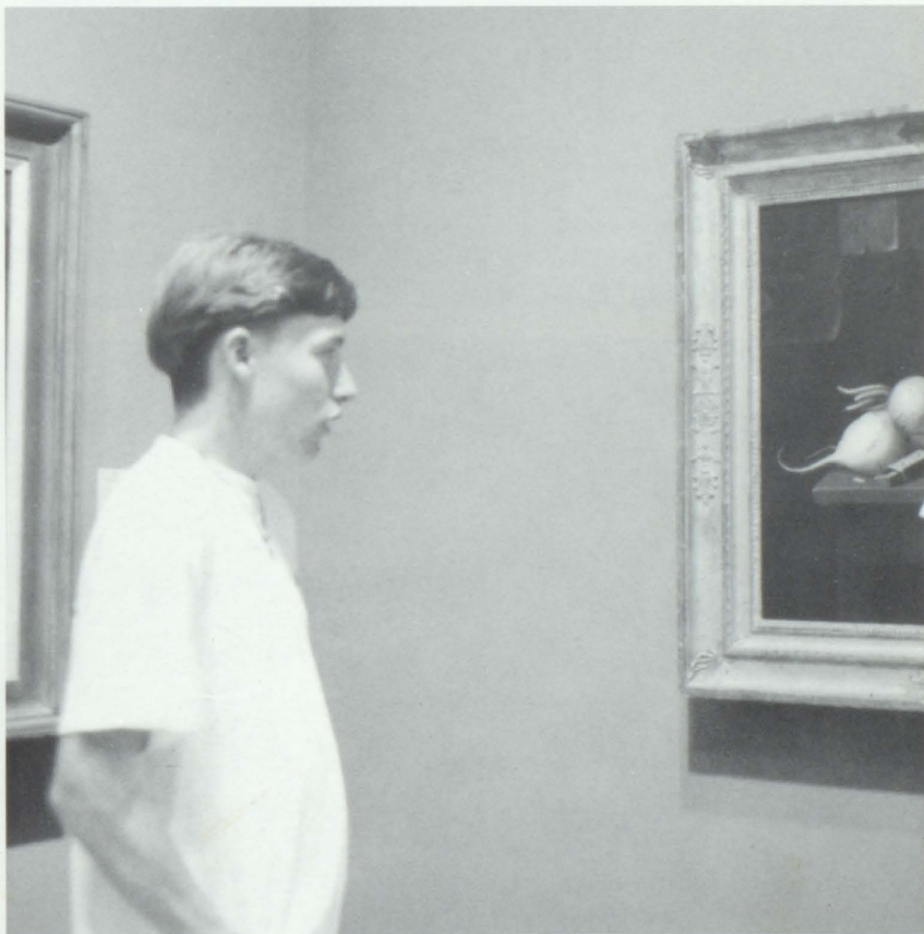
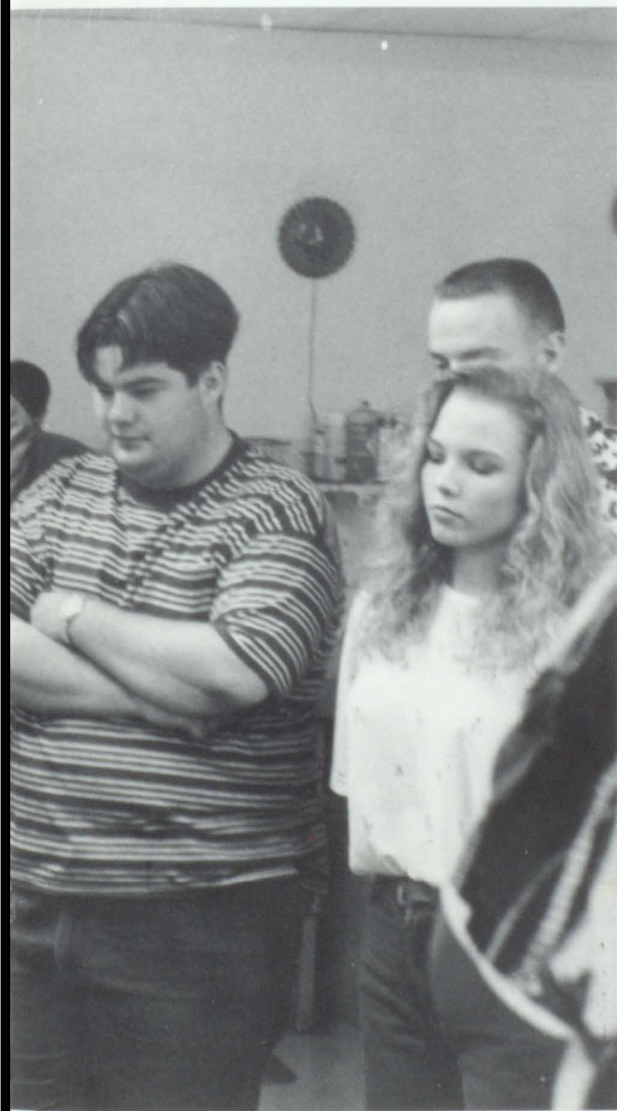

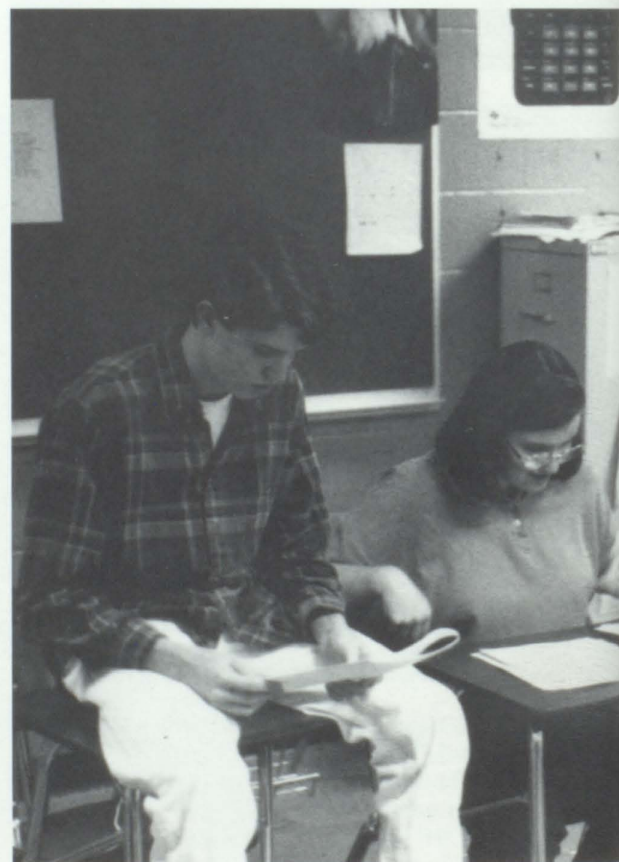
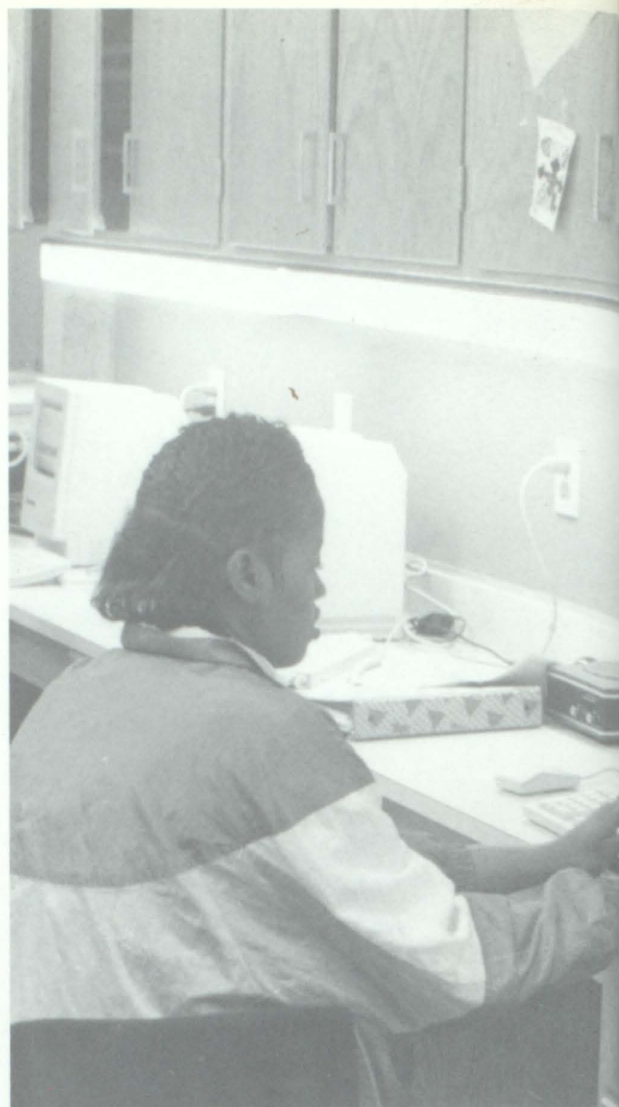
"UIL competition is great experience for future journalists. They learn what it is like to work under pressure with a limited amount of information," Hicks said.

Do you have a study habit? For example, studying a phrase over and over to memorize it? Or do you have a particular method that you use when you read in order to remember the material?

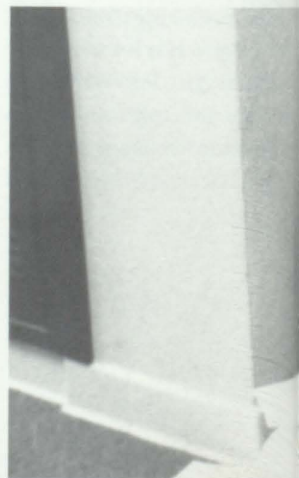
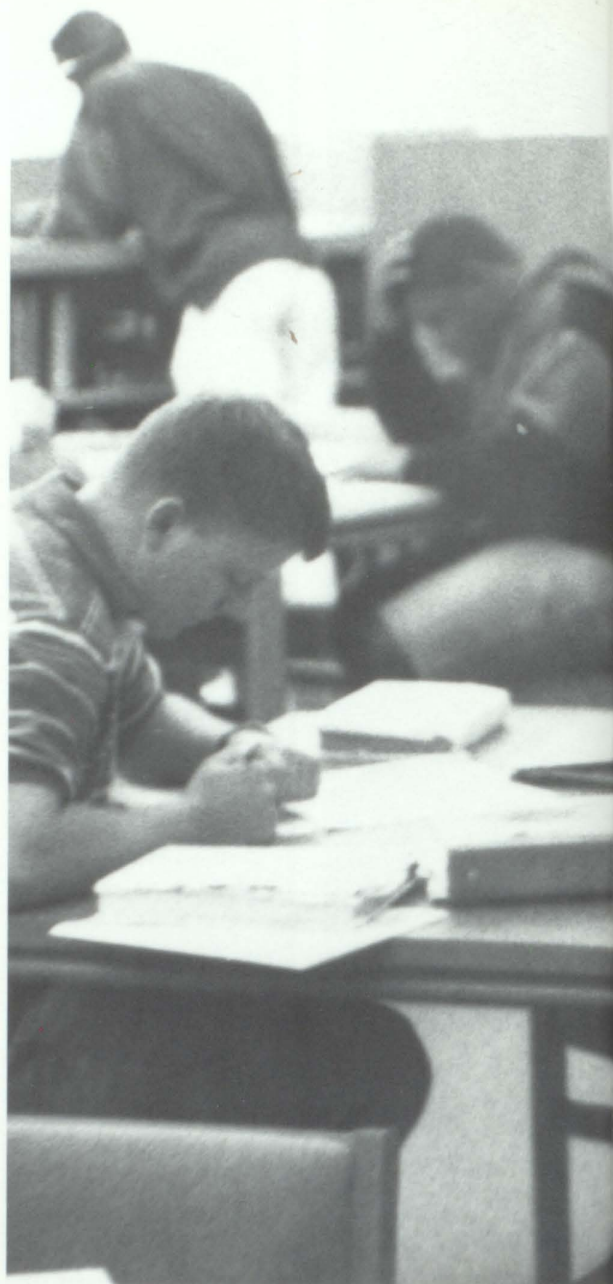
Or do you have to sit in a special place to study? "Having a quiet place to study enables me to concentrate more on a test," Robin Rayburn said. Some people find that they can

coaches really turned us around. They worked us hard, but we had fun," Wesley Teasdale said.

