

THE NASH FAMILY

Mr. William Nash, the progenitor of the Nash family, long prominent in the affairs of his county, was I think a citizen of San Augustine County, before his permanent location in Kaufman County, some time before the year 1855, the time of the arrival of my mother's family in the latter part of said year, as stated in a preceding article published in The Herald. At that early date the prairies abounded in cattle bearing the mark and brand of Mr. Nash. The brand was BT connected, which I was informed stood for Burrell Thompson, the original owner of the herd, who lived in Southeastern Texas, as I was informed.

Mr. Nash was a successful dry-goods merchant as well as an extensive stock raiser before the Civil War. Soon after the beginning of the Civil War the store as well as all other mercantile establishments in Kaufman and probably in the state were closed.

Mr. Nash established a comfortable country home a few miles west of Kaufman, where he resided with his family at the time of his death a few years after the close of the war.

He was a member of the constitutional convention of 1866, whose work was rejected by the federal government because of the failure to recognize the alleged rights of the negroes and otherwise conform to the newly constituted ideas of the Washington administration. Captain J. S. Porter, a prominent lawyer and gallant ex-Confederate soldier, was his colleague in the convention and was one of the committee appointed by the convention to go to Washington and submit it for approval to the federal government.

Mrs. Nash was a Temple before her marriage and a woman of most excellent character, highly respected and much beloved by all who were well acquainted with her. She lived to a ripe old age, making her home with her children, principally with her devoted son. H. T. (Jere) Nash in Kaufman, as I now remember. She lived to rear a family of seven children, four sons and three daughters, all of whom stood very high in the estimation of those with whom they were associated.

L. T. (Tete) Nash, married Miss ("Press") Ezell, the accomplished daughter of Mr. Frederick Ezell, a well known and useful citizen of Kaufman, and as I now remember, one son and two daughters were born to the union. The son and an oldest daughter died in early life, and the other daughter became the wife of Albert Pannill. C. C. (Neeley) Nash first married Miss Allie Gardner by whom he had two children, Chas. R. and W. A. (Bud) Nash, both of whom are living in Kaufman. A daughter of Chas. R. and Miss Mary Nash, is the efficient county superintendent. His wife was Miss Fannie Parsons before her marriage. She is the daughter of the late Dr. H. L. Parsons, for many years one of the leading physicians of the town.

W. A. (Bud) Nash married Miss "Dee" Ware, a niece of the late Henry Erwin. She died a short time ago.

"Neely" Nash was for many years following the Civil War, a highly respected and eminently successful merchant in Kaufman, joint business at the old Nash stand, a large wooden building near the southwest corner of the square. His second wife was Miss Jodie Michaux. Several children, including Wood Nash, a prominent baker of Kaufman and Mrs. Henry C. Hicks, the husband, a well known businessman of Kaufman, and Temple Nash, prominent in the real estate and insurance business of Kaufman, and Mrs. A. T. Ellis.

N. B. (Minky) Nash married Miss Texana Morrow, daughter of Dr. Morrow, a highly respected pioneer citizen of Kaufman County and a sister of Judge Nestor Morrow. Several children, including the late Alex Nash, were born to said union. H. T. (Jere) Nash married Miss Jane Shannon, soon after his return from the war. The late W. T. Nash, and Jack Nash, a son, and Mrs. Jas. Young, I think were their only children. He died at his home in Kaufman, leaving a host of admiring friends to mourn his loss.

The daughters of William Nash, were Lucy, who married A. T. (Gus) Gardner,

Mary, familiarly called in her girlhood "Dumpy" who married the late Dr. W. H. Pyle, long a permanent physician in Kaufman and a state senator in the early 70s and "Dody" who was the first wife of Mr. Henry Boykin, the father of Jesse D. Boykin of the Herald. Two sons, Temple and Bradley, and three daughters, Laura, Sallie and Annie, were born to Dr. and Mrs. Pyle. Dr. Pyle died several years ago and Mrs. Pyle passed away more recently.

One daughter, Emma, was born to Henry Boykin and his first wife. She became the wife of Charles Pannill.

The Nash family have contributed in a very large measure to the splendid citizenship and material prosperity of Kaufman and the entire state of Texas.

C. C. Nash Important Figure In Early History of Kaufman

C. C. Nash, the co-founder of Terrell, came to Kaufman in 1850 from San Augustine County, accompanied by a Negro boy and a Mexican, driving a herd of cattle for his father, William Nash, who came with his family the following year.

Today there are many Nash families in Kaufman but most of them can trace their ancestry back to William Nash.

