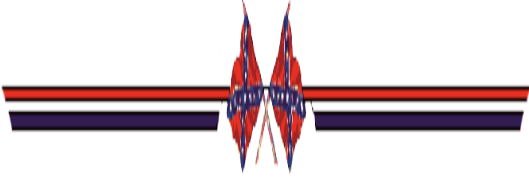


Lee-Bourland Camp 1848

Medal of Honor Parade? I'm glad you asked. The following pictures tell the tale!





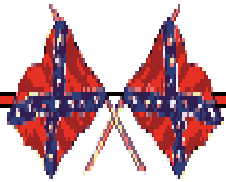
Of course the Yankees were there. They are everywhere, everyone knows that!

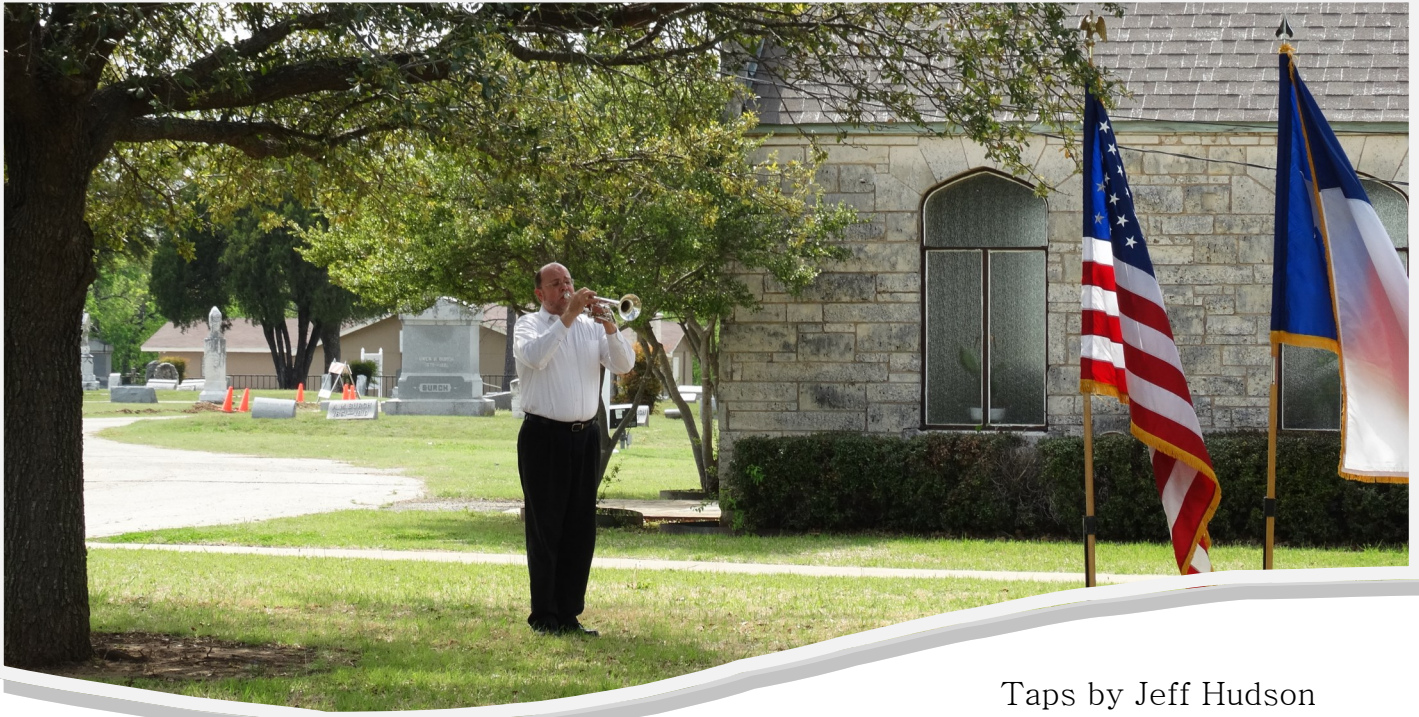

Civil War re-enactors put on a show at Frontier Village

Charles Waters leaned against the porch column of a circa-1880s log cabin at Denison's Frontier Village Saturday afternoon, his thick white mustache, worn straw hat and 1861 Springfield musket completing the picture quite nicely. Waters jawed with a few of his fellow Civil War reenactors, massing some gunpowder down the Springfield's barrel as the tongue-in-cheek chest thumping escalated.

A few minutes later the first shot rang out, followed in quick succession — not to be confused with secession, mind you — by a dozen others. When the smoke cleared, one man lay prostrate,

his trusty steed looking more than a little annoyed at all the commotion.