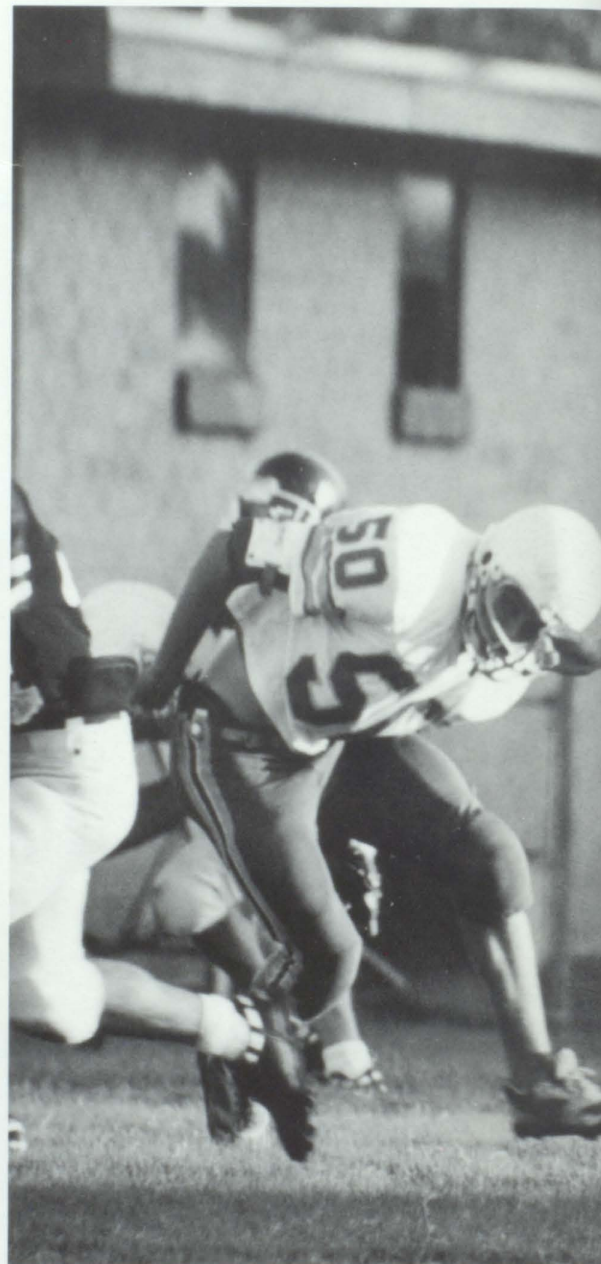

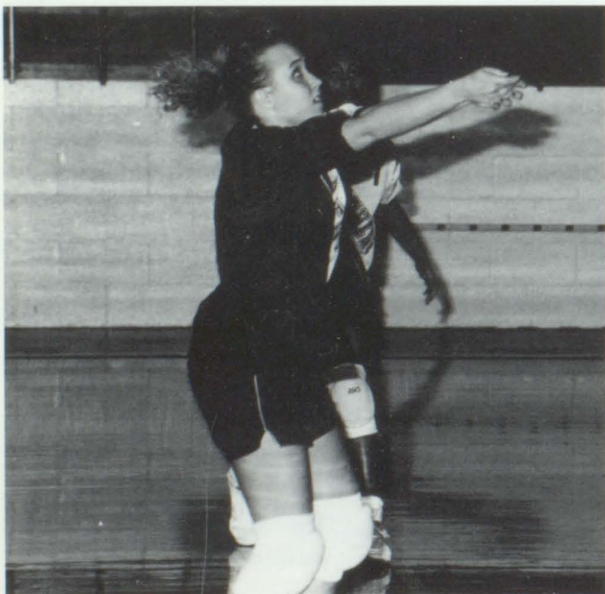

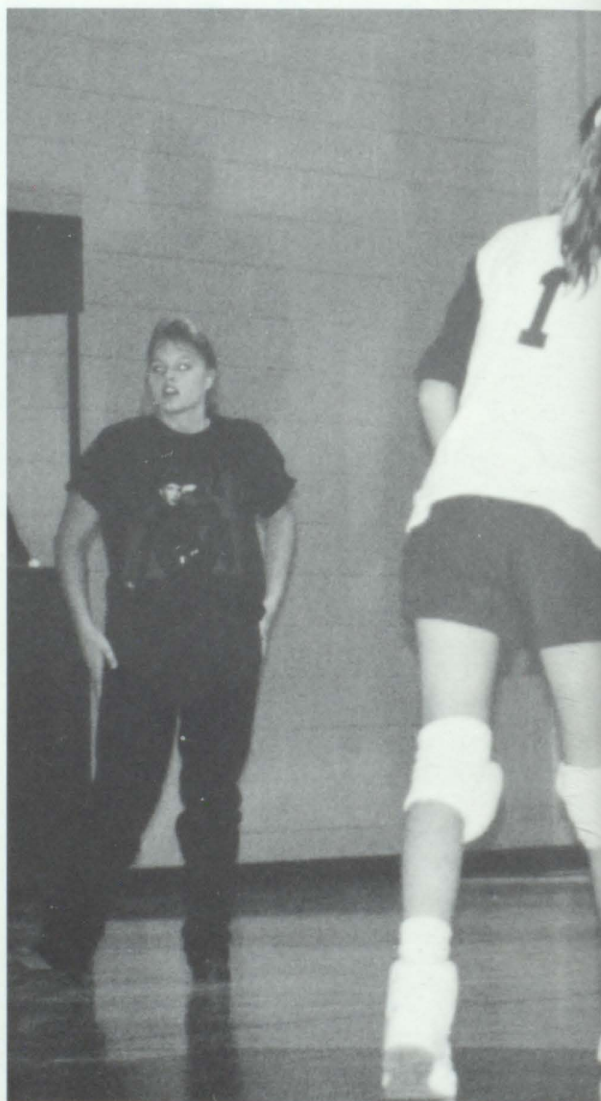

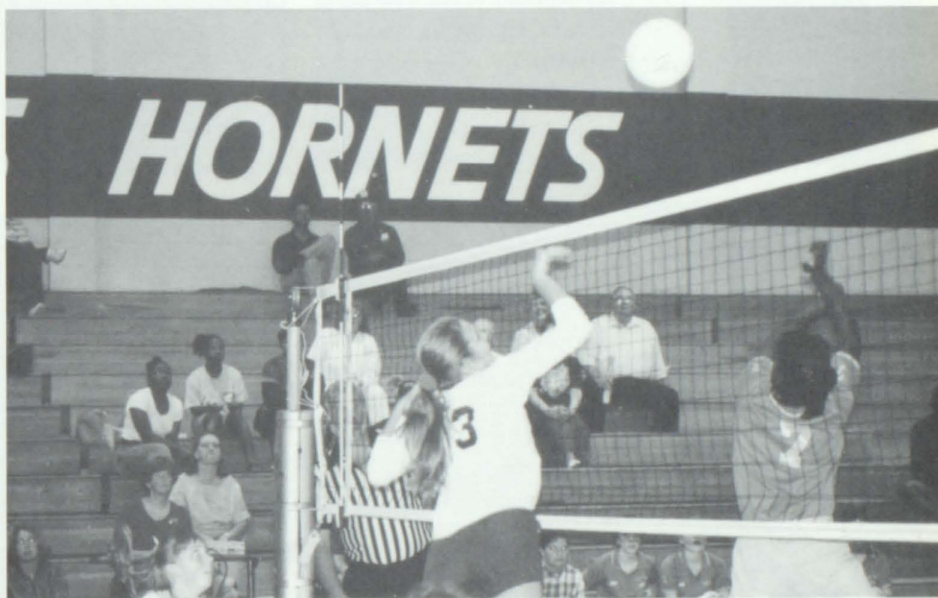
Freshmen Gain Much Experience

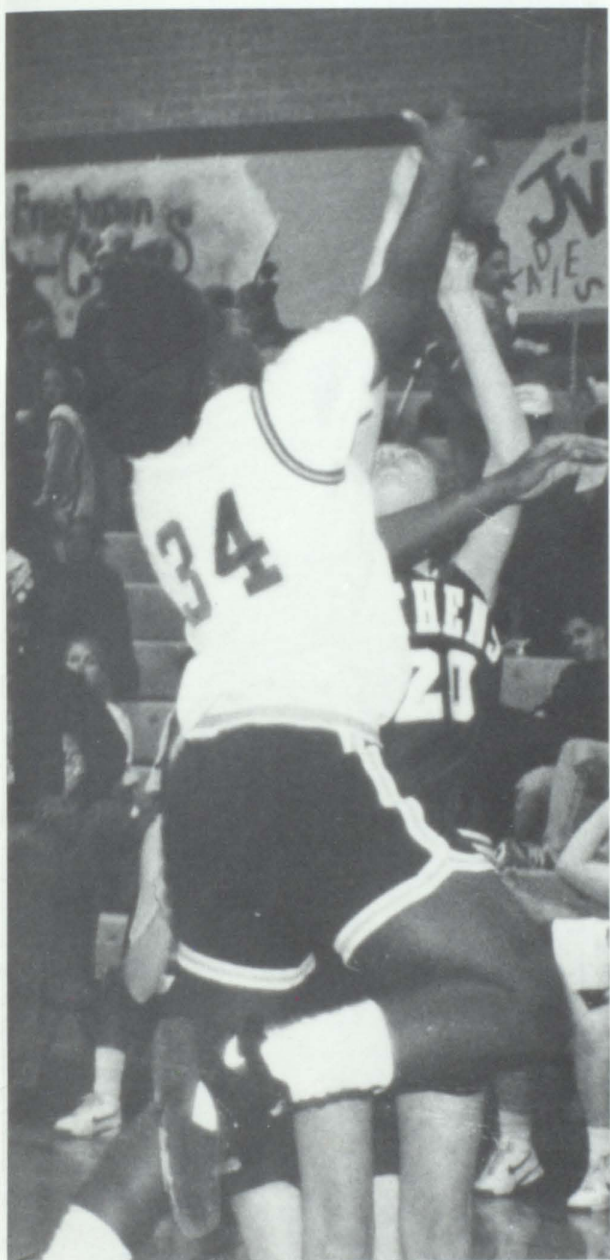

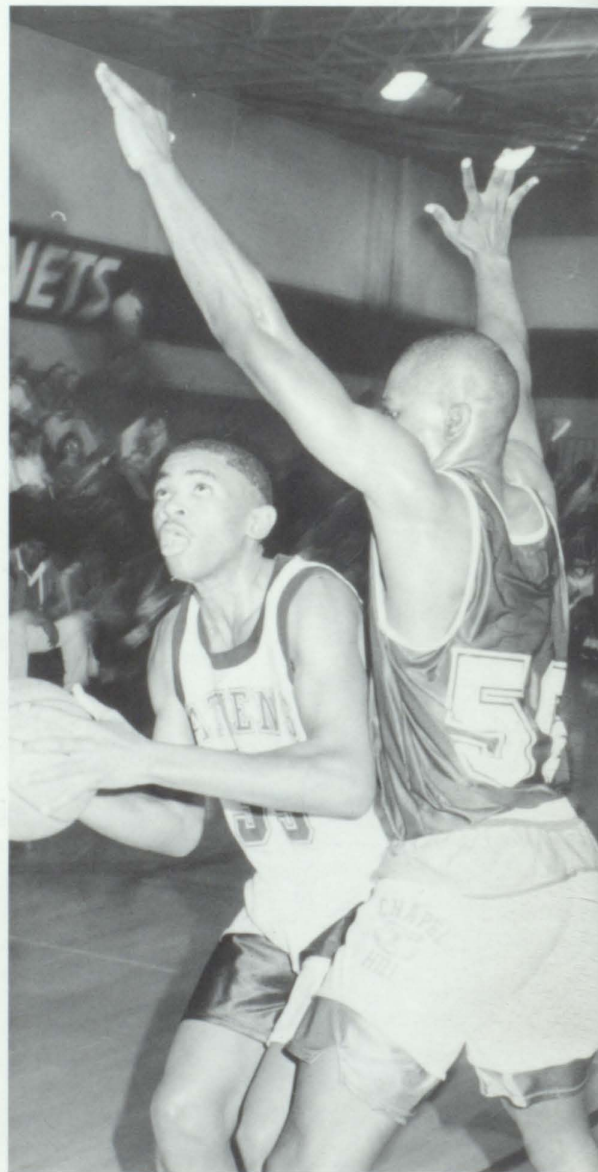

Each one of the boys worked hard as a team member so that together they could succeed as a team.

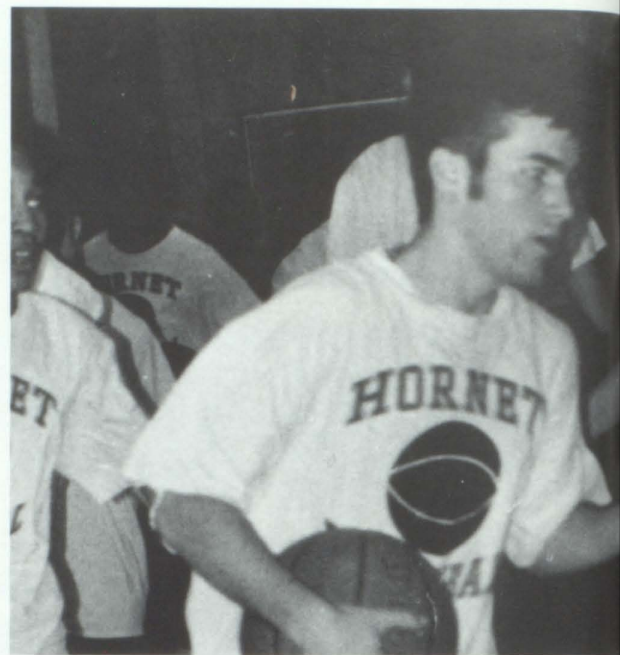
"I've worked extremely hard this year so I could earn a spot on varsity," Josh Hammond said. "Our team worked together to make this season exceptionally