C. C. was but 17 when he came to the new county of Kaufman—but in those days a lad of 17 was a man. He was born in Tennessee in 1833 but moved with his parents to San Augustine in 1835.

Settling two miles due west of the present courthouse, C. C. Nash built a log cabin to spend that first winter. In 1851 his father and others in the family moved to the site.

Others from Mississippi, Tennessee, and other Southeastern States began the long journey to Texas that year, numbers of them choosing Kaufman, but probably none had more to do with the destiny of Kaufman than did William Nash, his family, and his descendants.

Brothers and sisters of C. C. Nash, who came the year afterward, were Lewellen, nicknamed Teet; Napoleon Bonaparte, called Mickey; H. Temple, more commonly known as Jerry; C. C. Nash; Lucy, who became Mrs. A. T. Gardner; Mary, the wife of Dr. W. H. Pyle, and Dody, who was Mrs. Henry Boykin.

C. C. Nash married Allie Gardner in about the year 1857 and to this union four children were born, Charlie Nash was born in 1859 and a twin died in infancy. W. A.

child died in infancy, Mrs. Nash died in about 1864, and Mr. Nash later married Josephine Michaux. To this union were born Mrs. H. C. Hicks, Woodson Nash, Mrs. A. T. Ellis, Mrs. Jed C. Adams, and Temple Nash, all of whom are living except Temple Nash, prominent real-estate man, who was killed in an automobile accident, in 1932.

In the general mercantile business for a number of years, C. C. Nash continued his livestock interests. He was widely consulted on legal and business advice and for years he was probably the county's most outstanding citizen. He was in the Confederate Army during the Civil War and in 1872 he was elected County Treasurer and served until his retirement, due to ill health. He died in 1878.

a dose before it was discovered and he died (so did the Negro).* Louisa outlived him many years, living with her children. She reared Emma Boykin, who was Eudora's only child by Jesse D. Boykin.

*The Negro was hanged by the sons of William Nash.

Charles Cornelius Nash, with one Mexican and one Negro helper, at the age of 17 drove a herd of cattle to Kaufman County to land which his father owned. They built a log cabin two miles west of the present courthouse, and this sheltered them until the family moved out later from San Augustine. His marriage followed and he settled in the town of Kaufman, where he opened a general store and also bought land and cattle. (He was one of the co-founders of the town of Terrell.) He served in the Confederate Army during the War Between the States, but ill health kept him out of the firing line. He did some kind of official work. He was never strong or well, and died of T.B. at the age of 44.

NOTES ON THE NASH FAMILY HISTORY
(Written by Mrs. Charles Richard Nash in 1954)

William Nash and wife were married in Nashville, Tennessee on September 21, 1826. They moved to San Augustine, Texas. Later they moved to Kaufman County and settled on land two miles west of the present courthouse. The land is now owned by a great-granddaughter (Imogene Young Wynne) and known as "Star Brand Ranch." Land bought by her husband, Toddie Lee Wynne, has been added to it. William Nash gave each of his children an inheritance. He reared all of his children to be grown. He was taken sick and in that day and time there were no window screens so a Negro boy, half grown, was put to keeping flies from the sick man. He tired of his job and ground up some glass and put in the medicine. William's daughter Lucy gave him

slave-holding planter. His death occurred in 1852, near Quincy, Florida, to which place he had removed when well advanced in years. They cultivate two thousand acres, and thereby give homes to twenty-two families whose labor is their chief capital.

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June 25, 1900, at Galveston, Texas, Woodson Nash and Miss Cecile Noble were united in marriage, and they are the parents of four children: Woodson Michaux, Robert Irvine, Edward Cornelius and Caroline Cecile. Mr. and Mrs. Nash are members of Episcopal Church at Kaufman.

The Nash Family

(By V. W. Grubbs.)

Mr. William Nash, the progenitor of the Nash family, long prominent in the affairs of his county, was, I think, a citizen of San Augustine county, before his permanent location in Kaufman county, some time before the year 1855, the time of the arrival of my mother's family in the latter part of said year, as stated in a preceding article published in The Herald. At that early date the prairies abounded in cattle bearing the mark and brand of Mr. Nash. The brand was BT connected, which I was informed stood for Burrell Thompson, the original owner of the herd, who lived in Southeastern Texas, as I was informed.

Mr. Nash was a successful dry goods merchant as well as an extensive stock raiser before the Civil War. Soon after the beginning of the Civil War the store as well as all other mercantile establishments in Kaufman and probably in the state, were closed.