The small show by a handful of Civil War reenactors was something of a warm-up, explained Chris Ogle, a 21-year veteran of the historical entertainment skirmishes.

"This is basically our forerunner to our main event, which will be the last weekend in October," explained Ogle. "(Oct.) 24th is for the school kids and the 25th will be for the main event; there will be reenactors, a cannon, horses, some of our mounted guys."

There may have been only

eight reenactors in attendance Saturday, but the crowd didn't seem to mind. Families visiting the village and a steady stream of school children from the nearby archery event provided the troupe with a daylong supply of smiling faces.

"I've been doing this since 1976," said Gary Bray, a Furney resident who traveled north to take part in the event. "It's just fun; good friends and good times. And we enjoy coming out to museums like this, to help them because they always need money. So it helps their ticket sales, helps them keep up the village, the buildings and the grounds."

While the actors mentioned unanimously how enjoyable the after-noonly events were on a personal level, the skits have a much deeper meaning for many.

"I've got 40 something Confederate relatives that fought in the Civil War, and my wife has over 50 Confederate veterans in her family," said Bray. "We're trying to teach the history to folks. It's been 150 years and a lot of people don't understand why we went to war and they don't understand the outcome of it, and they sure don't understand the bravery of the men who served."

"The wars that we fight today, if you have 20 men killed on any given day,

it's a horrible situation. In the War Between the States, they had 20,000 men killed in 15 minutes; it's unbelievable, the carnage. Those guys didn't break and run; they're some of the bravest people I've ever heard of."

Ogle, too, emphasized the importance of historical accuracy during the reenactments.

"Civil War reenacting is about honoring those who sacrificed, gave everything they had for their beliefs," said Ogle. "Whether it's the right belief or the wrong belief doesn't matter. They poured their heart into it and they were willing to sacrifice their own life. So it's up to us as living historians to honor those men

who gave everything."

Asked whether it was tough to don the Union blue, what with so much Confederate blood in his veins, Bray smiled.

"Most of us actually have both uniforms. We show up and then we have a council of war and we try to figure out how many guys we have, and if it's too lopsided then we ask the guys to do what we call 'galvanizing,' which means turn coats, wear the other uniform."

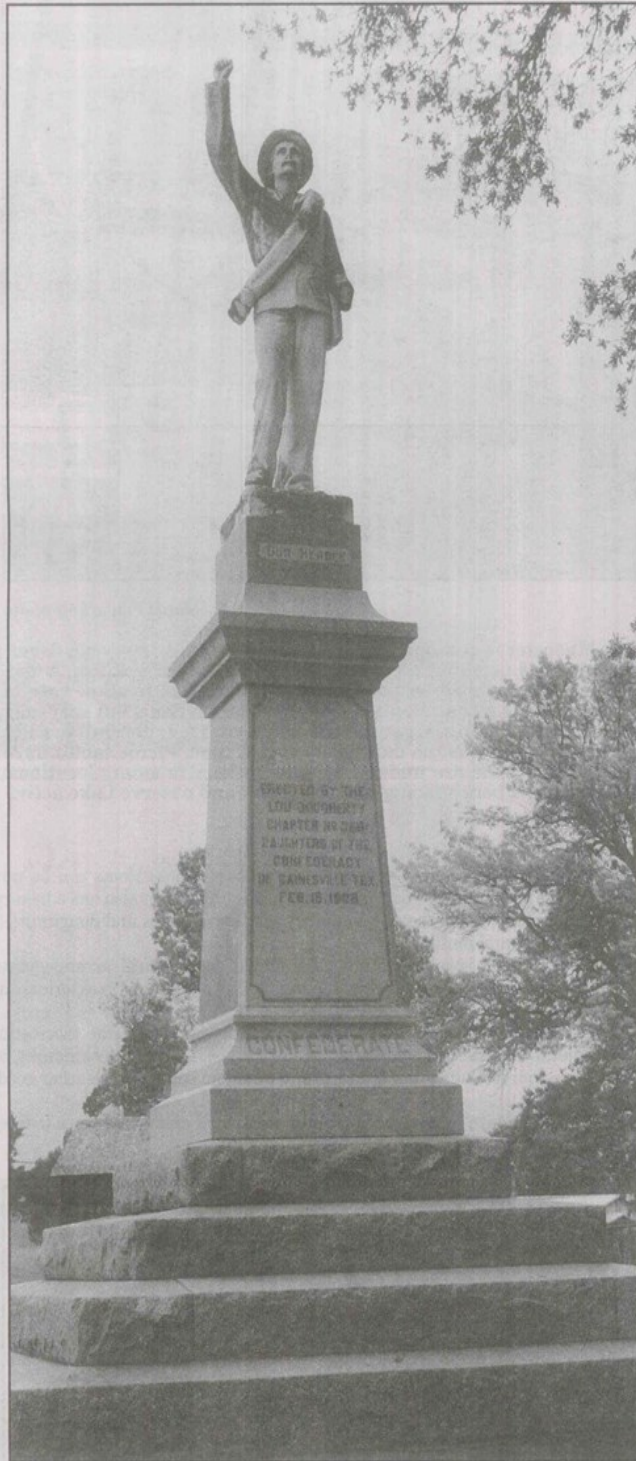
"But that's why they call it 'reenacting,' if you look in the middle of that word, it says it right there, we're just here to 'act.' We're just trying to carry on what happened to the soldiers."