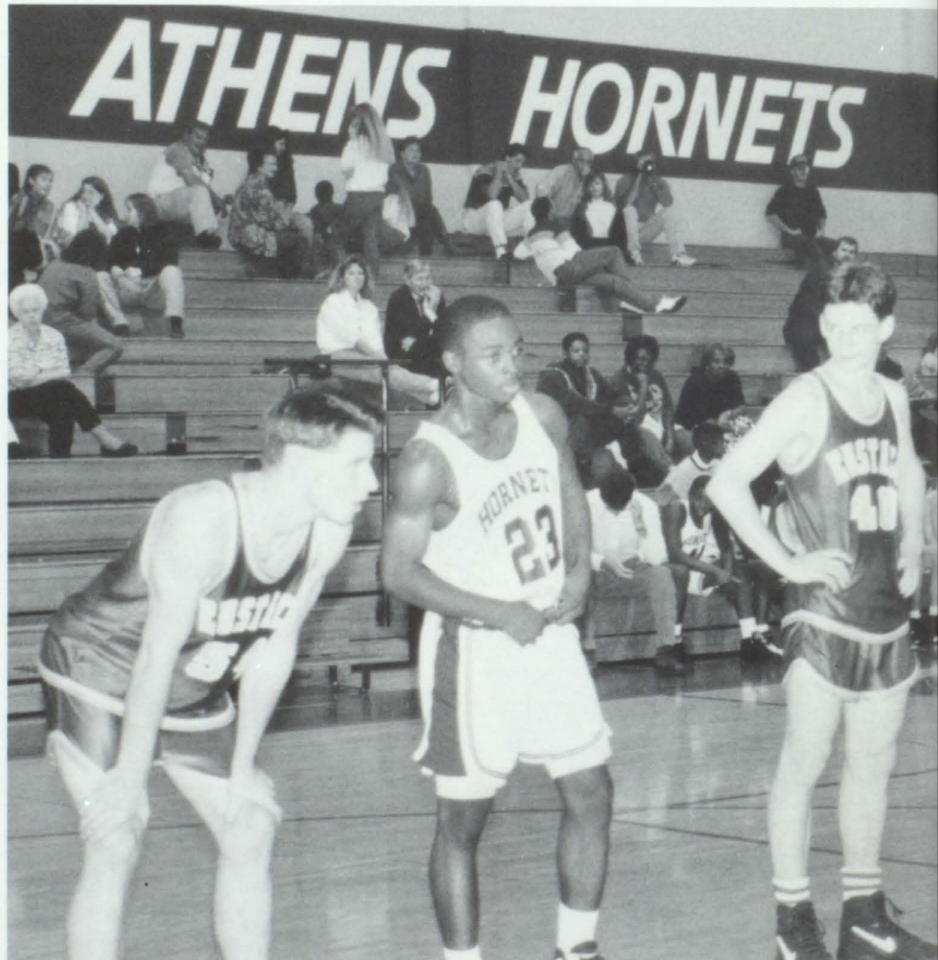

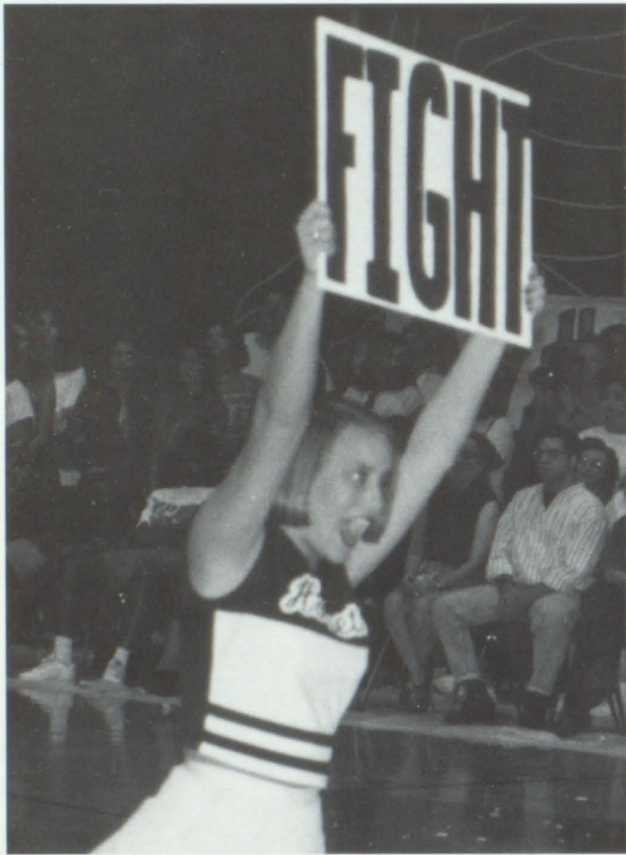

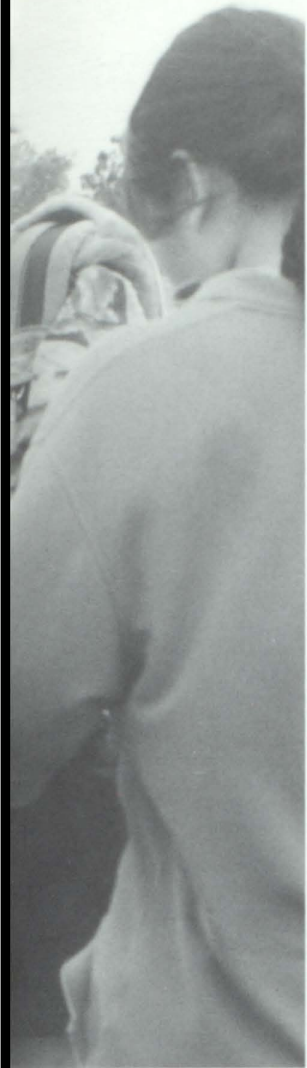

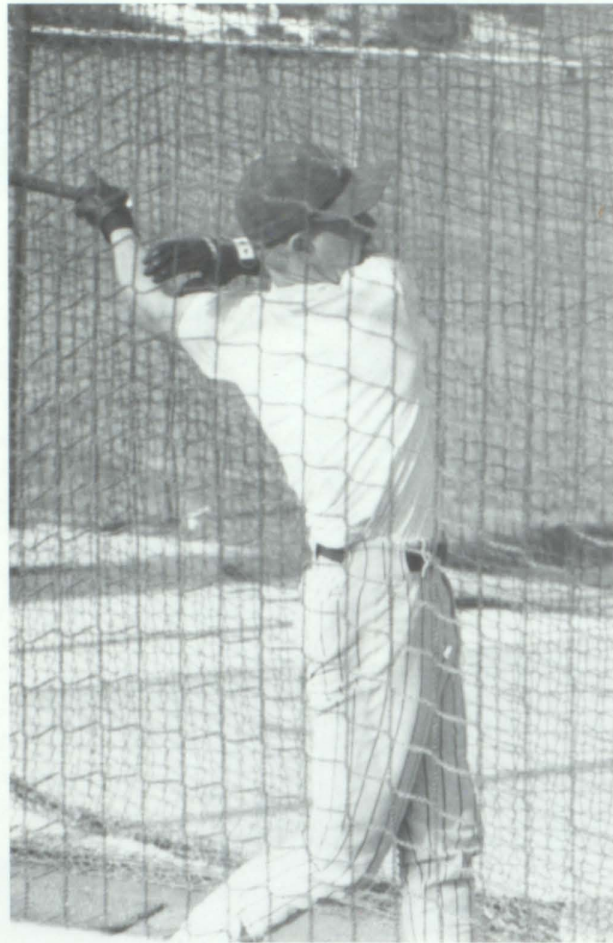

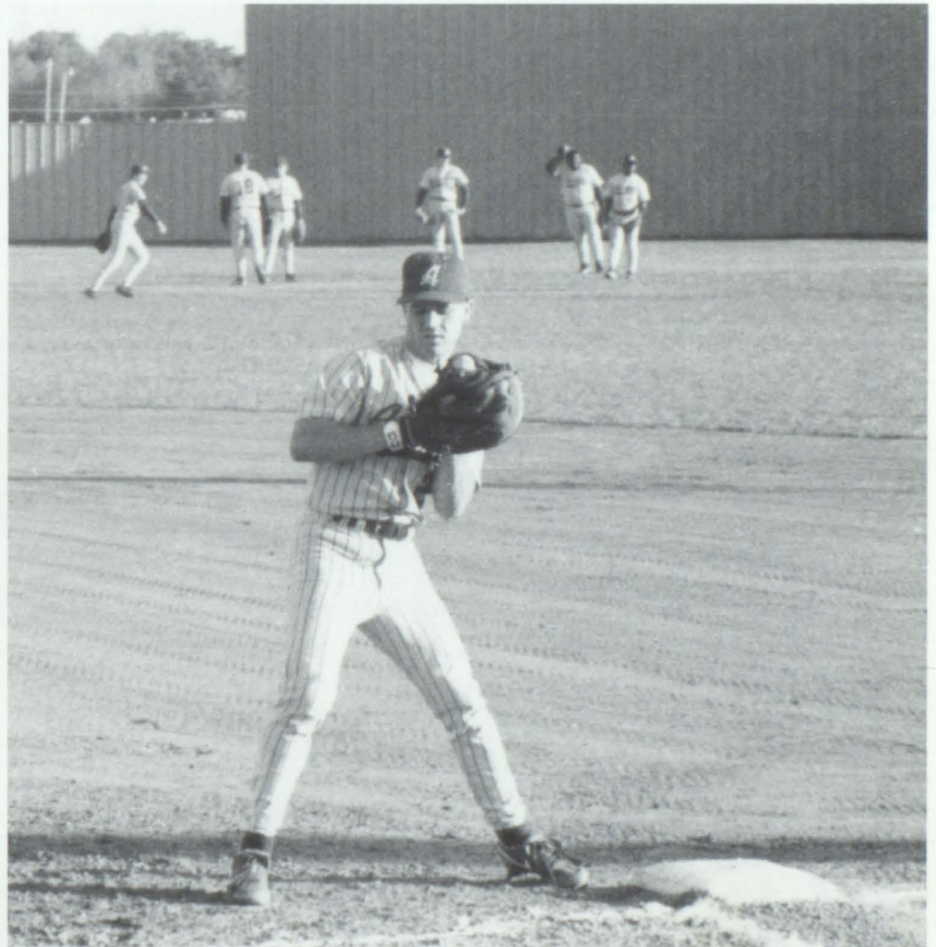
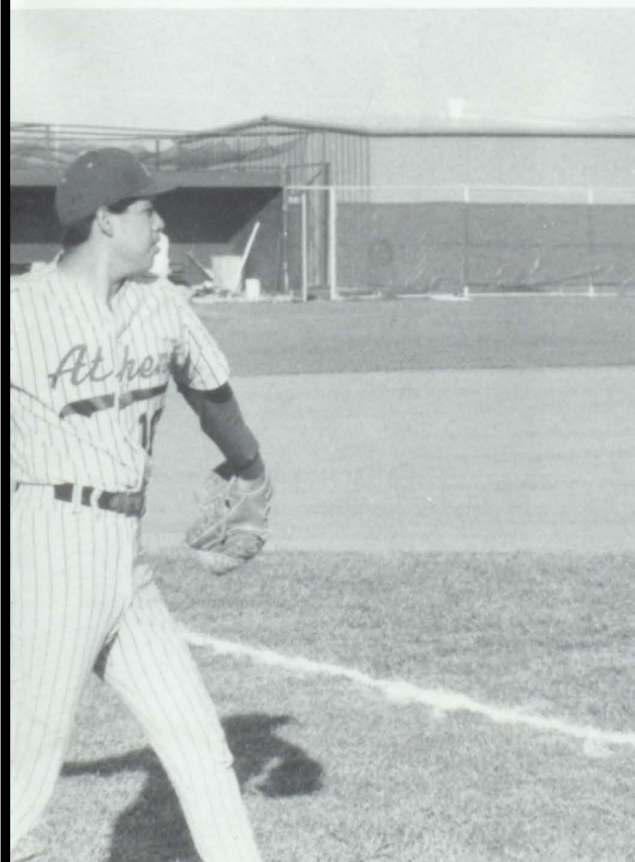
Season Not Very Predictable

