He assisted in the establishment of the Georgia Mountain Hospice located in Jasper, Ga., serving as its head of pastoral care for four years.

In 2000, Mr. Fowler and his wife, Mary, moved to Trinity to enjoy his retirement on Lake Livingston and to be closer to his grandchildren in Houston.



Plant. Mr. Fowler presented information and stories designed to help those facing imminent death as well as their families cope with the emotional and practical problems they will face.

While editing the work, Mr. Fowler was diagnosed with acute myelogenous leukemia (AML) while put to the test the lessons he leamed during his profession life.

"Despite all of the years that I spent working with dying patients, I never truly understood what they were all trying to tell me until I was confronted with the possibility of my burn death," he said in a 2002 interview with the Trinity Standard.

His personal experience with having to face death caused him to add an additional chapter to his book to pass on his personal understanding
