Mr. Charles Lee Hill, age 91 of Houston, passed away Monday, October 14, 2002. Mr. Hill was born in Houston Heights on November 15. 1910 to Charles S. and Sue Lee Hill, and from age three, raised by his father and stepmother Martha Ola MacPherson Hill. Mr. Hill was an educator and pioneer and innovator in composing and arranging swingsand absenues for concert band. Mr. Hill shidied in public schools in LaPorte and Nacogdoches, but was largely self-taught on clarinet and saxophone and learned arranging from books and bandleaders with whom he associated.

After receiving a BS degree from Stephen F. Austin State Univ., in 1933 and doing additional study at Harlin Simmons Univ., he received an

North Texas in 1948. This was postgraduate followed by study at New York Univ., Univ. of North Texas, the Univ. of Houston, and Sam Houston State Univ. During WWII, he served from March 1942 through October 1945 in the U.S. Army.

All of Mr. Hill's 49 years of service as an educator came in the state of Texas. Mr. Hill was the first director of the Troup High School Band from 1934-35 and directed the band at Stephen F. Austin State Univ. during the summers of 1934 and 1935, from 1935-42, he directed the Overton High School Band. Mr. Hill was associate professor of music at Sam Houston State Univ. from of the director 1948-53, Lovelady High School Band from 1953-59, and director of instrumental and vocal music in the North Forest (Houston) School District from 1959-66. From 1966-86, he was librarian at North Forest.

Mr. Hill was a member of ASCAP and other organizations, including the Texas Music Education Assoc., the Assoc. of Concert Bands, the Texas Bandmasters Assoc., and the Texas State Library Assoc. Also a Lions Club member since 1953, he was president twice in two different towns and was selected Lion of the

Year numerous times.

In addition to his original compositions, he has published over 20 band arrangements of the works of others. His most popular pieces have been Red Rhythm Valley and At the Gremlin Ball which was performed by the Air Force Band before a combined audience of twenty million people in forty countries on five continents as well as a Command Performance at Buckingham Palace.

MME degree from Univ., of Mr. Hill has also written numerous articles for newspapers and music magazines.

Martha Guenzel Allen, Paul Guenzel and John Guenzel; great nieces and great nephews, Martha White, Monica Rath and William White; great-great nieces, Brittany Rath, Allie Rath and Allison White; many friends and former students.

Funeral services for Mr. Charles Lee Hill were held Monday, October 21, at 11:00 at Forest Lawndale, Houston with associate pastor Cy Helm officiating. Interment followed at 2:00 p.m. Monday, October 21 at the Houston National Cemetery.

Pallbearers were Dr. Noah Lee and the members of the Good Times Brass Band.