Mr. Nash established a comfortable country home a few miles west of Kaufman, where he resided with his family at the time of his death, a few years after the close of the war.

He was a member of the constitutional convention of 1866, whose work was rejected by the federal government because of the failure to recognize the alleged rights of the negroes and otherwise conform to the newly constituted ideas of the Washington administration. Captain J. S. Porter, a prominent lawyer and gallant ex-Confederate soldier, was his colleague in the convention and was one of the committee appointed by the convention to go to Washington and submit it for approval to the federal government.

Mrs. Nash was a Temple before her marriage and a woman of most excellent character, highly respected and much beloved by all who were well acquainted with her. She lived to a ripe old age, making her home with her children, principally with her devoted son, H. T. (Jere) Nash in Kaufman, as I now remember. She lived to rear a family of seven children, four sons and three

daughters, all of whom stood very high in the estimation of those with whom they were associated.

J. T. (Tete) Nash, married Miss ("Press") Ezell, the accomplished daughter of Mr. Frederick Ezell, a well-known and useful citizen of Kaufman, and as I now remember, one son and two daughters were born to the union. The son and an oldest daughter died in early life, and the other daughter became the wife of Mr. Albert Pannill, C. C. (Neeley) Nash, first married Miss Allie Gardner by whom he had two children, Chas. R. and W. A. (Bud) Nash, both of whom are living in Kaufman. A daughter of Chas. R. Miss Mary Nash, is the efficient county superintendent. His wife was Miss Fannie Parsons before her marriage. She is the daughter of the late Dr. H. L. Parsons, for many years one of the leading physicians of the town.

W. A. (Bud) Nash married Miss "Dee" Ware, a niece of the late Henry Erwin. She died a short time ago.

"Neeley" Nash was for many years following the Civil War, a highly respected and eminently successful merchant in Kaufman, doing business at the old Nash stand, a large wooden building near the southwest corner of the square. His second wife was Miss Jodie Michaux. Several children, including Wood Nash, a prominent banker of Kaufman and Mrs. Henry C. Hicks, the husband, a well known business man of Kaufman, and Temple Nash, prominent in the real estate and insurance business of Kaufman, and Mrs. A. T. Ellis.

X. B. (Minky) Nash married Miss Texama Morrow, daughter of Dr. Morrow, a highly respected pioneer citizen of Kaufman county and a sister of Judge Nestor Morrow. Several children, including the late Alex Nash, were born to said union. H. T. (Jere) Nash married Miss Jane Shannon, soon after his return from the war. The late W. T. Nash, and Jack Nash, a son, and Mrs. Jas. Young, I think, were their only children. He died at his home in

Kaufman, leaving a host of admiring friends to mourn his loss.

The daughters of William Nash, were Lucy, who married A. T. (Gus) Gardner, Mary, familiarly called in her girlhood, "Dumpy," who married the late Dr. W. H. Pyle, long a permanent physician in Kaufman and a state senator in the early 70s, and "Dody," who was the first wife of Mr. Henry Boykin, the father of Jesse D. Boykin of The Herald. Two sons, Temple and Bradley, and three daughters, Laura, Sallie and Annie, were born to Dr. and Mrs. Pyle. Dr. Pyle died several years ago, and Mrs. Pyle passed away more recently.

One daughter, Emma, was born to Henry Boykin and his first wife. She became the wife of Charles Pannill.

The Nash family have contributed in a very large measure to the splendid citizenship and material prosperity of Kaufman and the entire state of Texas.

CHARLES CORNELIUS NASH, deceased. Was a conspicuous factor in the business interests of Kaufman county, Texas, for a number of years and up to the time of his death, which occurred in 1878. He was a worthy representative of that numerous family which has rendered itself useful in the development of a modern commonwealth between the Sabine and the Trinity rivers and which was founded at San Augustine by two brothers, William and John D., or Jack Nash, who came hither as settlers from near Nashville, Tennessee. Their father, Dempsey Nash, was one of the pioneer settlers of that state from Norfolk, Virginia, where William was born. Jack was born in the new Tennessee home, and was the youngest of three children, Mrs. Lucretia Couch being the second child.