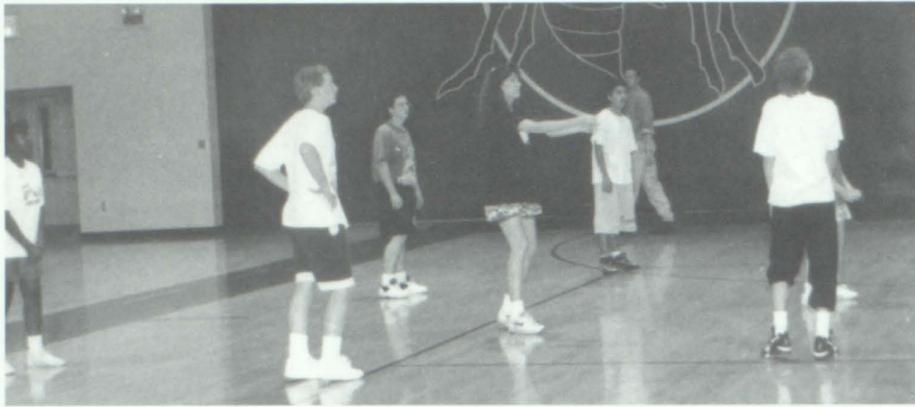

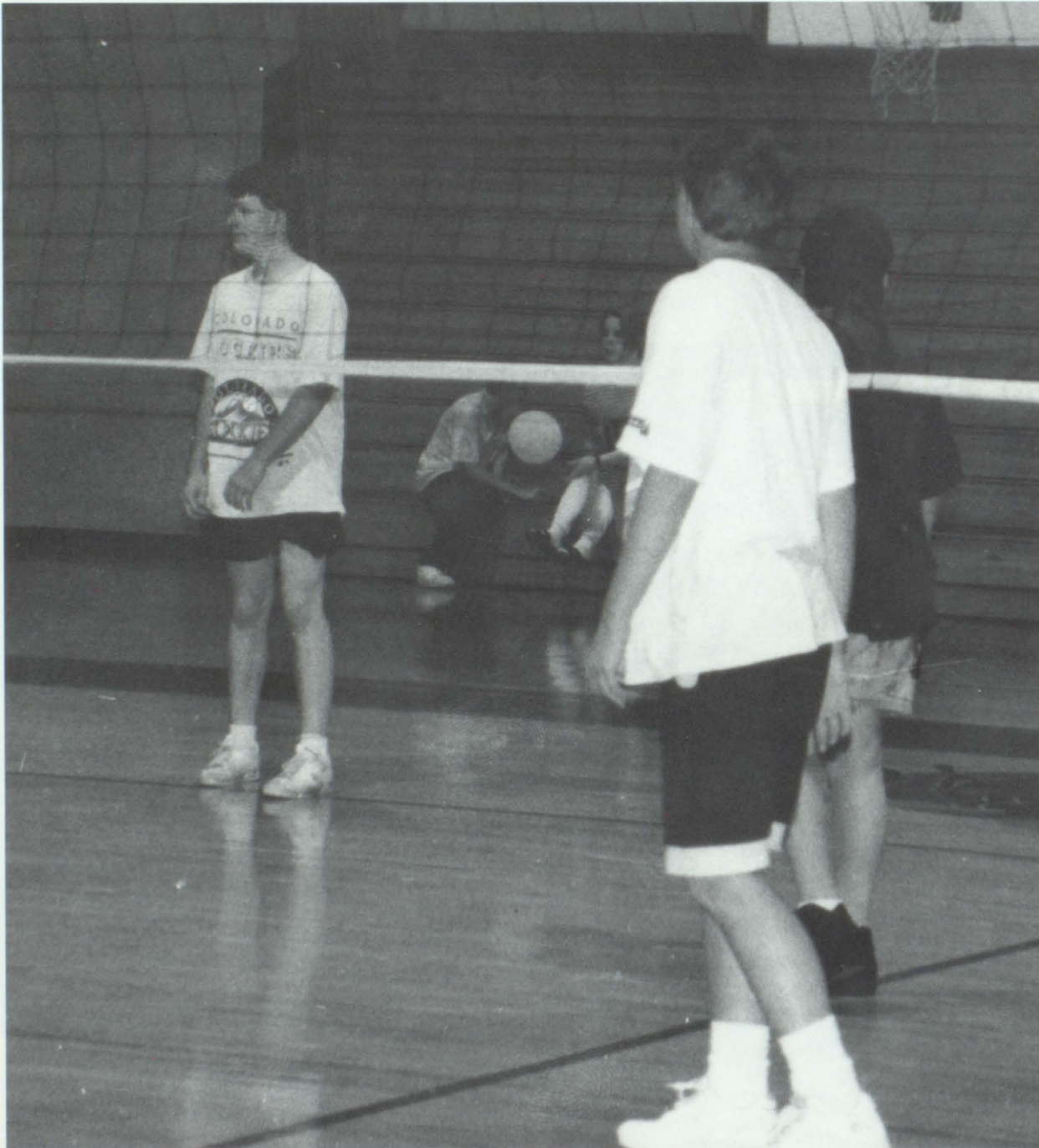

Coaches Help Many

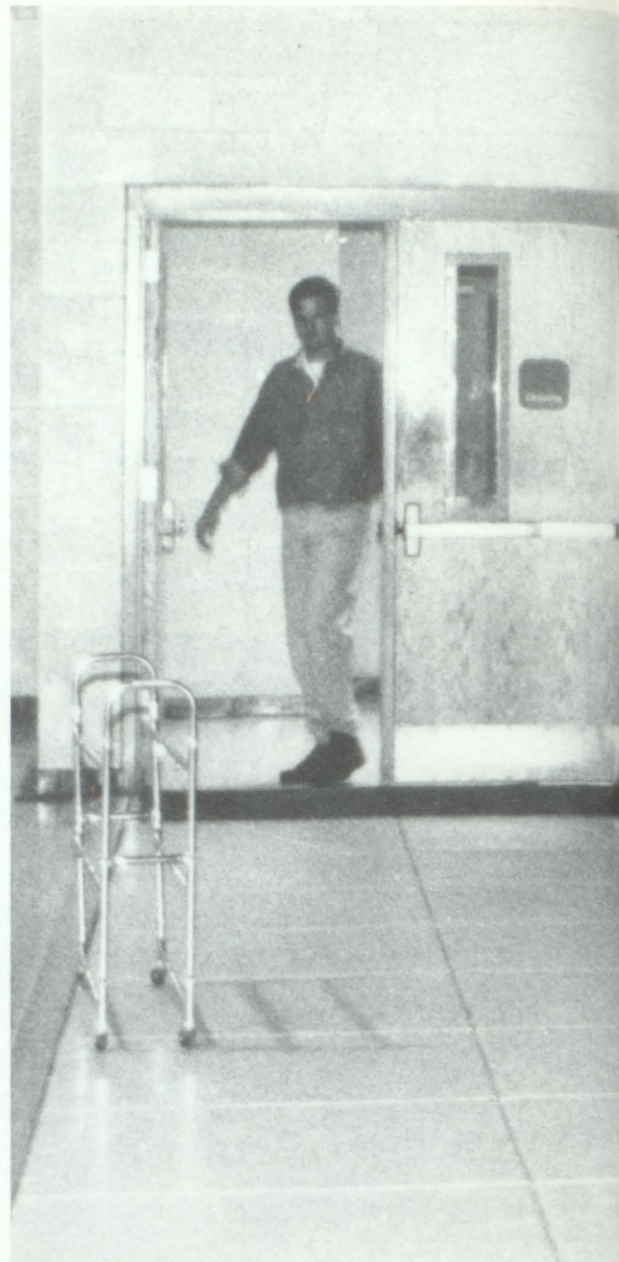

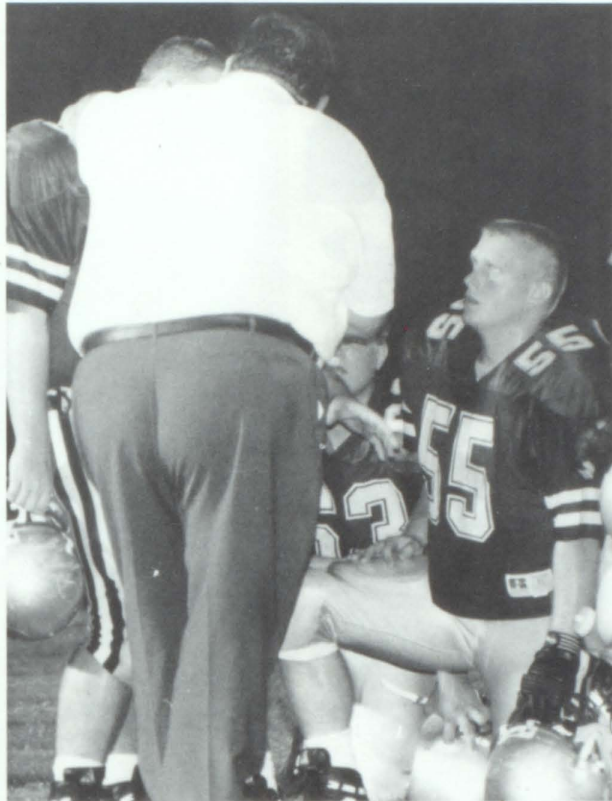

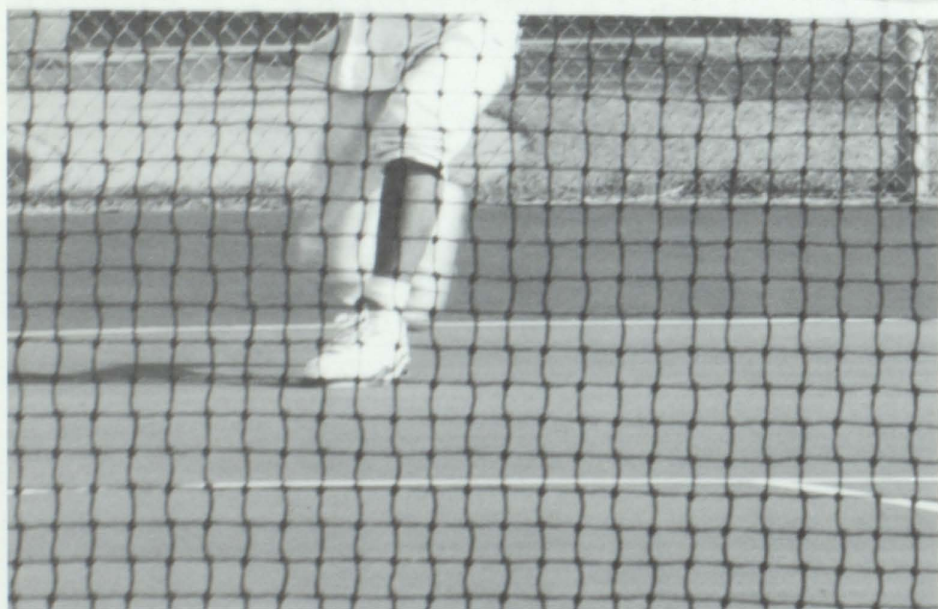

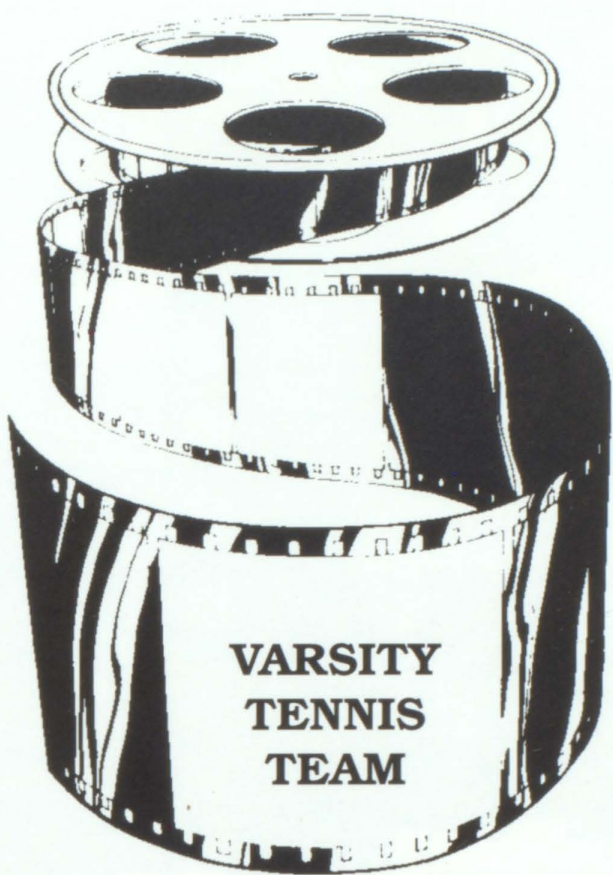

