Honors Night Out


Ag teacher Tommy Barnett's idea for an occasion designed to bring together special students and those teachers who impacted on their lives became reality again at the Athens Country Club.








Speech & Health







This year the Cross Roads Volleyball Team exceeded most peoples' expectations. For the first time since volleyball was introduced into Cross Roads in 2001, the volleyball team went to the playoffs. They didn't just barely make it either; they lost only one game in district play, and were named Co-District Champions. 

keep our feet planted firmly on the freshly mopped floor as we challenge the great wall that is education.




The library serves as a vital key to learning, From the many books it houses, to the newly installed WYSE boxes that provide a gateway to the internet, the library provides a window

Mr. Woods leads the elemtary band in one final concert. Sadly, Mr. Woods has accepted another position and will not be returning to work with these fine musicians next year.