William Nash married Louisa Temple, and Charles Cornelius was the third child in their family of five sons and three daughters. He was born in Tennessee, in 1833, and grew up and received his education at San Augustine, Texas, to which place the family moved when he was two years of age. He had reached young manhood when the family home was changed to Kaufman county. It was in 1850 that, with a Mexican and a negro, he brought a drove of cattle to Kaufman county, and he remained here during the winter alone, being joined by the rest of the family the following year. He soon busied himself with stock grazing, merchandising and public affairs. At the outbreak of war between the states he enlisted as a soldier in the Confederate army, but a few months later, on account of failing health, he was sent home and subsequently was made an enrolling officer of the Confederate government, which position he filled during the rest of the war. With the restoration of peaceful conditions, Mr. Nash became a merchant, and it was not long before he attained prominence and influence in business and political affairs. Indeed, he gained a popularity more universal than falls to the lot of the average citizen, and when he manifested a willingness to serve Kaufman county as its treasurer, the people gave him cheerful support and he rendered efficient service.

Charles Cornelius Nash was twice married. His first wife, Allie (Gardner) Nash, of Tennessee, died when young. She came to Texas before the war with her brother, A. G. Gardner, who was a gallant Confederate soldier for four years. She bore him two sons, Charles Richard and William A., men of business and civic prominence in Kaufman. His second wife, Josephine Henrietta (Michaux) Nash, was born in Gadsden county, Florida, in 1840, and it was on May 10, 1865, that she and Mr. Nash were married. She comes from a patriotic family of the American Revolution and of French Huguenot blood. Her father was Obediah Woodson Michaux. He was born in Cumberland county, Virginia, about 1786, where his father, Joseph Michaux, spent his life, as an extensive planter and with a small army of slaves. Joseph was descended from French ancestry who fled from the Catholic persecution of the early century to Holland, from whence representatives of the family crossed the Atlantic to the American Colonies and took up their residence in Virginia. Joseph Michaux was a Revolutionary soldier. He received a British bullet through his chest, which sent him back to his plantation and ended his soldier life. He married a Miss Woodson, and Obediah was the youngest of a large family of children. As a young man Obediah Michaux went to South Carolina and there married Miss Elizabeth Runnels Swann. He spent his life as a successful

Their other children are John Ware, of Abilene, Texas, and Samuel, of Kaufman.

WILLIAM TEMPLE NASH. Prominent among the men of Kaufman county, Texas, whose activities along various lines of endeavor are contributing materially to the progress of this section of the Lone Star State is William Temple Nash, of Kaufman, who is ably maintaining the family reputation for financial ability and business prowess that has ever characterized its members. He is a son of the late financier, Herbert Temple Nash, of Kaufman, who proved himself one of the able and successful men of affairs of his state.

William Nash, the paternal grandfather of William Temple Nash, came to Texas from near Franklin, Tennessee, before the outbreak of the war for independence, and settled at San Augustine. His brother, John D. Nash, or "Jack," as he was familiarly known, who had accompanied him, placed his signature to the Texas declaration of independence and removed, finally, to Bastrop county, while William came to Kaufman county in 1851 and was here poisoned by two ex-slaves close upon the close of the war. He was a prosperous planter and owned much slave property, and was still in the prime of life when he passed away. William Nash married Miss Louisa Temple, a family of prominence and local renown about Nashville, Tennessee, and she survived her husband many years, passing away at Kaufman during the 'eighties. Among their children were the following: Dempsey, who died a single man at San Augustine, Texas; Llewellyn T., who died in Kaufman county, leaving a family; Charles Cornelius, who served Kaufman county as its treasurer and spent his life as a merchant and stockman; Lucy, who became the wife of Augustus Gardner and passed her life in Kaufman county; Napoleon B., who left a family here at his death; Herbert T.; Mrs. Dr. Pyle, and Dora, who became the wife of Henry Boykin. The Nashes were ever a pastoral and agrarian people and were conspicuous as stockmen and farmers from the time of their advent in Texas.

Herbert Temple Nash was born at San Augustine, Texas, March 9, 1841, the youngest of his father's children. He was approaching closely upon his majority when the Civil War made soldiers out of all red-blooded men of sound body, and he entered the service of the Confederacy, in General Ross' Brigade, as a member of Captain Hardin's company, of the Sixth Texas Cavalry, Colonel Stone, and was in the Confederate service from early in 1861 until the end of the war. He took part in the engagement with the Indians of the Territory at Chustenola, was in the engagement at Elkhorn Tavern, Arkansas, and his command was dismounted at Desark and sent, with other troops of Price's army, by boat to Memphis, Tennessee, to aid the Confederates operating against the forces of General Grant. He subsequently was in the battles of Corinth, Iuka, Farmington, the Holly Springs raid, Thompson's Station, the service incident to General Johnston's efforts to relieve Vicksburg, fought Sherman's army across Mississippi to Meridian, then into the Atlanta campaign, where for 100 days there was continuous fighting and skirmishing, and was with his regiment as a part of General Hood's army which went back into Tennessee after the fall of Atlanta and fought at Franklin, Second Murfreesboro and back into Mississippi, where the command surrendered to General Canby's department in April, 1865. With the fighting organization of the Waco general, Mr. Nash took part in as many as 100 different engagements and was admired by his comrades and respected by his officers as a brave and gallant soldier.