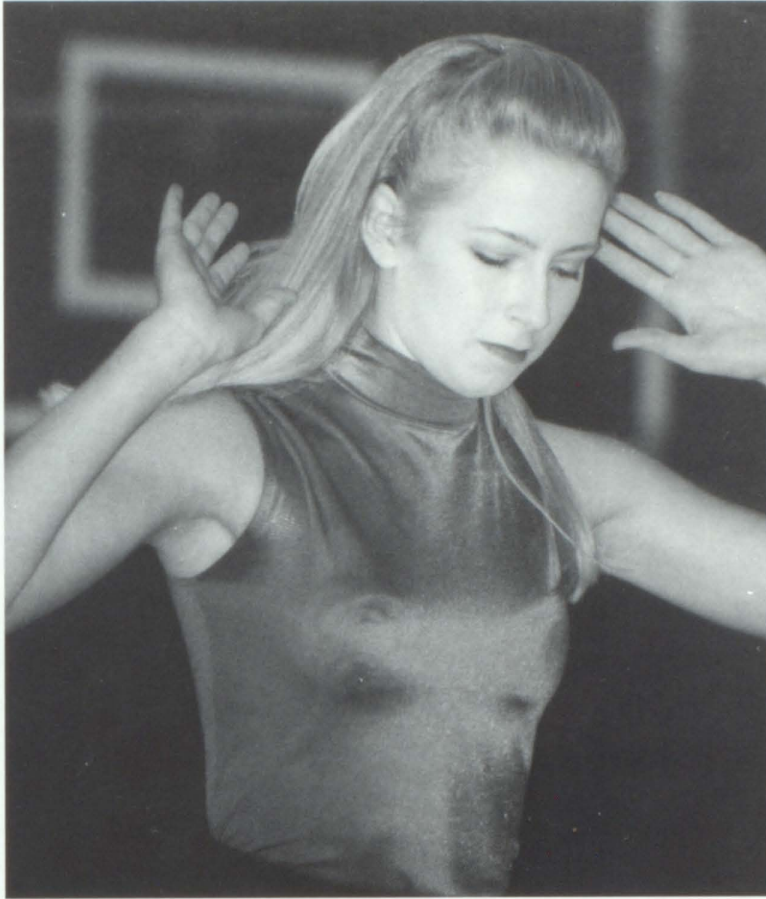

The girls were also

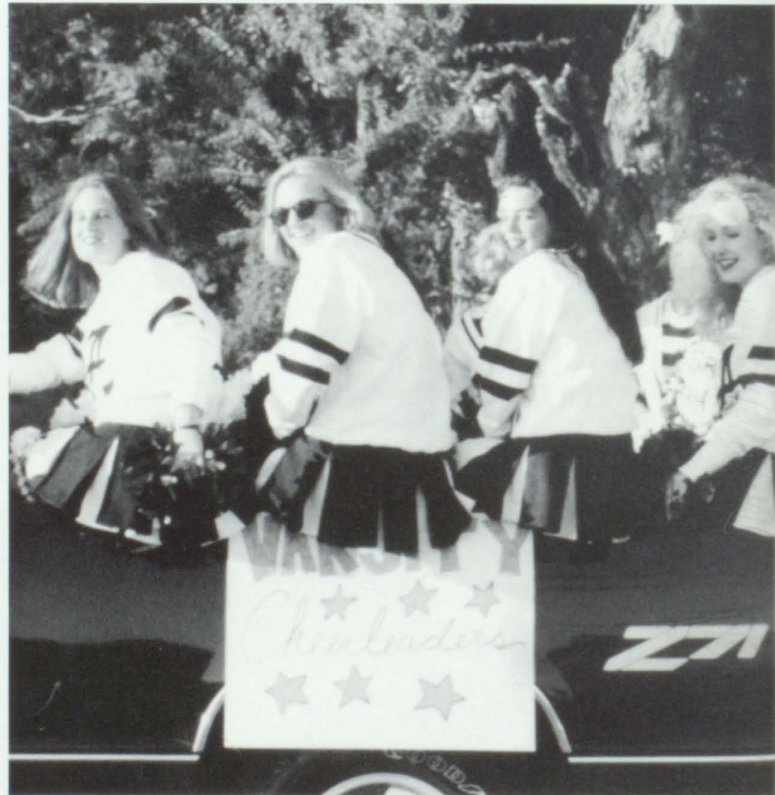

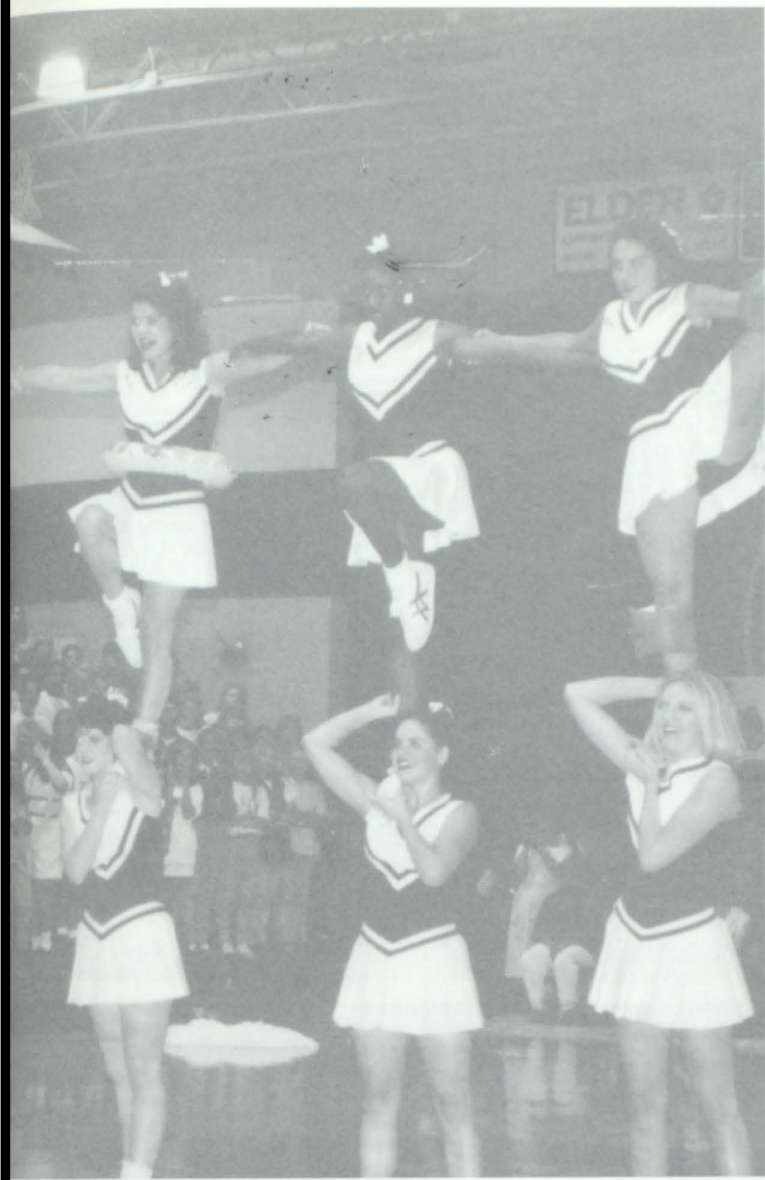

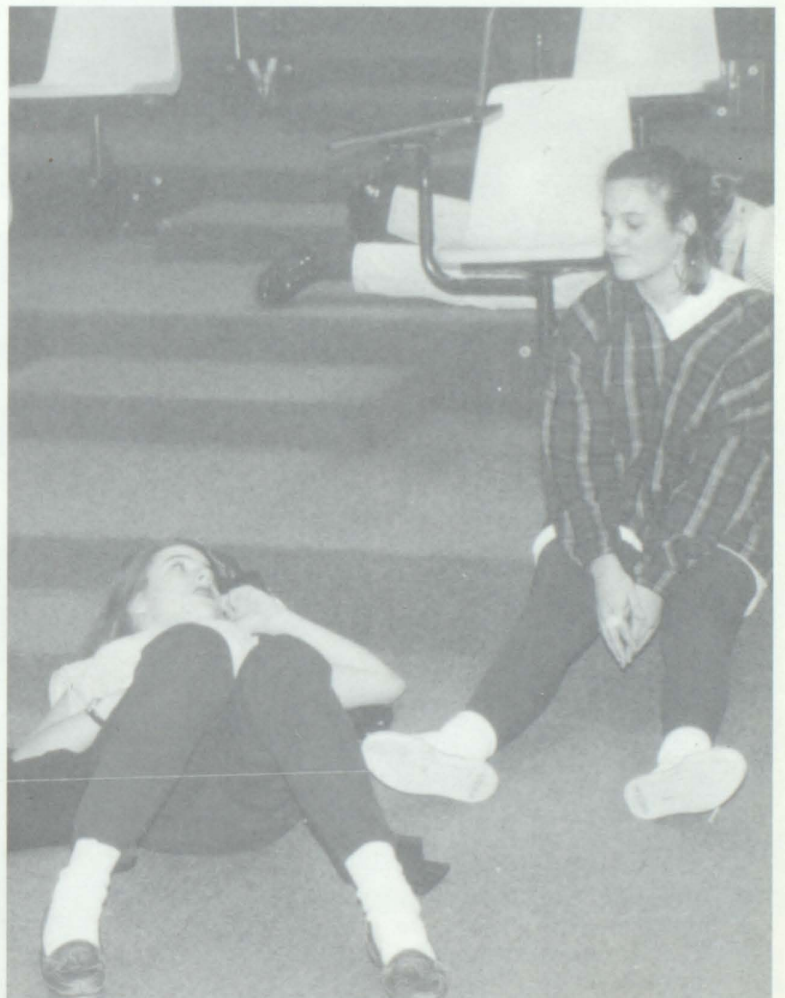

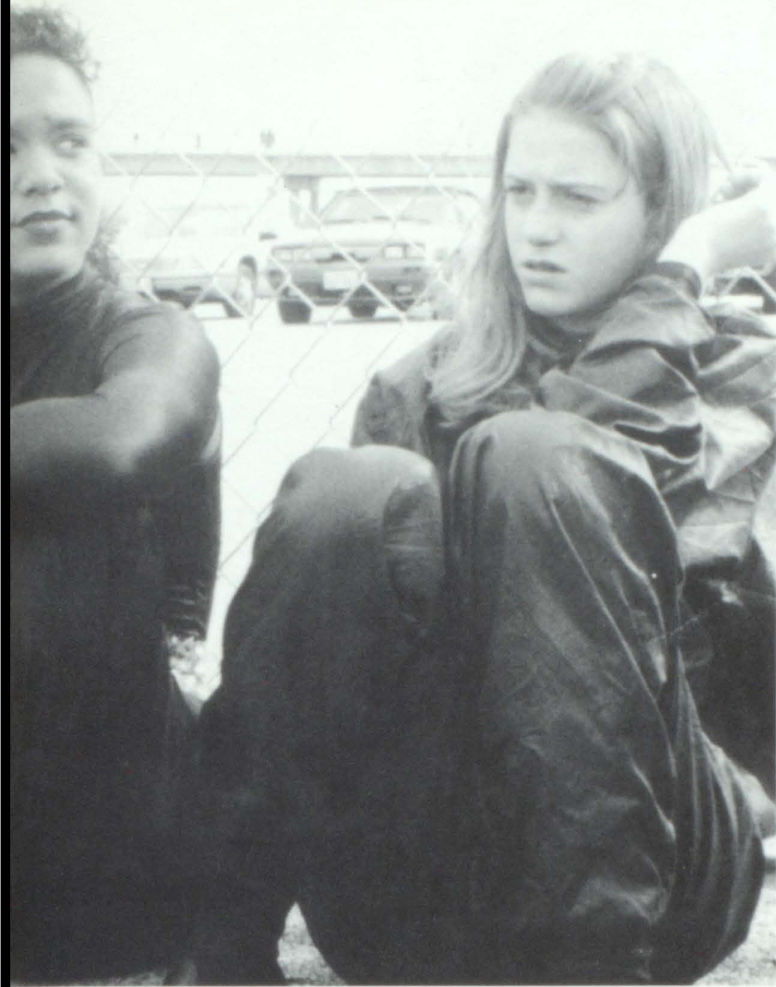

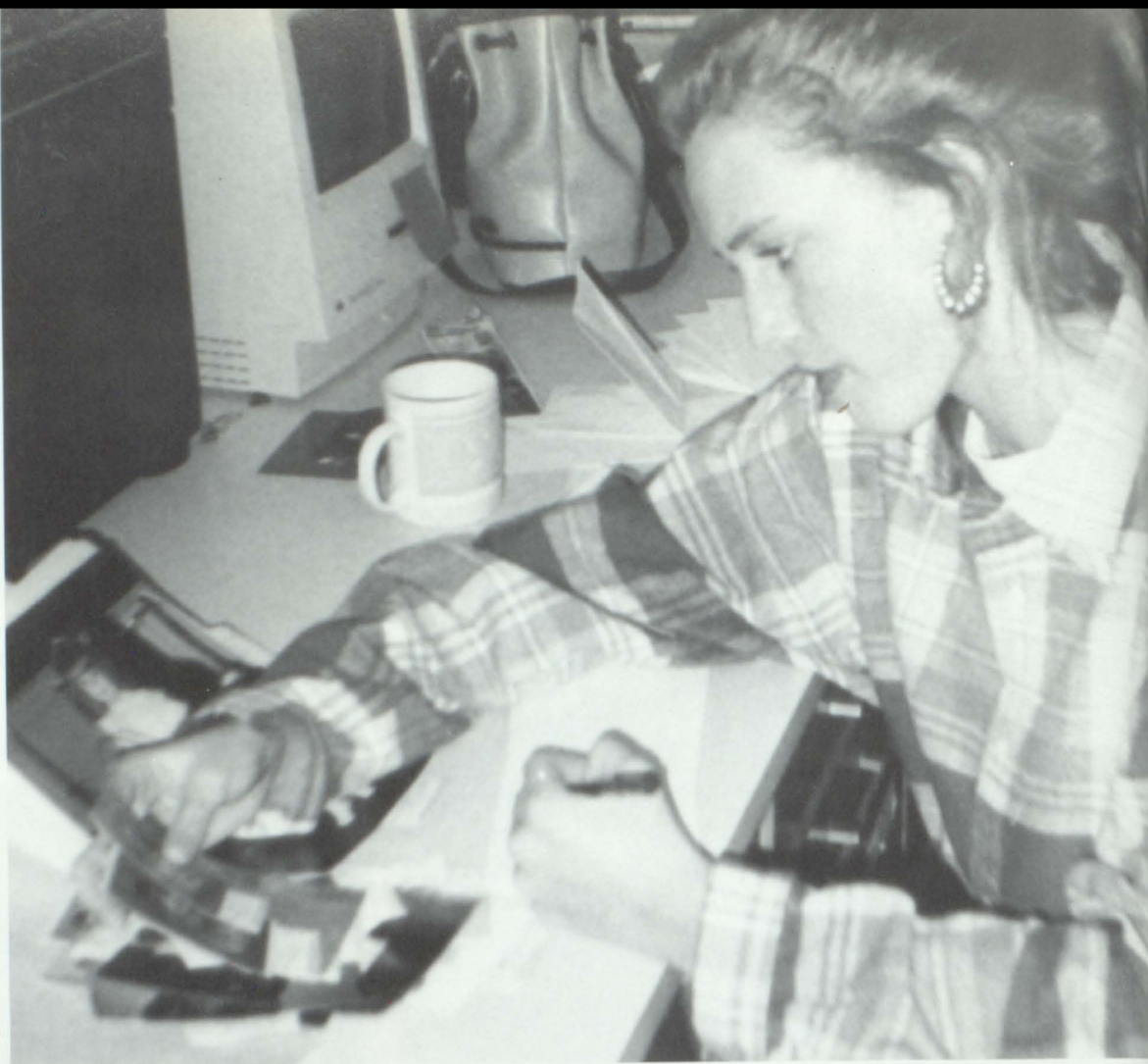