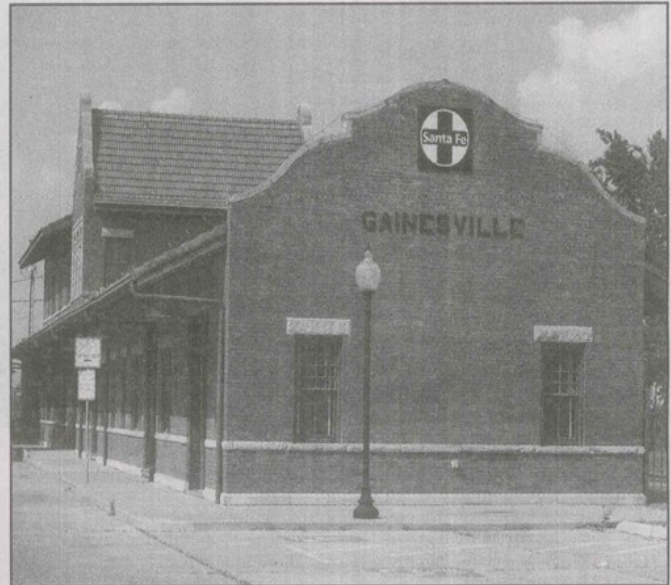

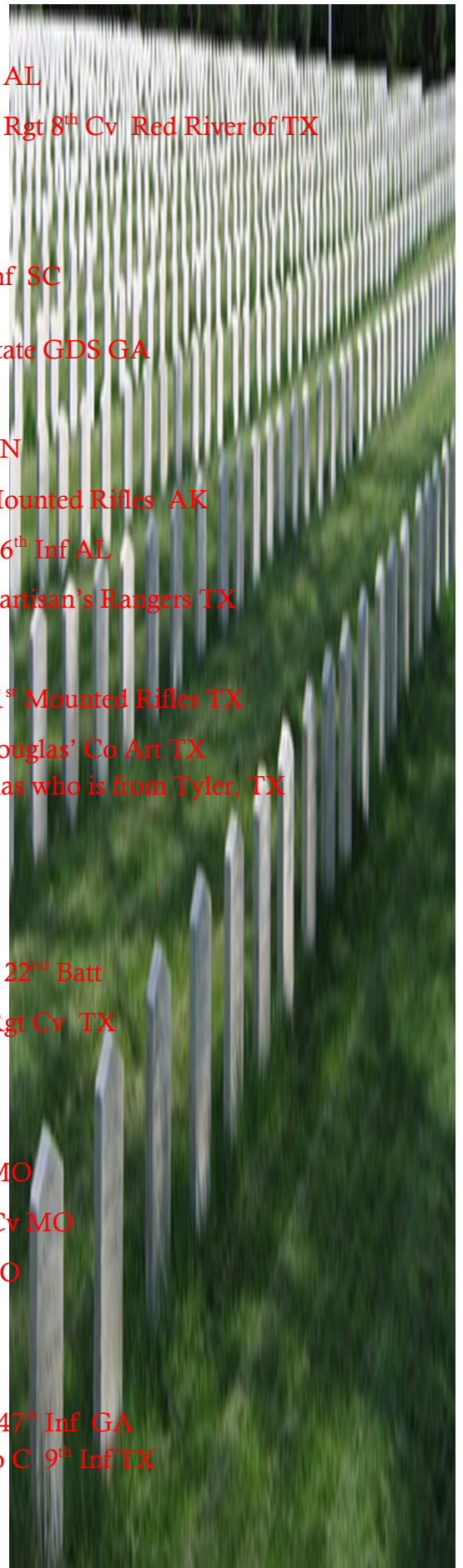