When resistance was made useless at Appomattox, Mr. Nash resumed his place as a citizen of the Republic of the United States, where he had grown up. Following the local troubles of the negroes soon after the war, he was pursued with others by the authorities for a year or two under suspicion of being implicated in the slaughter of some of the freedmen, but was released upon a hearing and went about the serious affairs of life in a manner which promised success. Mr. Nash manifested a penchant for land. He was such a believer in the future of Texas land that he set about acquiring valuable tracts in various counties until his possessions embraced thousands of acres. While he assailed Nature and made the wild grasses yield their place to cotton, he liked the native turf and seemed to regret its passing when settlement demanded the opening of new farms. He reached a position of financial independence within a decade after the war that enabled him to abandon active farming and devote himself to business affairs in Kaufman.

Although for some time embarrassed by the lack of a liberal early education, he overcame this by experience in the affairs of the world which taught him the fundamentals of business. In 1881 he established a private bank in Kaufman, and conducted it with marked success, and in 1888, associated with some of the leading men of his town, chartered the First National Bank, with a capital of fifty thousand dollars, and was made president of the institution. He remained in that office until his death, March 26, 1912. During the life of its charter—a period of twenty years—the management doubled the capital of the bank, paid annual dividends of ten per cent for nineteen years, and a dividend of thirty-one per cent the last year, besides a surplus of twenty-five per cent on its capital and surplus, amounting to twenty-five thousand dollars. In February, 1910, the bank was reorganized with a one hundred thousand-dollar capital and a twenty-five thousand-dollar surplus, and has continued its record-making dividend career.

Mr. Nash so displayed his ability as a financier that his services were called for by public institutions needing a strong and able guiding hand. When the old Texas Trunk railway became embarrassed and went into the hands of the court, he was appointed receiver of the road and rehabilitated its affairs, and when Governor Ross made up his board of managers for the North Texas Insane Asylum he chose Mr. Nash one of its members and he gave that institution four years of wise administration in harmony with his colleagues on that body. His activity in politics carried him into convention work of the state and made him well known for his Democratic adherence. Mr. Nash was a large holder of the original stock of the Kaufman Oil Mill, erected the first residence in the county to cost twenty thousand dollars, and in the construction of the home of the First National Bank built the first brick business house in the county to cost thirty-four thousand dollars. After his children were all grown and some of his grandchildren had passed through the Kaufman schools, he urged the raising of the school tax materially to aid the schools to do more efficient work, demonstrating his willingness that the public school should enjoy any benefits which his capital could reasonably provide. He exemplified his fraternal side as a Knights Templar Mason and as a Knight of Pythias. For thirty years he was a consistent member of the Baptist church. He was of fine physique, standing six feet one inch in height, and weighing 265 pounds.

On January 5, 1870, Herbert Temple Nash was married to Miss Louisa Jane Shannon, a member of a pioneer family of San Augustine, Texas, and to this union there have been born the following children: Allie, the wife of Congressman James Young, was educated in Nash College, Sherman, and in Hollins Institute, Virginia, married Mr. Young in 1892, and is the mother of Herbert R., a Bachelor of Arts graduate of the University of Texas, class of 1913, when under nineteen years of age, Imogene and James; William Temple, of this notice; and Jack A.

Jack A. Nash was born in 1878, attending Bingham Military Institute, North Carolina, after the public schools, and then took a course in Bethel College, Russellville, Kentucky. He began life with the affairs of his father as assistant cashier of the First National Bank at Kaufman, subsequently built the old mill at Athens, Texas, and has since been associated with his brother in the conduct of their vast agricultural interests, in the development of farms and in the multitudinous matters in the management of possessions equal to a baronial estate. He is one of the directors of the First National Bank of Kaufman. Mr. Nash was married at Athens, Texas, to Miss May Richardson, a daughter of Ed Richardson, a lawyer of Henderson county, and they have been the parents of three children: Jack, Jr., Janie Catherine and Franklin.