To be in Rodeo it is not required to have your own horses and other ne-

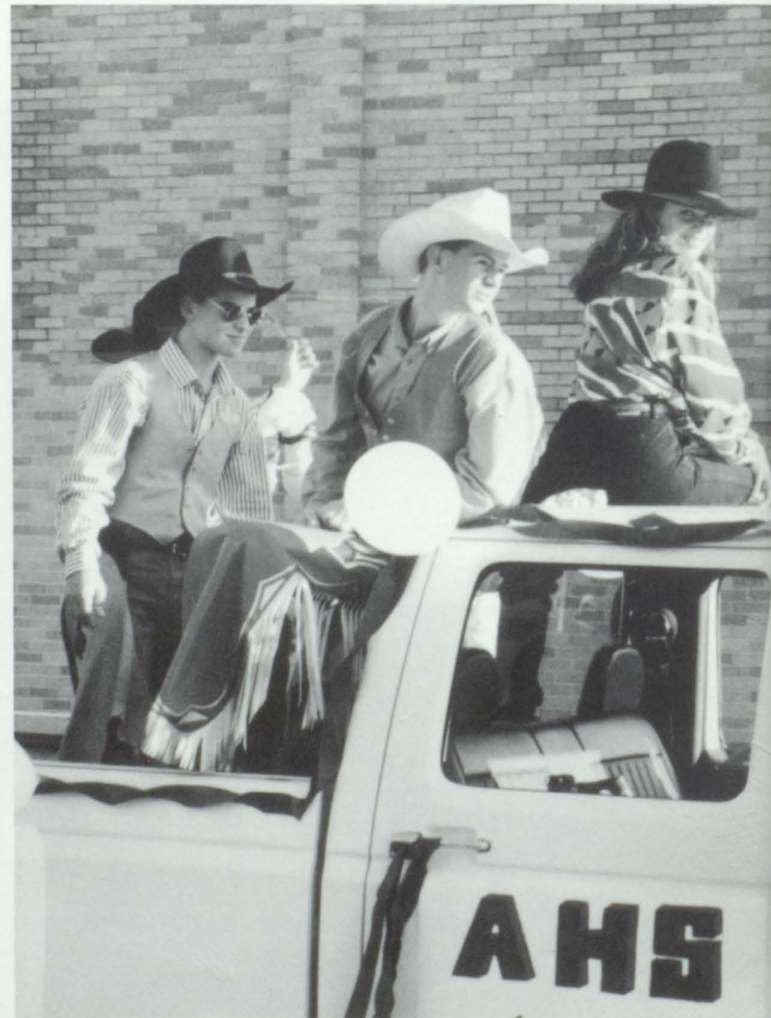

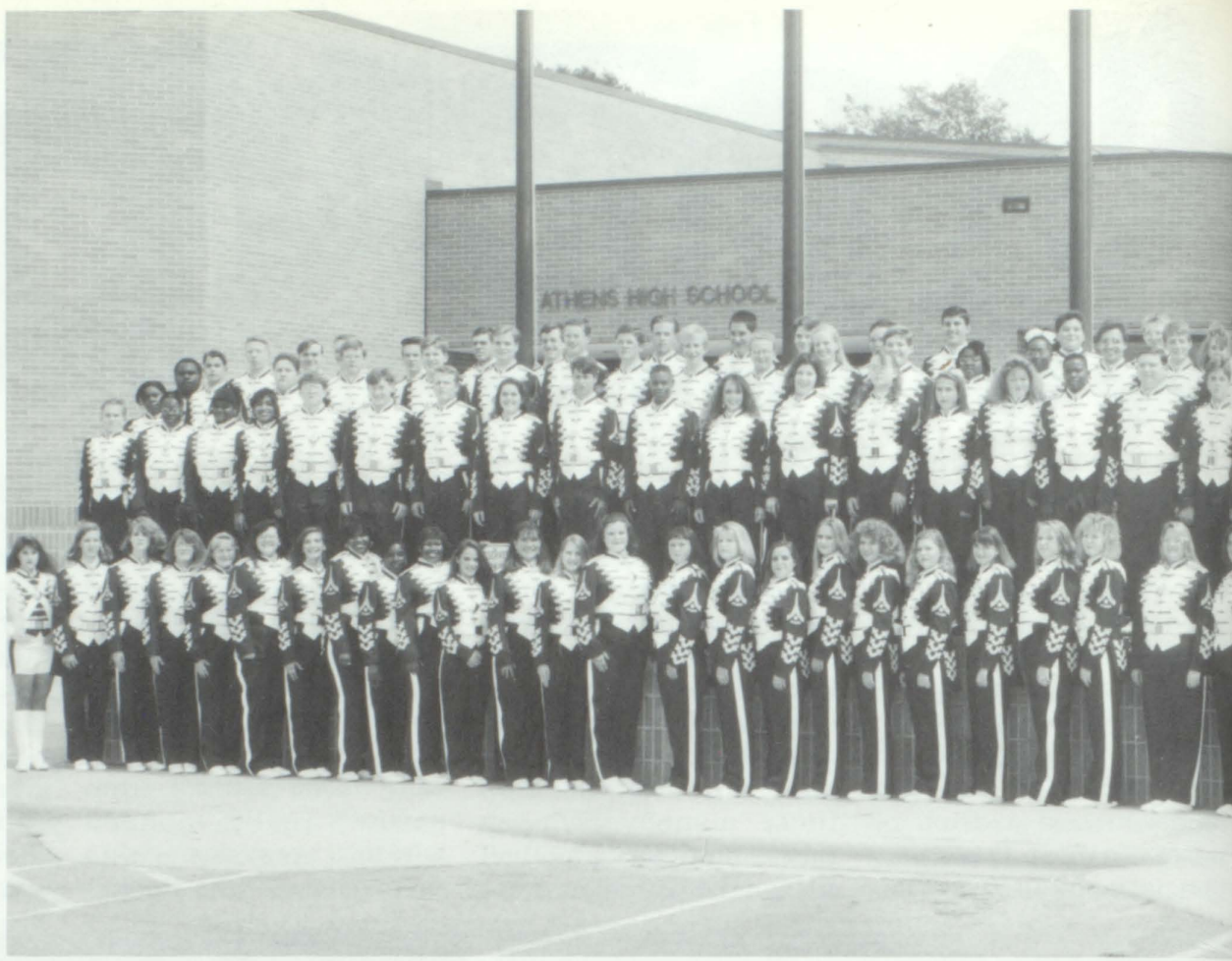

"Throughout my years in school I have always liked the idea of being an upper classman so I could graduate and go to college," Brandi Tackett said.

