Mr. Julian continued his family's legacy of involvement, becoming active in and contributing his talents to such civic endeavors as the Monroe Crook House, the Piney Woods Fine Arts Association, the Democratic Party and, of course, his beloved First Methodist Church, where he had been raised. Mr. Julian's commitment to the Church was as deep as it was long. As an adult he taught the 1st and 2nd grades Sunday School Class for 10 years, served on the Administrative Board, the Board of Trustees, the Finance Committee, the Endowment Committee, the Church History Committee, and the Worship Committee.

Mr. Julian's work on the History Committee embodied a Centennial Celebration of the current sanctuary which culminated with a Celebration Dinner for over 275 people. Mr. Julian was instrumental in the revitalization of the Old Shiloh Methodist Church, which brought him great joy. Over the past several years his consuming projects were the Garden of Memories and the Church Parlor, for which he raised significant funds, and which will hopefully be completed with the funds given as Memorials to the Church in his name.