William Temple Nash was born while the family were still farmers, June 22, 1873. The public schools of Kaufman educated him liberally as he grew to manhood, and he subsequently attended the Bingham Military Institute, North Carolina, the University of Texas, and the Poughkeepsie Business College, New York. When he left school, he spent a few years in the First National Bank, and then turned his attention to farming, aiding actively in the overseeing of the development work going on upon the family estate. Four-room bungalows with fourteen feet-square rooms on every 150 acres, with good barns, mark the character of their improvements, and their clearing of the "green briar" lands of the Elm Flats of Kaufman county marks an epoch in farm-making in that region. They have under cultivation in Kaufman county twelve hundred acres and seven hundred acres in Navarro county. The brothers carry on the largest mule business in the county, at Kaufman, and William T. is a director of the Kaufman Compress Company and one of its promoters, as well as a director in the First National Bank. During the eight years Mr. Nash was a member of the Kaufman City Council numerous improvements were made in the city, these including the installation of the city water works and the filtration system. The father and brothers have ever been firm believers in the church as a great factor in civilization and have contributed liberally to all denominations and creeds.

On December 8, 1898, William Temple Nash was united in marriage with Miss Bettie B. Erwin, a daughter of Henry and Nancy (Spikes) Erwin. Two children have been born to this union, namely: Nancy Jane and Belle Temple.

Sept 29 1899

Trial of W. T. Nash Began Tuesday.

The cases against H. T. W. T. and J. A. Nash charged with killing Frank Gray were called for trial Tuesday morning and on motion of defendants W. T. Nash was placed on trial first. Both parties having announced ready, the task of selecting a jury began about 2 o'clock p. m. By 9 o'clock Tuesday night the following jury was selected and empanelled to-wit:

Frank Meredith, W. H. Wroten, Will Woods, T. N. Smelker, Andrew Johnson, Pit Tankersley, Geo. Sparks, J. T. Urban, B. P. Lane, W. F. Richmond, E. R. Mills and C. L. Bennett.

The State began taking testimony Wednesday morning. The trial is proceeding slowly, and judging from the number of witness it will likely take until Saturday night to conclude it.

KAUFMAN SUN

The W. T. Nash Trial.

Between ten and eleven o'clock Wednesday morning the jury which tried W. T. Nash, returned a verdict of not guilty, after being out about seventy minutes. This is probably the hardest fought and most lengthy case ever tried in the county. The trial beginning on Tuesday evening Sept. 26, consumed six days in selecting a jury and examining witnesses. Over a hundred and fifty of the more than two hundred witnesses summoned were put on the stand.

The testimony was closed Monday evening and Wynne for the State and Cunningham for the defense presented arguments in the case. Tuesday morning was taken up by Crumbaugh for the State and Gossett for the de-

fense, the latter not closing until the afternoon session. The balance of the day until late at night was taken up by Stilwell Russell for the defense and Dashiell for the State. After Dashiell closed, the court, after reading his charge to the jury, told them that as they were doubtless tired he would not require them to begin the consideration of their verdict until the next morning, when he would turn over his written charge to them. After receiving the charge Wednesday morning, the jury, as stated above, returned their verdict.

The cases of H. T. and J. A. Nash charged with the same offense have been continued until the next term of the district court.

H. T. Nash, banker, was born in San Augustine County, Texas March 6, 1841. Came to Kaufman County with his parents in 1850. His father, William Nash, was one of the early settlers of Texas, having come to the state in 1836. The subject of this sketch entered the confederate army as a private in Capt. A. J. Hardin's Company, 6th Texas Cavalry, Ross' Brigade, W. S. Jackson's division, where he remained until the close of the war. About the time of the surrender he with three others, Jack Hardin, Jack Phillips and John West crossed the Mississippi River in a skiff and evaded capture. After the war he successfully engaged in _____ a considerable _____. Began the banking business with A. E. Carlisle in September 18____ under the firm name of Nash & Carlisle, who are now doing a very satisfactory business.

CHARLES CORNELIUS NASH, deceased. Was a conspicuous factor in the business interests of Kaufman county, Texas, for a number of years and up to the time of his death, which occurred in 1878. He was a worthy representative of that numerous family which has rendered itself useful in the development of a modern commonwealth between the Sabine and the Trinity rivers and which was founded at San Augustine by two brothers, William and John D., or Jack Nash, who came hither as settlers from near Nashville, Tennessee. Their father, Dempsey Nash, was one of the pioneer settlers of that state from Norfolk, Virginia, where William was born. Jack was born in the new Tennessee home, and was the youngest of three children, Mrs. Lucretia Couch being the second child.