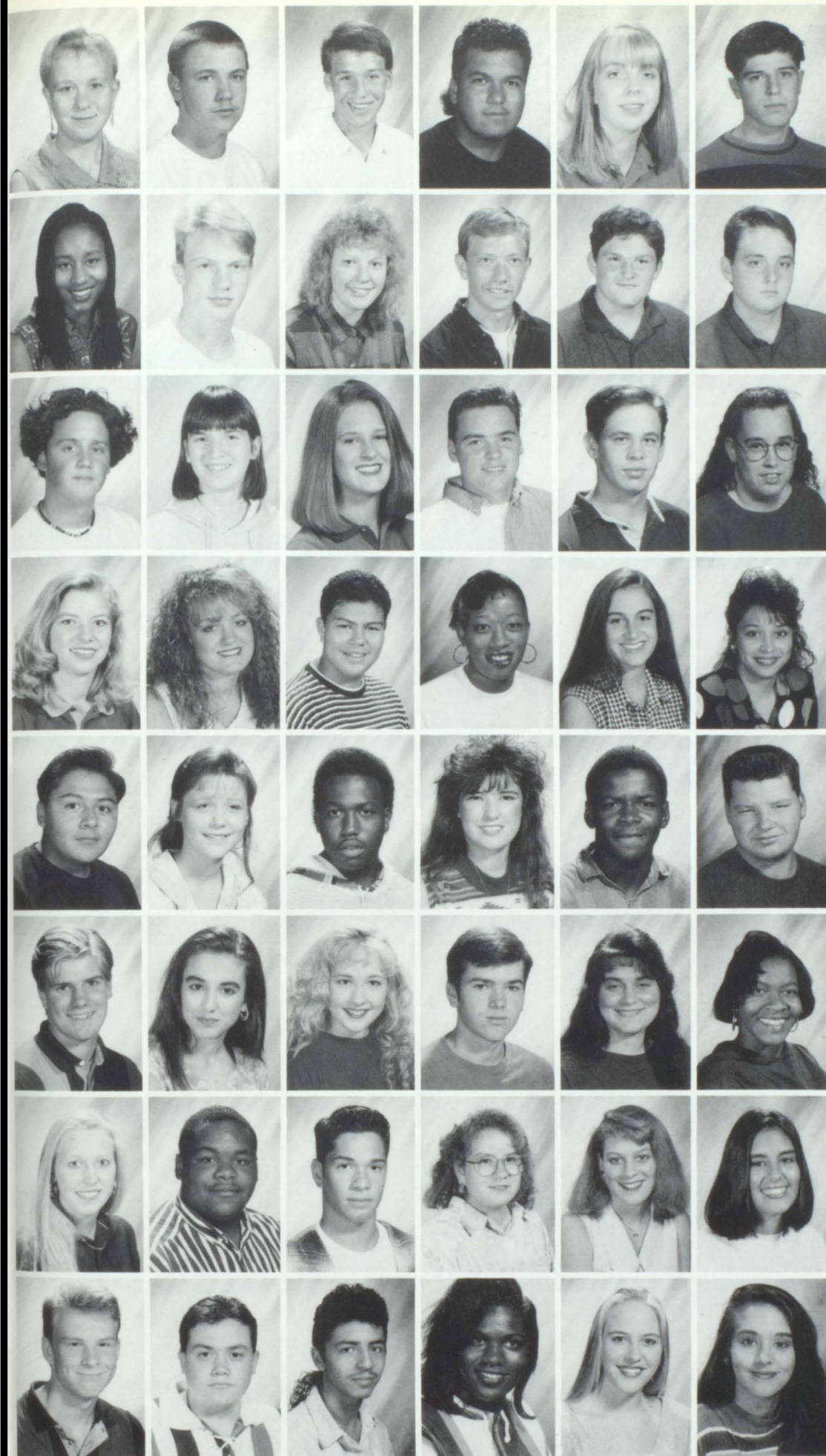

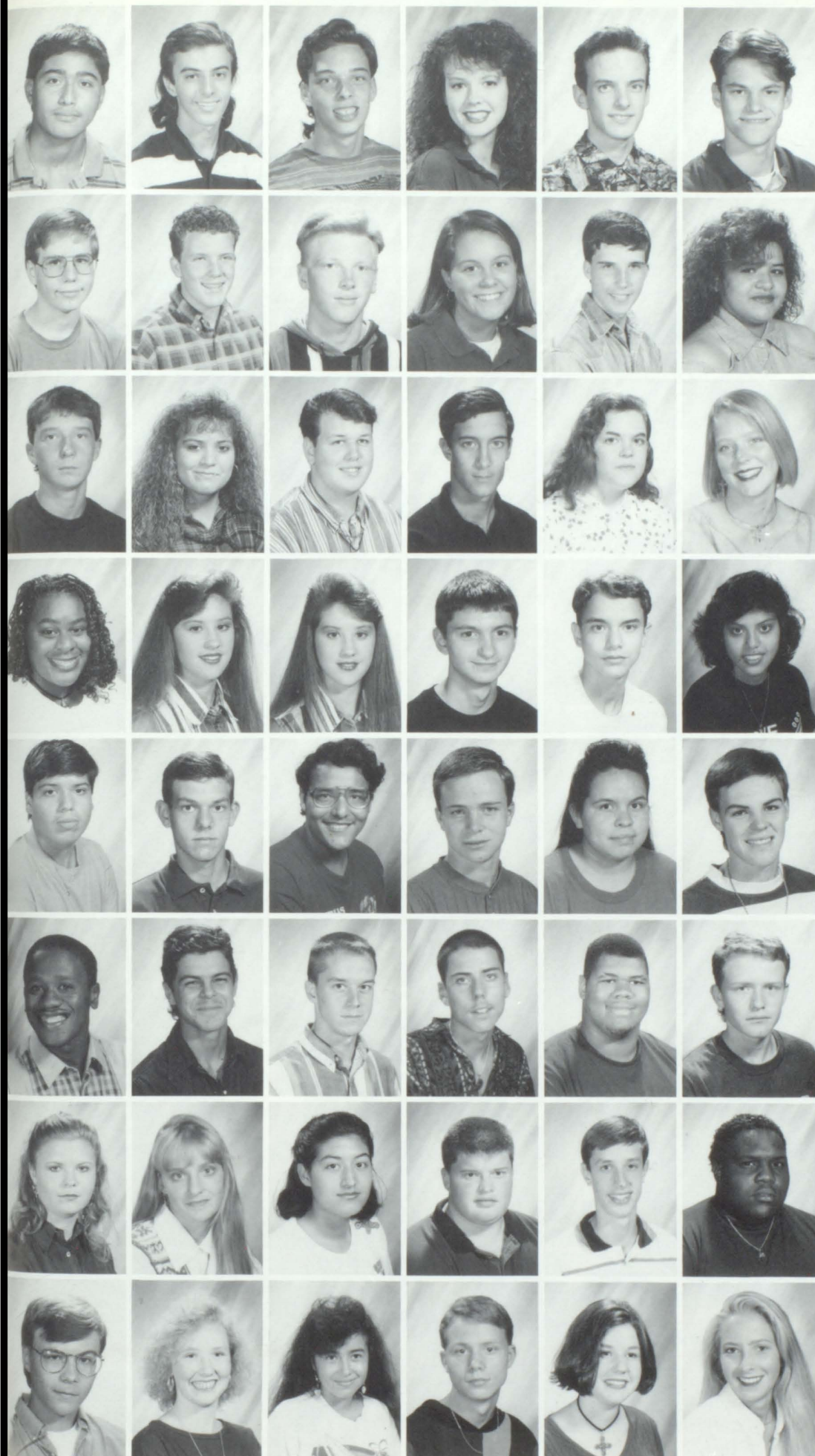

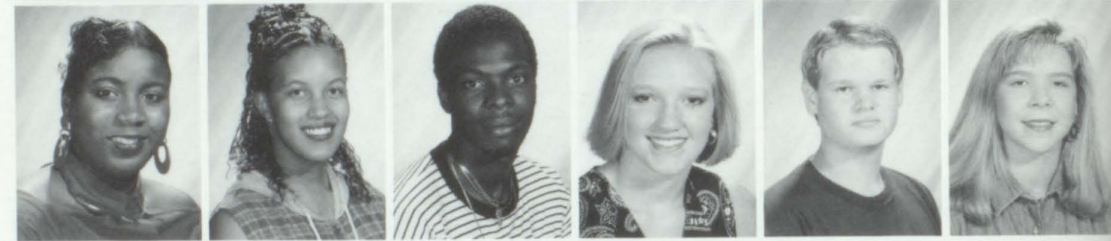

As soon as the bell rang for the first time these students were relieved to no longer be "fish." Their second year in high school promised to be an opportunity to grow tremendously.

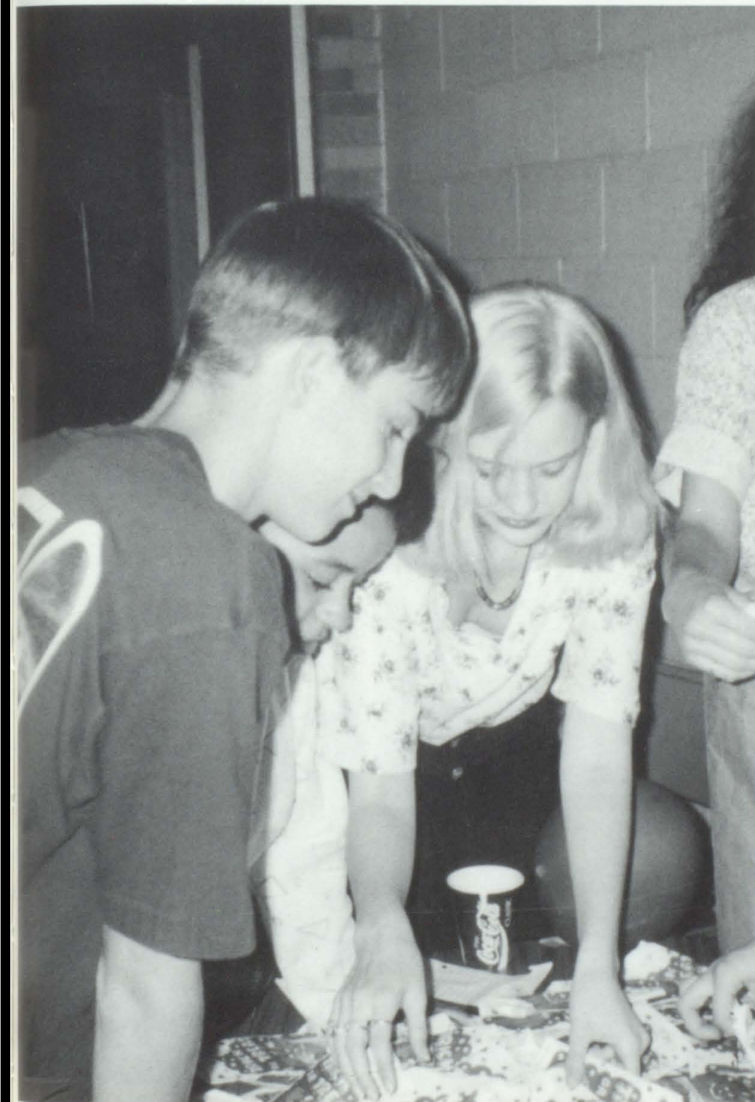
Many sophomores were old enough to begin driving. This led to a whole new kind of freedom.

