One of the highlights in her life was when her church surprised her with a "This-Is-Your-Life" program during the Sunday morning worship service. When the church started paying their musicians, "Miss Hattie" would not take the money and her pastor suggested to her that since she had given her life to education, to just put it into a scholarship fund. Thus was born the Hattie S. Wootters Scholarship Fund. This fund helps a good number of young people each year.

"Miss Hattie" deeply loved her students in school and treasured their friendship for a lifetime. She always felt blessed by God for her many friends and considered them a gift from God. "Miss Hattie" gave many piano and organ concerts with her dear friend Marguerite McClain. She will be remembered for her Chvic work in Crockett and for her music that was played to glorify the Lord. her husband and daughter and her family were the light and joy of her life, but the Lord's work in the church always came first. Cora Sue said that she and her dad just got used to being second to the music in the church.

Through the years "Miss Hattie" continued to be interested in life. She was a member of the Retired Teachers Association, the Glenwood Cemetery Association, the Downes Aldrich House and the Monroe Crook House. She was a member of the Friends of the John H. Wootters Library. "Miss Hattie" was a member of the S.M.U. Alumni-Golden Mustang and the Pi Beta Sorority.