William Nash married Louisa Temple, and Charles Cornelius was the third child in their family of five sons and three daughters. He was born in Tennessee, in 1833, and grew up and received his education at San Augustine, Texas, to which place the family moved when he was two years of age. He had reached young manhood when the family home was changed to Kaufman county. It was in 1850 that, with a Mexican and a negro, he brought a drove of cattle to Kaufman county, and he remained here during the winter alone, being joined by the rest of the family the following year. He soon busied himself with stock grazing, merchandising and public affairs. At the outbreak of war between the states he enlisted as a soldier in the Confederate army, but a few months later, on account of failing health, he was sent home and subsequently was made an enrolling officer of the Confederate government, which position he filled during the rest of the war. With the restoration of peaceful conditions, Mr. Nash became a merchant, and it was not long before he attained prominence and influence in business and political affairs. Indeed, he gained a popularity more universal than falls to the lot of the average citizen, and when he manifested a willingness to serve Kaufman county as its treasurer, the people gave him cheerful support and he rendered efficient service.

Charles Cornelius Nash was twice married. His first wife, Allie (Gardner) Nash, of Tennessee, died when young. She came to Texas before the war with her brother, A. G. Gardner, who was a gallant Confederate soldier for four years. She bore him two sons, Charles Richard and William A., men of business and civic prominence in Kaufman. His second wife, Josephine Henrietta (Michaux) Nash, was born in Gadsden county, Florida, in 1840, and it was on May 10, 1865, that she and Mr. Nash were married. She comes from a patriotic family of the American Revolution and of French Huguenot blood. Her father was Obediah Woodson Michaux. He was born in Cumberland county, Virginia, about 1786, where his father, Joseph Michaux, spent his life, as an extensive planter and with a small army of slaves. Joseph was descended from French ancestry who fled from the Catholic persecution of the early century to Holland, from whence representatives of the family crossed the Atlantic to the American Colonies and took up their residence in Virginia. Joseph Michaux was a Revolutionary soldier. He received a British bullet through his chest, which sent him back to his plantation and ended his soldier life. He married a Miss Woodson, and Obediah was the youngest of a large family of children. As a young man Obediah Michaux went to South Carolina and there married Miss Elizabeth Runnels Swann. He spent his life as a successful

slave-holding planter. His death occurred in 1852, near Quincy, Florida, to which place he had removed when well advanced in years. His children were: Thompson, who died in Florida; Judith Woodson, who became the wife of Judge Sweet and died in Georgia; Narcissa W., who married Macon Michaux and spent her last years in Texas; Epponina, wife of Wesley H. Kyle, died in Texas; John T. S., who passed away in Florida; Capt. William of the Confederate Army was a citizen of Kaufman county at the time of his death; Harriet S., wife of Abner Rogers, resides near Kirbyville, Texas, and Mrs. Cornelius Nash, of Kaufman, Texas.

Mrs. Cornelius Nash came to Texas with her brothers in 1854, and lived in Jasper county till 1861, when she came to Kaufman county, among others of the family, and met and married her husband. Their children are Mrs. H. C. Hicks of Kaufman; Woodson; Eppie; Allie, wife of Jed C. Adams, of Dallas, Texas; and Temple.

Woodson Nash, universally known as "Wood" was born in Kaufman, Texas, May 5, 1868. At the close of his high school work, he went to Poughkeepsie, New York, where he took a course in Eastman's business college. He spent six years as clerk in the store of H. C. Hicks of Kaufman, after which he entered the banking business with the First National Bank of Kaufman, in which he officiated as cashier from September 12, 1892, to January 1, 1911, contributing much toward the phenomenal record which that institution made as a profit-earning concern. On severing his connection with the bank, Mr. Nash engaged actively in the real estate and loan business as a member of the firm of Shaw, Nash & Nash, which had been in existence several years. Here he dominates a field with wonderful opportunities for money making and has already proved that his efforts are effective for the welfare of his town as well as that of his own estate. He has large ranch interests throughout central Texas and carries on extensive stock and farming operations in Kaufman county. In connection with his brother, Temple Nash, he has developed new farms both on the virgin prairie and timber tracts, and built tenant houses of the best pattern, the expenditure along this line making the owners conspicuous among home-builders of the county. They cultivate two thousand acres, and thereby give homes to twenty-two families whose labor is their chief capital.

Mr. Nash helped to organize, and was made president of the Kaufman Improvement Co., an enterprise for the promotion of real estate improvement and urban development in Kaufman. His interests here naturally make him in favor of good roads, the movement for which he substantially encourages; and he takes a hopeful view of everything relating to the public weal. The only official service rendered by him was that of city treasurer. This office he filled for a period of fourteen years while in the bank. Fraternally he is identified with the B. P. O. E. and the K. of P., the latter of which he represented in the grand lodge of the state. He is a stockholder of the Southland Life Insurance Company of Dallas, Texas, the Texas Life Insurance Company of Waco, the General Bonding Company of Dallas and the Continental Trust Company of Houston.