Some students were bothered by many of the actions of their peers. "One of the thousands of pet peeves I have is the fact that guys never put the toilet seat down when they are finished, then as

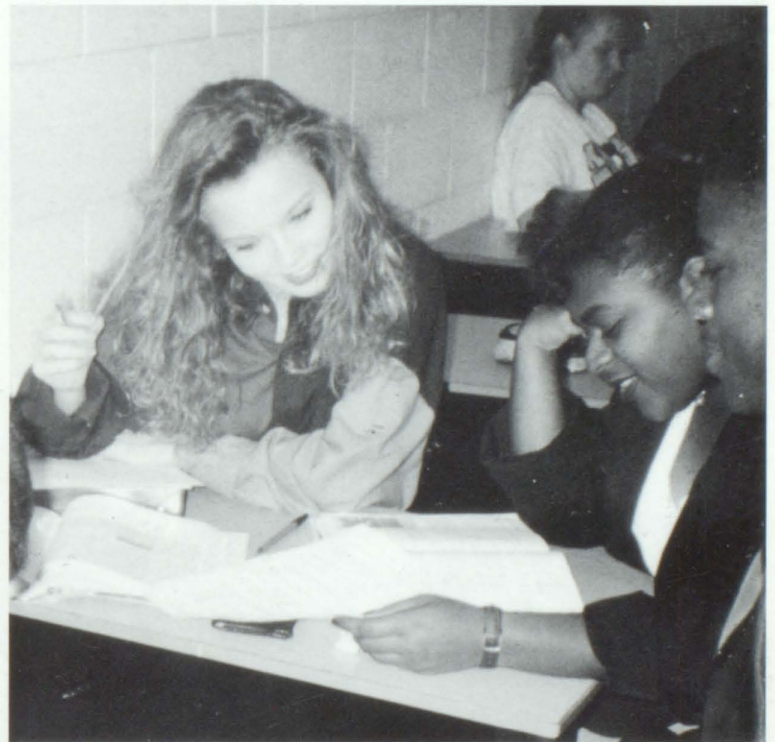
usual us gals have to put them down again," one freshman girl said. Besides getting bothered by the things left undone, some were also bothered by the low spirited students.

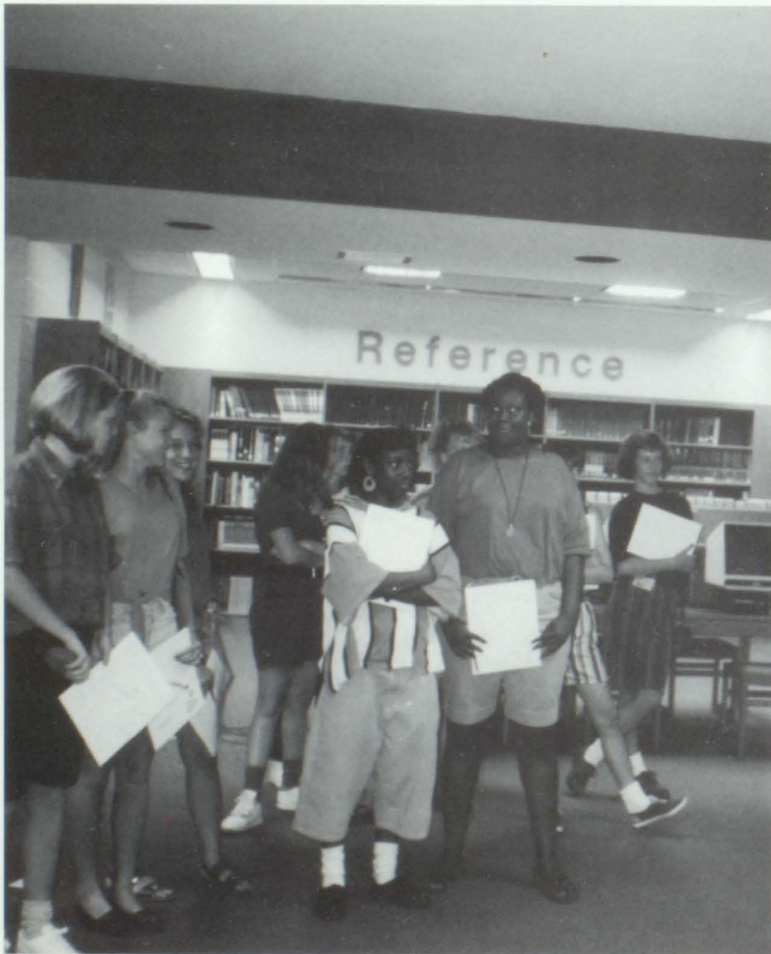
The students that at-