Mr. Nash's home in Kaufman, with its massive columns, broad corridors and lavish window effects, is a veritable mansion and is pointed out with pride by residents to visitors and sight-seers. His grounds are extensive and afford an attractive setting for his buildings, an important feature being his deer park.

June 25, 1900, at Galveston, Texas, Woodson Nash and Miss Cecile Noble were united in marriage, and they are the parents of four children: Woodson Michaux, Robert Irvine, Edward Cornelius and Caroline Cecile. Mr. and Mrs. Nash are members of Episcopal Church at Kaufman.

Mrs. Nash is a daughter of Hon. Samuel B. Noble, and granddaughter of Gov. Patrick Noble of South Carolina. Samuel B. Noble spent practically the whole of his active life in Galveston, Texas. He came to this state before the Civil war and served during that struggle as a Confederate soldier in Col. Terry's Rangers. He was born in Abbeville District, South Carolina, in 1832; was a graduate of the State University of South Carolina, and throughout his life in Texas was engaged in the practice of law at Galveston. His father, Patrick Noble, who died while filling the office of Governor of South Carolina, in 1843, was previous to his incumbency of that office engaged in the practice of law in partnership with John C. Calhoun, and had served in both branches of the State Legislature, being speaker of the house and president of the senate. His death called forth a most complimentary proclamation from

William A. Nash, second son of Cornelius Nash, was born in Kaufman, Texas, December 25, 1862. He attended the public schools up to the time he was sixteen years of age, when, his father having died, the young man's time was given to looking after the care of other interests; and from that time forward his education was obtained in the broad and practical school of experience. In 1880 he joined a surveying party which made a preliminary survey of the old Trunk Line railroad and stayed with the party from Kaufman to the intersection of the I. & G. N. railroad. Then he married and settled down on a farm, and for six years devoted his energies to agricultural pursuits. At the end of that time he left the farm and became a clerk for W. E. Watkins, and later for Henry C. Hicks, his brother-in-law, in whose employ he remained three years. He next conducted a business of his own in Lawndale, Texas, near Maybank, for one year, and on January 1, 1896, became associated with Messrs. Erwin Spikes and others, and purchased the mercantile business of Taylor Brothers, and the firm name became Erwin, Spikes & Co. January 1, 1902, this business was incorporated as the Spikes-Nash Co., of which he is vice president and general manager. This is the principal department store in Kaufman. Mr. Nash is also interested in ranching in King county, Texas, as a partner of Messrs. Spikes & Pickard, who operate a stock ranch they purchased in 1909.

Politically, Mr. Nash is a Democrat. He has taken part in local party convention work in earlier days and contributed toward the expense as a loyal partisan, and was in attendance as an alternate at the National Democratic Convention at St. Louis in 1904, when Mr. Bryan won the nomination for the presidency. He has fraternal identity with the Knights of Pythias and his religious faith is that of the Baptist church, of which he is a substantial member.

December 9, 1884, William A. Nash and Miss Fannie Ware were united in marriage, and they are the parents of six children: Neelie, Claude, Jo, Lela, Phay and A. Jr. They reside in one of the splendid residences of Houston street, which Mr. Nash erected in 1909. Mrs. Nash's father is James Ware and her

maiden name was Craven.
Their children are John
Ware of Abilene and Seth
& Samuel of Kaufman.

HERBERT T. NASH, president of the First National Bank, Kaufman, Texas, is a native Texan, born in San Augustine county March 9, 1841. His father, William Nash, was born in Tennessee about 1809, was a farmer and stock raiser, and died several years ago in Texas. His wife, who bore the maiden name of Louisa A. Temple, was born in Tennessee about 1820. She died many years ago in Texas.

Herbert T. Nash, the subject of this biography, was reared and educated in the Lone Star State. He went to Kaufman county in 1854, and located, later on, in Kaufman, the county seat. He enlisted in 1861 in Company A, Sixth Texas regiment of cavalry, Confederate army, and served with this company and regiment until the close of the war in 1865. He then returned to Kaufman, where he has since resided. In February, 1889, Mr. Nash was elected president of the First National Bank of Kaufman; is also one of the board of directors of the State Insane Asylum located at Terrell, Texas. He married Miss Jane Shannon in 1870. Mr. Nash is a member of the Masonic fraternity, also of the Knights of Honor.
